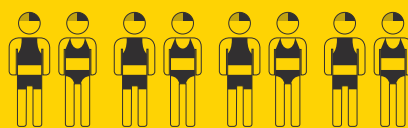

On behalf of the Board of Surf Life Saving WA, it gives us great pleasure to present our 2023/24 Annual Report and highlight some achievements of the past year.

First and foremost, we recognise the more than 24,000 members across Western Australia whose hard work and commitment over the past season have enabled us to achieve success across all four pillars of our movement.

Whether involved in frontline service patrolling between the red and yellow flags, as a nipper parent helping with water safety, delivering training and education programs to fellow members, or helping run surf sport carnivals, every member plays an integral part in delivering on our core mission of saving lives and building great communities.

Last season, our 6,004 volunteer surf lifesavers performed more than 450 rescues, 25,400 preventative actions and 2,700 first aid treatments.

Combined with our Westpac Life Saver Rescue Helicopter Service, Emergency Response Jet Ski Teams, and Abalone and Drone Patrol teams, the impact our members have on the safety of the community and in helping make our beaches a safer place to recreate is immeasurable. We're proud to say that, once again, no lives were lost between the red and yellow flags on West Australian beaches.

In training and development, more than 3,300 members achieved competency in a new Award, and more than 14,100 members of the West Australian community participated in first aid training or one of our community beach safety

programs, helping ensure more West Australians are equipped with skills and knowledge to achieve safer outcomes in critical moments.

As we continue to invest in our surf sports events, it is pleasing to see participation grow. Last year, we saw a huge 40% increase in championship event entries. SLSWA also supported 104 state team athletes travelling east to represent WA and their clubs as members of our Western Suns representative teams.

None of these achievements over the past year would have been possible without the support of our wonderful partners and stakeholders. We are grateful for their shared vision and investment in our people and organisation, and in the safety of our West Australian community.

As we head into a new season, we look forward to building on the many successes of the last, and we look forward to seeing everyone back on the beach.

Surf Life Saving WA Life Membership recognises those members who have rendered distinguished voluntary service for Surf Life Saving in Western Australia for a period of at least 20 years.

Craig Smith-Gander AM - North Cottesloe SLSC

Joining North Cottesloe Surf Life Saving Club in 1974, Craig's input to Surf Life Saving across Australia has been sustained and impactful.

His firm and decisive leadership saw him through multiple successful terms as a Committee Member and a Club and State President, ensuring WA had strong representation around the national table.

During his nine years as President of Surf Life Saving WA, and amongst many other notable achievements, Craig restructured the operations of its growing Westpac helicopter service; stewarded the organisation's role in the state government's

shark mitigation strategy; introduced the WA Coastal Bravery Awards; oversaw the introduction of the Drone Patrol program; announced the largest strategic partnership in surf life saving in Australia with the Woodside Energy sponsorship; and led the organisation through a period of strong growth which saw a nearly 40% increase in membership.

One of Craig's lasting legacies is the establishment of the Surf Life Saving WA South West Development Centre in Margaret River, which will serve generations of surf lifesavers for years to come.

These essential and critical services are provided by trained, proficient, and confident members and employees who are disciplined and committed to saving lives through preventative actions, first aid responses, and rescues.

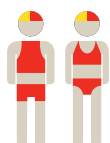
This is done to ensure Surf Life Saving makes a considerable contribution to maintaining a beach-based culture and recreational way of life along the West Australian coastline.

Volunteer lifesaving patrols are vital to supporting the safer use of the West Australian coastline. These patrol services are provided by SLSWA's 31 affiliated clubs at locations along the WA coast, from Broome to Esperance.

Trained and proficient members display selfless and professional commitment, providing unpaid services to the community. They regularly operate in hazardous situations, put the needs of others above themselves, and respond to situations in their own time and outside their rostered patrol times and locations.

These services provided by clubs and members are essential to the positive health and well-being of beach users. On behalf of the WA community, SLSWA thanks the 6,000+ volunteers with proficient skill sets who contributed over 109,000 patrol hours, performed 453 rescues and completed 25,418 preventative actions over the past season.

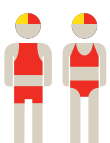

FIRST AIDS

SLSWA is the largest provider of contracted beach lifeguard services in Western Australia, managed under contract with several local government authorities and state government agencies.

Beach lifeguard services ensure service continuity at locations that cannot be serviced by volunteer patrols, especially during peak weekday periods and are essential to reducing the loss of life when individuals recreate at the beach. They also provide an employment pathway for the members of the 31 affiliated clubs.

Supported by the Government of Western Australia and partnered by Westpac, SLSWA's Westpac Life Saver Rescue Helicopter Service (WLRHS) has continued to deliver important outcomes that contribute to the ongoing confidence of individuals to use WA beaches safely.

SLSWA operates two helicopters. One is based at Rous Head, North Fremantle, and performs patrols along the metropolitan coast from Yanchep in the north to Port Bouvard in the south and Rottnest Island to the west. This area encompasses 17 metropolitan surf life saving clubs and 13 lifeguard locations.

The second aircraft, based out of Busselton Margaret River Airport, provides coverage along the southwest coast from Bunbury to Hamelin Bay, home to five regional surf life saving clubs and lifeguard locations.

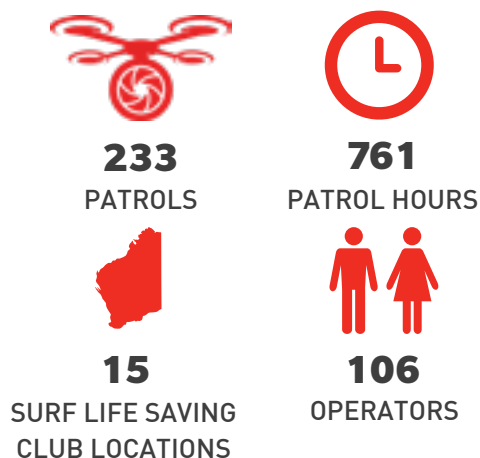
The crews conduct coastal surveillance patrols that include looking out for marine life (including sharks), people in distress, and incidents on beaches, and provide support on search and rescue taskings.

