A guide to entry to university in Australia for students commencing study in 2023.

The advice in this guide may be subject to change at any time. In our experience, Tertiary Admission Centres and universities can and do choose to change their entry requirements and processes and you should always check directly with the organisation for their latest information before commencing any application. We have verified most of the information directly with the organisations, and in some cases the information in this guide may differ from that published on the Tertiary Admissions Centre or university website, or in their printed material.



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the facts

YOU CAN APPLY FOR ANY COURSE AT ANY UNIVERSITY

This doesn't mean you'll get in. But you need to know that your ATAR and Year 12 results are recognised by every university, and you can apply wherever you want.

Students who are applying for extremely competitive courses (like medicine) can increase their chances of gaining a place by applying interstate. This works because they can select the maximum number of preferences available in each state.

YOU CAN ONLY APPLY FOR A HANDFUL OF COURSES (YOUR 'PREFERENCES')

Your 'Preferences' are the courses you want to apply for, in order of preference. So first you list the one you want to get into most, followed by your second favourite, and so on.

Listing the maximum number of possible preferences for your state gives you the best chance of getting an offer.

When choosing your preferences, it's a good idea to list the ones you really want first, the ones that are more realistic next, and a safe option. That way you'll give yourself the best chance to get at least one offer at the end of each round.

THERE ARE TWO WAYS TO APPLY

The Tertiary Admissions Centres (such as UAC or VTAC) process the vast majority of university applications in Australia.

In fact, some universities only accept applications made through these Centres.

But other universities only accept direct applications, and you cannot apply through a Tertiary Admissions Centre. And some universities accept both types of applications.

You need to identify how you should apply before starting the process. Direct applications may have different cut-off dates, fees, and processes, so do your homework to avoid missing out.

THERE ARE COSTS INVOLVED

Unless you apply direct to the university and they don't charge a fee (ie. Bond University) you'll need to pay an application fee when you submit a completed application.

Note that late applications will attract much higher 'processing' fees, so it's worth getting your application in early. **Note:** the fees are non-refundable.

choosing what to study

To apply to university you need to nominate your top course choices.

Start by identifying the subject areas you're; (a) interested in, and (b) good at. Then, search your preferred university for courses in those subject areas.

It may take some time, but we recommend looking at lots and lots of courses.

For example, if you're interested in health then check out everything from medicine through to nursing, pharmacy, physiotherapy, even speech therapy.

When you have found courses that you are interested in applying for, you'll need to check that you meet any prerequisites or entry requirements.

Once you've found some good options make a note of their name and course code (you'll need that later).

Not sure what to pick?

Consider a general degree in your preferred field (eg. health science) - it'll give you the option to learn more and then specialise later on. You may even be able to change courses at your university if you then figure out what you want to study.

Keep in mind

Some specific courses (usually the competitive ones like law or medicine) can have different application procedures and entry dates.

find somewhere to study

Once you've picked what you want to study, find somewhere to study it. This means you need to select your preferred university, and a couple of backups. In general, universities offer similar courses, which means you have some flexibility in choosing where you want to study.

Things to consider:

- how close is it to home
- what support services they offer
- if they offer flexible learning
- graduate employment success rates

Start by browsing their site, download the handbook and if you can, check out their Open Day. If you have any unanswered questions, reach out to their Future Students team.

get ready to apply

TIP 1

Whether you're applying through a TAC or directly to a uni, make sure that you have checked the number of preferences you can apply for. Make a note of key dates and any fees.

TIP 2

We recommend that you use all available spaces when listing your preferences. It could increase your chances of getting an offer that you really want.

TIP 3

Have all your courses, including their codes and the university, listed together. Put the one you want the most in the number 1 spot.

TIP 4

Check that you're registered with your State Education Authority and TAC to receive your ATAR results. Your school will be able to help if you're not sure what to do.

TIP 5

From 2021 all university applicants need to have a Unique Student Identifier Number (USI). Do you have one? Make sure you have it on hand, and if you don't have one, it's free to get one.

TIP 6

Do you have a personal email address? If not set one up now. Use this email address (not your school one) for all your uni applications.