The 2023/24 season saw a 46% increase in the number of shark sightings, which resulted in a 42% increase in the number of people cleared from the water and a 13% increase in the number of people on the beach being advised.

Notably, nearly 35,000 beachgoers received a direct benefit from the service through prevention or advisories of their proximity to a detected shark. These statistics demonstrate the continued value of the WLRHS.



Drone Patrol



Unmanned aerial surveillance (drone) activity has become a regular element of surveillance operations around Australia, and many types, formats, and methodologies exist to adopt and integrate this technology into lifesaving operations effectively.

In Western Australia, drones are a localised surveillance initiative that can operate at locations where there is no other aerial surveillance initiative and supplement the capabilities of SLSWA's Westpac Life Saver Rescue Helicopter Service.

Thanks to a Lotterywest grant, each club that implemented a drone program received new equipment kits, members received training and operational support, and clubs were able to improve sustainability through the training and development of club-based trainers and assessors.

With the support of the Lotterywest grant, the following was achieved:

- Growth of club-based programs from 12 to 15 clubs
- 30 complete operational lifesaving patrol kits received by clubs
- Access to online training programs and supported member training pathways
- Four locations supported by drone patrols during abalone fishing sessions

Operational club patrols achieved:

- 15 endorsed clubs.
- 761 hours of localised aerial surveillance delivered.
- 52 new operators completed training enabling them to operate a drone.
- A total of 106 qualified and proficient drone operators.

SurfCom

SurfCom is SLSWA's state-wide communications and lifesaving operations coordination centre, supporting volunteer club lifesaving and SLSWA support operations group services, as well as several external agencies, including but not limited to the Western Australian Police, St John Ambulance, Department of Primary Industries & Regional Development's Shark Response Unit and several metropolitan and regional local governments.

SurfCom facilitates and coordinates requests for emergency tasking (13SURF), operational asset tracking and distress monitoring, incident logging and recording, monitoring of Emergency Rescue Communications Network (ERCN), call taking and despatching, and capturing and recording operational data that assists stakeholders.

Surf Alert Modules (SAMs)

During 2023/24, SurfCom facilitated the implementation of the SLSWA Surf Alert Modules (SAMs). SAMs have been installed and are maintained at seven locations across the state, from Claytons Beach and Leighton Beach in the metropolitan area, Falcon Bay and Pyramids in the Peel region, and also within the Shire of Esperance at Picnic Cove, Twilight Beach and Wylie Bay.

With a direct emergency line to SurfCom, emergency incidents can be identified rapidly, and real-time warnings and information can be provided to beach users at that location.

SLSWA's Jet Ski Program integrates a modern and integral piece of surveillance and rescue equipment into lifesaving and emergency response services, and the well-trained and proficient operators are a valuable resource to external agencies such as the WA Water Police, often tasked to participate in marine search and rescue incidents and provide support where required to police divers.

Supported by SLSWA, 23 surf life saving clubs have access to jet skis to improve local surveillance and rescue operations and respond to out-of-hours emergencies.

Last season, club volunteers spent more than 2,358 hours delivering jet ski patrols, including support to four abalone fishing sessions across five fishing zones.

WA Police also tasked SLSWA's Emergency Response Jet Ski Teams to support nine search and rescue missions.

13SURF and St John Ambulance First Responder Program

13SURF is a communication conduit that provides external emergency response agencies with direct access to SurfCom. This hotline is vital in providing a direct link to Surf Life Saving WA's first response resources, or to request the tasking of relevant lifesaving services to assist during coastal emergencies. External agencies typically utilising 13SURF include St John Ambulance and the WA Police.

Last season, 160 calls were received via 13SURF seeking assistance from surf life saving resources. Members responded to 78 13SURF calls and provided 48 hours of assistance, including first aid, preventative actions, and rescues as required.

Capital Equipment Support Program

The SLSWA Capital Equipment Support Program, delivered by the WA Government through the Department of Fire and Emergency Services, completed the final year of its five-year program.

Last season, this generous support enabled SLSWA to distribute the following valuable items to surf life saving clubs:

- Six (6) x Jet Skis
- Eight (8) x Side by Side Vehicles (SSVs); and
- Twelve (12) x Inflatable Rescue Boats (IRBs)

Recreational abalone fishing is a popular but hazardous activity, with thousands of licences issued each year to fishers. With a maximum of five one-hour fishing sessions permitted per season, the designated sessions see fishers descend upon the inshore reef around the metropolitan area.

The 2023/24 season delivered four fishing sessions from December through March, with one session rescheduled due to forecast high-risk conditions not conducive to safe fishing.

Support services to improve fisher safety were provided by members from 16 surf life saving clubs, with each club delivering multiple roles and responsibilities, including zone coordinators, surf lifesavers, powercraft operators and crew, first aiders, and drone operators.

The following resources were utilised to deliver these services across the four fishing sessions:

- 879 volunteer surf lifesavers
- 3,460 person-hours
- 118 powercraft (IRBs/jet skis)
- Six drones
- Westpac Lifesaver Rescue Helicopter, and
- Three Volunteer Marine Rescue (VMR) craft

Abalone Patrol Funding Support - Recreational Fishing Fund

Thanks to the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development's Recreational Fishing Fund, SLSWA was again able to support the involvement of the surf life saving clubs.