TIP 7

Make sure you have all the personal details you'll need on hand (and that they match with what is registered with your State Education Body). This includes Student Numbers, etc.

TIP 8

Read through this document and check the TAC or uni websites. Find out what other supporting documents you might need and have them ready too.

TIP 9

If you're applying through a TAC, head to the relevant pages of this Guide for your state and read through the information about how to apply. We've provided detailed step-by-step instructions to help you.

TIP 10

If you are applying directly to a university, read through their how to apply pages, FAQs, or speak to a member of the admissions or future students team before you get started.

new south wales & australian capital territory

how to apply

The Universities Admissions Centre (UAC) process applications for courses offered at participating universities and higher education providers in NSW & the ACT.

Step 1 - Go to UAC.

- NSW & ACT Students - applications are open now
- Interstate Students - apply after 1 August 2022

Step 2 - Click Apply or Log In button (top RHS) between 7.30am and midnight (Sydney time) seven days a week.

Note: Courses starting in semester 1, 2023 will be available for selection as details are confirmed. If your preferred course isn't available, you can complete your application by selecting another course then log back in later and change your course preferences. All courses will be available for selection by August 2022.

Step 3 - Enter your Year 12 Student Number and your UAC PIN.

- 2022 NSW HSC applicants and ACT Year 12 applicants: Your UAC PIN will be emailed to the address you registered with NESA.
- All other Year 12 applicants: Your UAC PIN is the first four digits of your date of birth – eg if your birthday is 3 October, your UAC PIN is 0310

Step 4 - Enter your personal details (remember to use an email address you can access once you've left school).

Step 5 - Provide details of your studies and qualifications, and any other supplementary documentation that's required.

Step 6 - Select up to FIVE (5) course preferences, placing the course you want the most in the number one position. We recommend that you use all of your options to increase your odds of receiving an offer you really want.

Step 7 - Accept the applicant declaration.

Step 8 - Pay the fee by credit card (Mastercard or Visa) or PayPal. Your application is not complete until you have paid.

new south wales & australian capital territory

how to apply

Step 9 - Submit your completed application.

Step 10 - Regularly check your email for updates on your application.

Remember: you can change the order of your preferences or even the courses you've selected as often as you like before the closing dates for each offer round (some courses have early application closing dates so check for these as well.) Simply log in to your application using your UAC application number and UAC PIN. You can't change your preferences by phone, letter or email.

You can change your preferences even after you've applied - perhaps your ATAR was better or worse than you expected, or maybe you just changed your mind.

You'll have to make sure that you change your preferences by midnight on 5 January 2022 for January Round 1 offers.

You can list up to five (5) preferences through UAC.

victoria

how to apply

The Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre (VTAC) process applications for courses offered at participating universities and higher education providers in Victoria.

Step 1 - Go to VTAC from August 2022 to apply for 2023 courses.

Step 2 - Click 'Create an Account' on the home page to register.

Step 3 - Enter your personal details.

Step 4 - Provide details of your studies and qualifications.

Step 5 - Provide Citizenship and residency details.

Step 6 - Provide details about the Year 12 curriculum you are studying and your Student Number.

Step 7 - Enter your contact details; a mobile phone number, postal address and email address are recommended. Remember to use an email address you can access once you've left school.

Step 8 - Choose a 4 digit pin and two security questions (make a note of these and keep them safe).

Step 9 - Review and complete your VTAC Registration - this will generate a VTAC ID Number. You'll need your VTAC ID Number and VTAC PIN to log in to your account.

Step 10 - Log in to your VTAC account and select 'Course application'.

Step 11 - If you haven't already entered your educational history and student ID you'll need to update your account now, then confirm.

Step 12 - Enter up to EIGHT (8) course preferences using the institution and course drop down menus or by entering the course codes. Place the course you want the most in the number one position. We recommend that you use all of your options to increase your odds of receiving an offer you want.

Note: If a course isn't listed in CourseSearch, or it is badged 'Direct', you will need to apply directly to that institution. VTAC does not manage applications for apprenticeships, many lower-level certificates or postgraduate courses. Most interstate courses are managed by other Tertiary Admissions Centres.