Through the fund's assistance, participating clubs could be resourced adequately, providing training and safety equipment to undertake preventative, rescue and emergency response services.

The fund also supported various risk mitigation strategies such as planning activity, including the important Hazard Surf Assessments, conducted before each session. This has reduced the number of major incidents over several years, and all participating clubs should be commended on their commitment to protecting fishers during the abalone season.

SURF SPORTS

Surf sports play a key role in the Surf Life Saving movement developing the necessary skills to carry out surf lifesaving's core purpose – saving lives.

Annually, thousands of members utilise and challenge their lifesaving skills in a competitive sporting environment by participating in various surf sports events throughout the year.

Key Events & Activities

The 2023/24 surf sports season delivered an impressive lineup of 51 events across the state, providing a demanding platform for athletes to hone their skills. Several clubs took responsibility for managing select events themselves, with assistance from SLSWA, where necessary. This provided clubs with an opportunity for additional revenue and the ability to develop their event management skillset.

The continuation of the beach events as a stand-alone event on the SunSmart WA Surf Life Saving Championships calendar has proven a success. This format will continue as the surf sports calendar continues to develop to deliver a more cohesive run of events with structures and times adapted to benefit the membership.

SunSmart WA Surf League

The two rounds of the SunSmart WA Surf League events attracted a high level of participation, with a total of 548 entrants. Both events were live-streamed, utilising the compact nature of the competition area set up to provide optimum viewing opportunities. The events featured slightly shorter distances and well-organised programs, offering abundant racing opportunities for the athletes.

SunSmart Surf Squad

The SunSmart Surf Squad is a coaching program held during the October school holidays for U13-U15 members. Coached by aspiring young athletes and coaches under the supervision of SLSWA Surf Sports team members, the program doubles as a development opportunity for both the coaches and the athletes attending. Introducing a Beach Squad with specialist beach coaches this season proved extremely popular.

SunSmart Regional Nipper Championships

The SunSmart Regional Nipper Championships have created a valuable platform for young nippers to engage and participate in surf sports within their region. Held during January and February, these championships took place at host clubs in four regions: Champion Bay (Mid West), Mandurah (Peel), the City of Bunbury (South West), and Denmark (Great Southern). The host clubs organising these events successfully accommodated over 500 eager participants ranging from U8 to U13 age groups.

These Championships also provide an additional qualification pathway to our SunSmart WA Nipper Championships.

Officials and Coaches

Surf Life Saving Australia's surf sports officials and coaches operate within the framework of the National Accreditation Scheme, which is overseen by the Australian Sports Commission. Within the movement, there are established pathways for both officials and coaches. During the season, SLSWA members achieved impressive milestones, with 29 individuals attaining new official's accreditations and 57 earning new coach awards.

Contributing to the growth in coach awards were the nine new surf boat sweep accreditations, which were a direct result of the sweep schools conducted throughout the season. This initiative played a pivotal role in expanding the expertise of our members.

The use of Sports Hub, accessible through the SLSA Members Area, continues to offer a wealth of resources, including videos, articles, and workshops covering a wide range of topics and disciplines. Last season, the resource provided additional support and guidance to our dedicated officials, coaches, and athletes.



WA Championships Events

WA Board Riding Championships

The Board Riding Championships were held at Trigg Beach on 8 June, with a 20% increase in participation on the previous year. Wave selection was critical, with challenging conditions on offer.

Once again, the judges and officials did a stellar job, providing a fair and level playing field for all the competitors. Host club Trigg Island came away with the Champion Club pennant, with Mullaloo in second and Fremantle in third.

WA Pool Rescue Championships

The Pool Rescue Championships returned to HBF stadium with a pleasing 15% increase in participation. The crowds in the stands created a great atmosphere over the 1.5 days of competition as they witnessed some intense racing. Sorrento SLSC won their third consecutive Champion Club pennant against tough competition from Cottesloe SLSC and Secret Harbour SLSC to secure second and third, respectively.

These championships held additional significance as they served as the selection event for the Western Suns Pool Rescue team.

WA IRB Racing Championships

With mountains of weed piling up at Trigg Beach, the WA IRB Championships were moved up the road to Sorrento Beach and held under favourable weather conditions. The event featured some thrilling racing, and ultimately, the collective prowess of Mullaloo SLSC propelled them to another championship victory, taking them to seven consecutive titles. Scarborough SLSC were second overall, with Fremantle securing the final position on the podium in third.

SunSmart WA Endurance Championships

The 2023 SunSmart WA Endurance Championships took place in mid-October, with both ocean and beach events being held at Sorrento and the Surf Boats returning to Mullaloo. With this being the first major hit out for the Championship season, we saw a healthy total of 446 competitors across all disciplines. Calm conditions meant for fast racing on the day.





SunSmart WA Country Championships

Over the long weekend in March, Sorrento Beach witnessed an impressive showdown during the WA Country Championships, with nearly 240 competitors representing 15 regional clubs. Maintaining its remarkable streak, Bunbury secured the title of Champion Club for the 30th consecutive year. Mandurah claimed the honour of the most improved Handicap Club.

SunSmart WA Masters Championships

Sorrento hosted the SunSmart WA Masters Championships and as was expected, competition was fierce across all disciplines, with many long-time rivals battling for glory.

Trigg showcased their excellence by claiming the Championships banner, closely followed by Sorrento and North Cottesloe, in second and third, respectively.

SunSmart WA Little Nippers Championships

The 2024 SunSmart WA Little Nipper Championships took place at Mullaloo Beach, attracting more than 420 young nippers for some fun, energetic racing. Representing 18 clubs, these enthusiastic competitors showcased their skills in the core surf lifesaving events of beach flags, beach sprints, board races and surf races. While competition amongst these future stars was intense, the sportsmanship displayed was equally remarkable as they cheered on their fellow club members.