Step 13 - Set your information release permissions to allow your results to be published and to nominate yourself for additional offer rounds.

Step 14 - Authorise a nominee (optional) who can manage your account in your absence, e.g. if you're going on a gap year or working away.

Step 15 - Review and submit your application, then pay the fee.

Step 16 - Regularly check your email for updates on your application.

Remember, you can change the order of your preferences or even the courses you've selected. Simply log in to your application using your VTAC ID and PIN.

queensland

how to apply

The Queensland Tertiary Admissions Centre (QTAC) process applications for courses offered at participating universities and higher education providers in Queensland.

Step 1 - QTAC application services are not compatible with mobile phones so you'll need to use a computer.

Step 2 - Go to QTAC from early August 2022 and register on the ATAR Portal to receive your ATAR. You'll need: your full name (as per your QCAA account), date of birth, LUI Number, and personal (not a school) email address.

Step 3 - Click 'Apply or Log In' on the home page to start your application.

Step 4 - Enter your personal details and Learner Unique Identifier (LUI) - your Education Queensland ID (EQID) or Unique Student Identifier (USI) won't work.

Step 5 - Have your Academic transcript showing all subjects undertaken, results (including fails), key to the grading system, name of award and proof of award/completion if applicable. (Note: Statements of attainment, results slips and award elements documents are not sufficient).

Step 6 - Enter up to EIGHT (8) course preferences using the institution and course drop down menus or by entering the course codes. Place the course you want the most in the number one position. We recommend that you use all of your options to increase your odds of receiving an offer you really want.

Note: You can change your preferences in Application Services. Do not save your preferences until you are sure they are exactly as you want them. The first three times you click the 'save' button are free, but each time after this, you will be charged a change of preference fee of \$46.

Step 7 - Make sure you know what your rights and responsibilities are (read the disclaimer).

Step 8 - Review and submit your application, then pay the fee.

Step 9 - Regularly log in using your email address and password and head to Application Service to make changes to or update your application, track your application progress, change your preferences, or view and respond to offers.

You can change your preferences even after you've applied - perhaps your ATAR was better or worse than you expected, or maybe you just changed your mind.

QTAC are yet to advise change of preference dates for entry in 2023.

You can change your preferences for **FREE** up to 3 times, but after that you'll need to pay a fee to change them again. If you want to edit your preferences after you've submitted an application, you can move them around, add or remove courses, but **do not press SAVE** until you're sure. Each "SAVE" counts towards your three free changes.

You can list up to six (6) preferences through QTAC.

south australia & northern territory

how to apply

The South Australian Tertiary Admissions Centre (SATAC) process applications for courses offered at participating universities and higher education providers in South Australia and for Charles Darwin University in the Northern Territory.

Step 1 - You will need your candidate ID number to apply for undergraduate courses. You can check this number with your school or board of studies.

Step 2 - Go to SATAC (applications open early August 2022).

Step 3 - Click 'Apply Now/Log In ' on the home page to start your application.

Step 4 - Select 'Undergraduate Domestic Applicants' on the pop-up options.

Step 5 - Enter your details as requested on the registration screen and remember to use an email address you can access once you've left school. Make a record of your username and password, and keep them safe.

Step 6 - Read and accept the terms and conditions of the application.

Step 7 - Complete the personal details page.

Step 8 - Choose up to SIX (6) course preferences. Place the course you want the most in the number one position. We recommend that you use all of your options to increase your odds of receiving an offer you really want.

Step 9 - Provide details about your qualifications and experience (if requested).

Step 10 - Check your application is complete and accurate, then submit it.

Note: You must complete every section of the SATAC application, even if you haven't done every type of study. You won't be able to submit your application until you complete and save all sections.

Step 11 - Check the email from SATAC confirming receipt of your application. Check for any errors, make a note of your unique 9-digit SATAC Reference Number and keep it safe.

Step 12 - Log in to your account and use the online services to: pay your fees, provide any supporting documentation that's been requested, check your application progress, update your details, change your preferences, or check and respond to offers.