SunSmart WA Surf Life Saving Championships – Nippers

The continuation of running separate surf and beach events of the Championships has again proved successful, sustaining similar entry numbers from the previous season. Maintaining their dominance, Sorrento secured the prestigious Champion Nipper Club title for the fourth consecutive year. North Cottesloe took second place, while Trigg Island proudly rounded out the podium in third. Notably, Quinns Mindarie took out the Nipper Handicap Club title for the second season in a row.

SunSmart WA Surf Life Saving Championships – Youth/Open

The season saw a 10% increase in overall participation in the Youth/Open events, in particular a 41% growth in the beach events participation. The live streaming of both days of the surf events was also a fantastic way to showcase the talent of WA's athletes and help continue the sport's growth and reach.

Trigg Island emerged the winner of the Championships banner, closely followed by Sorrento in second and City of Perth in third. Sorrento also took the Handicap banner, as well as claiming Champion Youth Club title.



Western Suns State Teams

SLSWA supported 104 athletes across the Western Suns representative teams to contest the Interstate Championships in Pool Rescue, IRB Racing, Surf Boats, Ocean/Beach, and Youth Pathway Cup teams, and the Super Surf Teams League, to travel east to attend competitions.

At the competition in Maroubra, NSW, our interstate teams comprising the Open, Youth (U17), and Pathway Cup (U14-15) categories exhibited remarkable performances in testing conditions.

NIPPERS & YOUTH



Woodside Nippers

The 2023/24 season saw 8,254 nippers enrolled in the Woodside Nippers program, demonstrating growth on the previous year. Many of our regional clubs showed increased numbers, notably Broome, Margaret River, and Smiths Beach, all experiencing 25% growth or more.

The partnership with Woodside entered its fifth year and has again provided invaluable support, including the provision of an age-group skull cap, safety rash vest, wide-brimmed hat, and bag to every participating Nipper across the state and supporting clubs in their program delivery.

Youth Program

Last season, there were 1,866 youth members aged U14 through to U17 in WA. SLSWA's youth programs, including the Youth Leaders' Program (YLP) and the Youth Program Pathways, provide a range of suggested activities across all pillars of surf life saving and give clubs a structure to help engage their youth members on a Sunday morning.

The YLP is an opt-in program where youth members can progress through the three levels: Bronze, Silver, and Gold. Last season, 40 youth achieved their bronze level, 27 silver, and 32 gold, for which they were recognised at the 2024 Nipper & Youth Awards. Many of these outstanding youth members continue their development by progressing to leadership roles within their clubs.

SLSWA also delivered a range of Youth Pathway Courses throughout the season, designed to introduce youth members to the different pathways available as they progress through their journey in surf life saving. Courses were delivered in person and online, allowing for a strong representation of members from both metropolitan and regional clubs.

Youth Development Camps

In early January, both the Rise-Up and TOAD camps were held at the South West Development Centre (SWDC). This was the first time the camps were run at the new facility, and both were hugely successful.

The Rise-Up camp saw 59 U17 members in attendance, where they challenged themselves across a range of activities, including abseiling and coasteering, pushing many of them beyond their perceived capabilities. Participants also completed the required bridging course to upskill their Bronze Medallion to First Aid Certificate, a prerequisite to the Advanced Resuscitation Techniques Course.

The TOAD camp also had 59 youth members from the U14 and U15 age groups in attendance. During the camp, they completed their Radio Operators certificate, participated in team-building exercises, and made excellent use of the pool at the SWDC. Fun was had by all when participating in their coasteering and high ropes activities, as well as nightly games of spotlight.

SLSWA is grateful for the ongoing support from the Scottish Masonic Charitable Foundation of WA and their generous support of our Youth Programs, including these camps. This long-standing partnership with the Foundation was celebrated at the 2024 Nipper & Youth Awards with a presentation to the Foundation of the SLSWA Meritorious Support Award for their significant and sustained support of Surf Life Saving WA's youth leadership programs.



TRAINING & EDUCATION



South West Development Centre

SLSWA's South West Development Centre (SWDC), based in Margaret River, was officially opened on the 23rd of August 2023 by the Honourable Don Punch MLA.

Since the centre's opening, in addition to hosting multiple SLSWA camps and activities, the centre has also hosted a range of groups, activities, and events, including delegates from the World Drowning Conference and numerous clubs hosting member activities, including youth camps, development programs, First Aid courses, and award requalifications.

In addition to qualifying new members for key awards such as Bronze Medallion and Surf Rescue Certificate, a development pathway is available via further qualifications and awards to support members in improving existing or gaining new skill sets. Examples include Advanced Resuscitation Techniques to improve CPR outcomes or learning to operate an inflatable rescue boat, Jet Ski, or surveillance drone.

All members with an SLSA award must undergo skills maintenance each season to ensure they are proficient in their skill set and up to date with the latest techniques. SLSWA Trainers, Assessors, and Facilitators (TAFs) completed over 8,000 member proficiency tests, and 3,362 members were recorded as achieving competency in a new award.

The contributions from TAFs to achieve this result are remarkable, and the movement is grateful for the commitment of this group of volunteers.

The season also saw a focus on implementing the Silver Medallion Patrol Captains Award, with the course delivered in seven locations across WA. The Silver Medallion Aquatic Rescue Award, which involves underwater recovery techniques, rock entries, and search patterns, was also a focus for skill development with a pilot course delivered at Sorrento SLSC to upskill Facilitators.

Thanks to a grant from Lotterywest, SLSWA was able to train and endorse club-based Facilitators in Drone Operations, giving clubs the flexibility to deliver SLSWA Drone Patrol Operator awards to individual members. This resulted in a substantial increase in the number of Drone Operators, supporting the more frequent use of drones as a localised surveillance tool.

Development opportunities were also delivered through interagency training and professional development sessions involving emergency response agencies, including WA Water Police, Volunteer Marine Rescue and St John Ambulance WA. These sessions provide members with a valuable understanding of the capabilities and limitations of the different emergency service response groups and ensure operational familiarity when they are required to work together during search and rescue taskings. The support of the Federal Government via the 'Saving Lives in

the Water' Program assisted in resourcing these training sessions with jet ski operations.

Thanks to the Federal Government's support, SLSWA was also able to provide members with access to free emergency care training and awards within the nationally accredited VET framework.

During the 2023/24 season, SLSWA supported 500 members in gaining HLTAID011 Provide First Aid, and 150 members in gaining HLTAID015 Provide Advanced Resuscitation and Oxygen Therapy Units of Competency.

Rookie Lifeguard Program

The 2023/24 season saw the fourth iteration of the Rookie Lifeguard Program expanded across two locations, with a metro program and a camp held at the South West Development Centre. Thirty members aged 16 - 17 honed their lifesaving skills through various challenges and development sessions that tested their fitness and exposed them to advanced lifesaving activities such as rock rescue training.

Participants also gained insights into key lifesaving department operations, including jet ski and helicopter services, and learnt about pathways to employment as a lifeguard and other support operations roles such as SurfCom.

Every individual in the Program went from strength to strength, demonstrating determination and development of leadership and teamwork skills.

On completion of the Program, six participants were selected to participate in a Lifeguard immersion week alongside SLSWA's contracted lifeguard services, where they spent the week being mentored on the job across a range of beaches where SLSWA services are implemented.

Nipper Lifeguard Program

Last season saw the introduction of the inaugural Nipper Lifeguard Program (NLP) for U13 Nipper members. Seen as a prelude to participation in the Rookie Lifeguard Program, thirty Nippers attended the fun and engaging one-day program held at City Beach, participating in various lifesaving activities, experiencing and being exposed to skills and knowledge applicable to working in the Lifeguard/Lifesaving industry.

Activities included surf and ocean skills, including surf awareness; powercraft operations; helicopter operations, including a session delivered by the Westpac Life Saver Rescue Helicopter Crew; and basic first aid and resuscitation.

With the inaugural program a sell-out, it will become a fixture on the annual calendar.





SLSA National Leadership College

During the first week of February 2024, young surf lifesavers from across Australia and New Zealand came together in Sydney for the annual SLSA National Leadership College, a week-long program aimed at developing leadership skills and fostering a connection among our young, emerging leaders within surf life saving.

This year, WA had four delegates in attendance: Christopher Brigg (Swanbourne Nedlands), Chris Foster (City of Perth), Bernadette Parker (Coogee Beach), and Mitchell Shackles (Secret Harbour).

SLSA Masterclass

From 26 - 30 July 2023, the annual SLSA Masterclass was held at the University of South Australia. The week-long program targets current leaders in surf life saving who are seeking to develop their leadership skillset through engagement with other like-minded individuals from across Australia and New Zealand.

Representing Western Australia were Kate Burke (Fremantle), Matt Elliott (Fremantle), and Anthony Gollan (Mandurah).

SLSA Women's Mentoring Program

This Program is designed to strengthen leadership skills and develop the next generation of female leaders to position Surf Life Saving for the future.

This season saw the Program's fourth cohort graduate in October. It was again fantastic to have WA represented with both mentor Shelly Rourke (Busselton) and mentee Rebecca Highes (Secret Harbour).

The fifth intake progressed in the season with mentors Shelly Rourke (Busselton), Bronwyn Meldrum (Trigg Island) and Jette Oksis (Fremantle), and mentee Louise Nicholls (Alkimos).

SLSWA is a Registered Training Organisation (RTO 51104) delivering Vocational Education and Training (VET) First Aid Units of Competency, including HLTAID011 Provide First Aid and HLTAID015 Provide Advanced Resuscitation and Oxygen Therapy, as well as non-VET accredited programs, such as the Community Surf Rescue Certificate.

These courses continue to demonstrate strong attendance with school teachers, surfboard riding coaches, and instructors gaining or maintaining skills to assist them in appropriately implementing water safety and emergency response techniques during the delivery of their programs.

First Aid and lifesaving training were also delivered to corporate and community organisations throughout Western Australia, helping ensure community members across the state have the skills and confidence to administer lifesaving treatment to help save lives and minimise the impact of serious injuries.

Schools and Community BeachSAFE Programs

The SLSWA school water safety and community BeachSAFE programs provide the opportunity for school and university students to participate in fun and interactive education sessions while learning beach safety information to build individual capacity to recreate in the ocean safely.

The programs deliver theory and practical sessions, contextualised to suit the participants' age, skill, and experience level. Activities range from in-class information sessions through to on-beach and in-water sessions.

In the 2023/24 season, over 3,000 school and university students participated in SLSWA's Life Skills for Life, Introduction to BeachSAFE and Surf Survival Programs.