Note: If you've been disadvantaged during your Year 11 and 12 studies and want to apply for Special Consideration, you'll need to download a questionnaire to complete and apply through [SACE](#).

western australia

how to apply

The Tertiary Institutions Service Centre (TISC) process applications for courses offered at participating universities and higher education providers in Western Australia.

Step 1 - Register with TISOnline by pressing the Register button at the top RHS of the home page. You'll need to complete the status check to proceed.

Step 2 - Once you've registered, keep a note of your 8-digit User ID and password required for logging in to TISOnline. Go to TISC and press the Log In button at the top RHS of the home page.

Step 3 - Follow the step by step instructions on the Welcome page.

Note: Use the 'Next Page' and 'Previous Page' buttons at the bottom of each page to move through your application to ensure the changes are automatically saved. Using the Back and Forward buttons on your browser toolbar may result in loss of unsaved information.

Step 4 - You must answer any questions marked with an asterisk (*), other questions are optional.

Note: You may log out at any stage during the application and return at a later date. Remember, though, your application is not active until you have agreed to the declaration.

Step 5 - Choose up to SIX (6) course preferences. Place the course you want the most in the number one position. We recommend that you use all of your options to increase your odds of receiving an offer you really want.

Step 6 - Complete the declaration and submit your application.

Step 7 - Once you have made your declaration, you will be able to change your preferences and your contact details if required. Any other information cannot be changed. If you have forgotten to add something or made an error, you will have to submit the changes in writing to TISC.

Step 8 - TISC will contact you by email if you need to provide any supporting documentation or information for your application.

Step 9 - If you're going to be away between December and February you can complete an authorisation form to nominate someone else to receive information and act on your behalf.

tasmania

how to apply

The University of Tasmania (UTAS) is the only tertiary education provider in Tasmania, and they process all their own applications, and applications for the Australian Maritime College.

Step 1 - On the UTAS home page, click on the 'Study with Us' tab at the top of the page.

Step 2 - Click 'Applying to University' on the drop down menu.

Step 3 - Scroll down to where it says 'Undergraduate Applications' and click the red 'Start your Application' button.

Step 4 - You'll be redirected to a sign up page to create a new account.

Step 5 - Enter all your personal details (remember to use a personal email address not your school one).

Step 6 - You must enter information in any fields marked with an asterisk (*) then submit the form.

Step 7 - Once you've registered, keep a note of password required for logging in.

Step 8 - Follow any other instructions.

Step 9 - Choose up to FIVE (5) course preferences. Place the course you want the most in the number one position. We recommend that you use all of your options to increase your odds of receiving an offer you really want.

Step 10 - To Log In to your account, you'll need to click the button at the top RHS of the home page and select 'Student Portal' to complete your application, apply for scholarships, provide additional information, edit details etc.

Step 11 - Keep an eye on your emails too. Once your application has been assessed, UTAS will notify you if you have been accepted. If you are accepted, simply follow the instructions in the offer letter to secure your place at university.

You can change your preferences even after you've received an offer from UTAS - you need to log in to eApplication and select 'Change Course Preference'.

You can list up to five (5) preferences.

changing your preferences

If you've had a change of heart about what you want to study or where you'd like to go since you submitted your university application, it's not too late – you can still change your preferences.

You don't have to worry about changing preferences right away, but remember that you have the option down the track.

Don't stress if you don't get around to it; or if changing your preferences only becomes an issue after you've received your results. There will be a period of time where you can make the change and ensure you receive the best offer for you.

This information is correct at the time of publication, but sometimes dates change for various reasons, so we recommend triple-checking the cut offs for your chosen universities, courses and states.

Note: UTAS send out their main round of offers to Tasmanian students mid-December and to students in all other states/territories in January, so you may need to call and check with them when the last chance to change your preferences will be.

alternative pathways

If you don't get the offer you really want then don't give up - there are loads of ways to get the qualifications you need for your dream career, and very few careers offer only one pathway to entry.

Start by speaking with the university you wanted to attend to see what they suggest - they may have an easy solution like a bridging course to get you where you want to go.

You could also apply for a course in the same area then transfer later on (lots of people change degrees part way through).

Another option is to start a TAFE or private VET course in the same area then apply for a transfer - your study may even count towards your degree.