SurfBabies & SurfKids

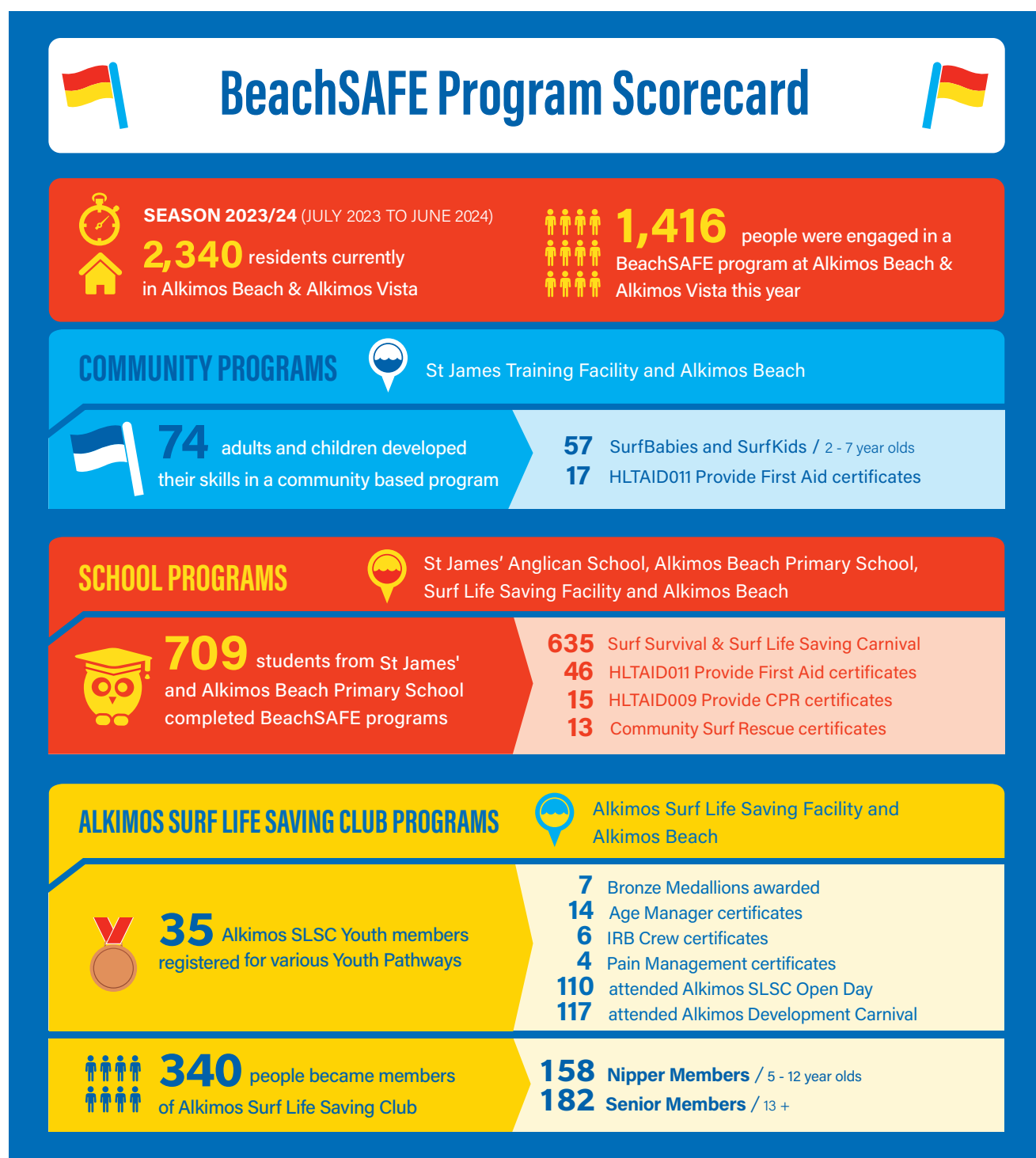
The SurfBabies and SurfKids programs are a fun and interactive opportunity for children and their parents/guardians to develop surf sense, skills, and confidence when recreating at the beach or in the ocean. Catering for ages 2 – 7 years and delivered by qualified surf lifesavers, last season 1,100 children participated in the program across nine West Australian beaches.

BeachSAFE Communities

The 2023/24 season was the tenth year of SLSWA's partnership with Lendlease and Development WA, providing essential beach safety and first aid programs to Alkimos Beach and Alkimos Vista Estates residents, and actively encouraging residents to join their local Alkimos Surf Life Saving Club.

SLSWA collects and analyses coastal drowning data to identify trends and support evidence-based decision-making for drowning prevention efforts. Data is collected through media monitors and confirmed through the National Coronial Information System (NCIS).

The figure of 20 is lower than the previous year, and SLSWA will continue to work toward a goal of zero preventable drowning deaths off the WA coast.

It must be recognised that this figure would be significantly higher were it not for the rescues performed by lifesaving services across the season.

According to the 2018 Cost Benefit Analysis of Surf Life Saving WA, 5% of Total Rescues* would have resulted in a fatality. This means that, without the 1,721 Total Rescues performed in WA across the 2023/24 season, the number of coastal and ocean drowning deaths would have potentially risen by a further 87 fatalities.

Please note: All figures presented are sourced through the National Coronial Information System (NCIS), media, and internal Surf Life Saving systems. Currently, all cases included remain open in the NCIS and, as such, should be considered interim and subject to change once confirmed through both internal and the coronial investigations and validation processes.

Coastal drowning death: where the location of the drowning is on the coast, in the ocean up to 3NM offshore or inland up to five times the width of the inlet/river.

Ocean drowning death: where the location of the drowning is in the ocean between 3NM and 12NM (the Australian territorial water limit).

*Total rescues= Rescues + (Preventative Actions x 1%)

^Remote location: coastal areas including the North coast: Pilbara to Kimberley, the Gascoyne coast and Goldfields-Esperance coastline.

Marketing

The Surf Life Saving brand continues to feature at the forefront of all marketing and communications activities, leveraging its iconic and trusted status in the minds of Australians.

Last season, we refreshed our summer safety advertising, delivering a multi-channel campaign starring the lifesaving services available to help keep West Australian beachgoers safe, including our volunteer surf lifesavers conducting on-beach and on-water patrols and our Westpac Life Saver Rescue Helicopter service. Utilising traditional and digital mediums to raise awareness and drive visitation to our website, we were then able to deliver a range of resources to help educate the beach-going public about beach safety.

We also delivered our Woodside Nippers membership campaign across digital, print, and out-of-home channels, helping to drive growth at our clubs and introducing

another generation to the iconic Australian weekend tradition that is Surf Life Saving and Nippers.

Our mission of saving lives and building great communities continues to underpin all of our messaging as we seek to promote beach-safe behaviours to the beach-going public and the sense of community and volunteerism that comes from being a member of one of our clubs.

Digital & Social Media

Social media, including Facebook, Instagram, X, YouTube, and LinkedIn, remains a primary channel for communicating with our members and stakeholders, and all channels continue to see positive growth in followers.

Our X account remains an important avenue for delivering up-to-date and timely beach safety messages to beach users, including shark sightings and beach closures, helping them make better-informed decisions regarding their beach use, and it continues to play an important role in the state government's Shark Mitigation Strategy.

The live streaming of our key surf sports events, including the SunSmart WA Surf League and SunSmart WA Surf Life Saving Championships via Facebook and YouTube, generates high traffic and views.

We also communicate year-round with our clubs, members and stakeholders via our fortnightly My Beach eNewsletter, distributed to over 23,500 email addresses, and our weekly Club News to club committees and administrators.

This multi-channel approach ensures we can communicate with all sectors of our wide-ranging membership and stakeholder groups via their preferred channels.

SLSWA is subject to compliance with the Rules and Regulations of Surf Life Saving Australia Ltd (SLSA) and is recognised for administering and focusing on surf lifesaving in Western Australia (WA). This statement summarises SLSWA's governance practices that were in effect during the year, highlighting decisions and reporting in accordance within the Rules and Regulations of SLSWA.

Communications with Members

The SLSWA Board aims to ensure that members are kept informed of all major developments affecting surf lifesaving. Information is communicated to members through this document (SLSWA's Annual Report), bulletins, circulars and memorandums with respect to changes in business, financial position, future development, results and activities, and State meetings and member advisory board meetings. General Meetings of Members (Club Delegates)

The Presidents of each Club (Club Delegates), meet with the SLSWA Board twice per year to amend the SLSWA Constitution, review and elect the Board, review SLSWA's financial position and discuss the strategic outcomes presented by the Board.

SLSWA Life Members, Board Members, and the Chief Executive Officer have the right to be present. SLSWA full-time and honorary officers and individual members were allowed to attend general meetings as visitors. NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

For the year ended 30 April 2024

Note 1: Material accounting policy information

The accounting policies that are material to the company are set out below. The accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the previous financial year, unless otherwise stated.

New, revised or amending Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted

The Association has adopted all of the new, revised or amending Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

Any new, revised or amending Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

The accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are consistent with those followed in the preparation of the Association's annual financial statements for the previous reporting period.

Basis of preparation

This financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards (including Australian Accounting Interpretations), other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board, the requirements of the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012 and the Associations Incorporation Act 2015.

The financial report covers Surf Life Saving Western Australia Inc. as an individual entity. Surf Life Saving Western Australia Inc. is an Association incorporated in Western Australia under the Associations Incorporation Act 2015.

The financial report of Surf Life Saving Western Australia Inc. as an individual entity complies with all Australian equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards (AIFRS) in their entirety. Compliance with AIFRS ensures compliance with International Financial Reporting Standards.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the Association in the preparation of the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

The accounting policies set out below have been consistently applied to all years presented.

Reporting Basis and Conventions

The financial report has been prepared on an accrual basis and is based on historical costs modified by the revaluation of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities for which the fair value basis of accounting has been applied. The amounts presented in the financial report are presented in Australian dollars and have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

Accounting Policies

(a) Income Tax

The Association has obtained tax-exempt status under current Australian Taxation legislation.

(b) Current and non-current classification

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification.

An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the Association's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash and cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the Association's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

(c) Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value as indicated less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Property

Freehold land and buildings are recorded at their fair value (being the amount for which an asset could be exchanged between knowledgeable willing parties in an arm's length transaction), based on periodic, but at least triennial valuations by external independent valuers. During the intervening periods, the fair values are determined on the basis of a directors' valuation.

Notes to the Financial statements for the year ended 30 April 2024

If the carrying amount of a class of assets is increased as a result of a revaluation, the net revaluation increase is credited to a revaluation reserve in equity. However, the net revaluation increase is recognised in the profit or loss to the extent that it reverses a net revaluation decrease of the same class of assets previously recognised in the profit or loss.

If the carrying amount of a class of assets has decreased as a result of a revaluation, the net revaluation is recognised in the profit or loss. However, the net revaluation decrease is debited to the revaluation reserve in equity to the extent of any credit balance existing in any revaluation surplus in respect of that same class of asset. The net revaluation decrease recognised in the revaluation reserve reduces the amount accumulated in equity.

Plant and Equipment

Plant and equipment is measured on the cost basis less depreciation and impairment losses.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by Directors to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the assets' employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to present values in determining recoverable amounts.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of plant and equipment along with the motor vehicles and building fitouts are depreciated on a diminishing value basis or straight-line basis over their useful life from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets (excluding land and buildings) are:

Assets residual values and useful lives are reviewed and adjusted, if appropriate, at each balance date.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains and losses are included in the statement of comprehensive income.

(d) Impairment of Assets

At each reporting date, the Association reviews the carrying values of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the assets fair value less costs to sell and value-in-use, is compared to the assets carrying value. Any excess of the assets carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the statement of comprehensive income.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the Association estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

(e) Fair Value Measurement

When an asset or liability, financial or non-financial, is measured at fair value for recognition or disclosure purposes, the fair value is based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date; and assumes that the transaction will take place either: in the principal market; or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market.

Fair value is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming they act in their economic best interest. For non-financial assets, the fair value measurement is based on its highest and best use. Valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, are used, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

(f) Employee Benefits

Provision is made in respect of the Association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled, plus related on-costs. Employee benefits payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits.

(g) Revenue recognition

The Association recognises revenue as follows:

Revenue from contracts with customers

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the association is expected to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer. For each contract with a customer, the association: identifies the contract with a customer; identifies the performance obligations in the contract; determines the transaction price which takes into account estimates of variable consideration and the time value of money; allocates the transaction price to the separate performance obligations on the basis of the relative stand-alone selling price of each distinct good or service to be delivered; and recognises revenue when or as each performance obligation is satisfied in a manner that depicts the transfer to the customer of the goods or services promised.

Grants/ Sponsorship

Grant revenue is recognised in profit or loss when the Association satisfies the performance obligations stated within the funding agreements. If performance obligations are not sufficiently specific and enforceable, the Association recognises this revenue, at a point in time, which is generally on receipt.

Donations

Revenue from donations is recognised upon receipt of the funds.

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Volunteer services

The Association has elected not to recognise volunteer services as either revenue or other forms of contributions received. As such, any related consumption or capitalisation of such resources received is also not recognised.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(h) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

Cash flows are presented in the cash flow statement on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

(j) Financial assets

Initial recognition

Financial liabilities are classified, at initial recognition, as financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss, loans and borrowings or payables, as appropriate.

All financial liabilities are recognised initially at fair value and, in the case of loans and borrowings and payables, net of directly attributable transaction costs. The Association's financial liabilities include trade and other payables and accruals.

Subsequent measurement

Trade and Other payables, Accruals

After initial recognition, trade and other payables and accruals are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Gains and losses are recognised in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income when the liabilities are derecognised

Derecognition

A financial liability is derecognised when the associated obligation is discharged, cancelled or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognised in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

(j) Right of Use Assets

A right-of-use asset is recognised at the commencement date of a lease. The right-of-use asset is measured at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability, adjusted for, as applicable, any lease payments made at or before the commencement date net of any lease incentives received, any initial direct costs incurred, and, except where included in the cost of inventories, an estimate of costs expected to be incurred for dismantling and removing the underlying asset, and restoring the site or asset.

Notes to the Financial statements for the year ended 30 April 2024

Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful life of the asset, whichever is the shorter. Where the Association expects to obtain ownership of the leased asset at the end of the lease term, the depreciation is over its estimated useful life. Right-of-use assets are subject to impairment or adjusted for any remeasurement of lease liabilities.

The Association has elected not to recognise a right-of-use asset and corresponding lease liability for short-term leases with terms of 12 months or less and leases of low-value assets. Lease payments on these assets are expensed to profit or loss as incurred.

(k) Lease Liabilities

A lease liability is recognised at the commencement date of a lease. The lease liability is initially recognised at the present value of the lease payments to be made over the term of the lease, discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease or, if that rate cannot be readily determined, the Association's incremental borrowing rate. Lease payments comprise of fixed payments less any lease incentives receivable, variable lease payments that depend on an index or a rate, amounts expected to be paid under residual value guarantees, exercise price of a purchase option when the exercise of the option is reasonably certain to occur, and any anticipated termination penalties. The variable lease payments that do not depend on an index or a rate are expensed in the period in which they are incurred.

Lease liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. The carrying amounts are remeasured if there is a change in the following: future lease payments arising from a change in an index or a rate used; residual guarantee; lease term; certainty of a purchase option and termination penalties. When a lease liability is remeasured, an adjustment is made to the corresponding right-of-use asset, or to profit or loss if the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset is fully written down.

(l) Critical accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a material risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

Grant income

For grant funding received, the determination of whether the grant agreement includes sufficiently specific performance obligations and enforceability, was a significant judgement involving discussions with a number of parties at the Association and consideration of the terms and conditions within the agreement.

Grants received by the Association have been accounted for under both AASB 15 and AASB 1058 depending on the terms and conditions and decisions made. If this determination was changed then the revenue recognition pattern would be different from that recognised in these financial statements.

Fair value measurement hierarchy

The Association is required to classify all assets and liabilities, measured at fair value, using a three level hierarchy, based on the lowest level of input that is significant to the entire fair value measurement, being: Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the entity can access at the measurement date; Level 2: Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly; and Level 3: Unobservable inputs for the asset or liability. Considerable judgement is required to determine what is significant to fair value and therefore which category the asset or liability is placed in can be subjective.

The fair value of assets and liabilities classified as level 2 is determined by the use of valuation models. Land and buildings have been valued based on similar assets, location and market conditions.

Impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill and other indefinite life intangible assets

The Association assesses impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill and other indefinite life intangible assets at each reporting date by evaluating conditions specific to the Association and to the particular asset that may lead to impairment. If an impairment trigger exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined. This involves fair value less costs of disposal or value-in-use calculations, which incorporate a number of key estimates and assumptions.

Employee benefits provision

The liability for employee benefits expected to be settled more than 12 months from the reporting date are recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

Notes to the Financial statements for the year ended 30 April 2024

Incremental borrowing rate

Where the interest rate implicit in a lease cannot be readily determined, an incremental borrowing rate is estimated to discount future lease payments to measure the present value of the lease liability at the lease commencement date. Such a rate is based on what the Association estimates it would have to pay a third party to borrow the funds necessary to obtain an asset of a similar value to the right-of-use asset, with similar terms, security and economic environment.
