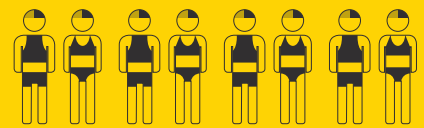

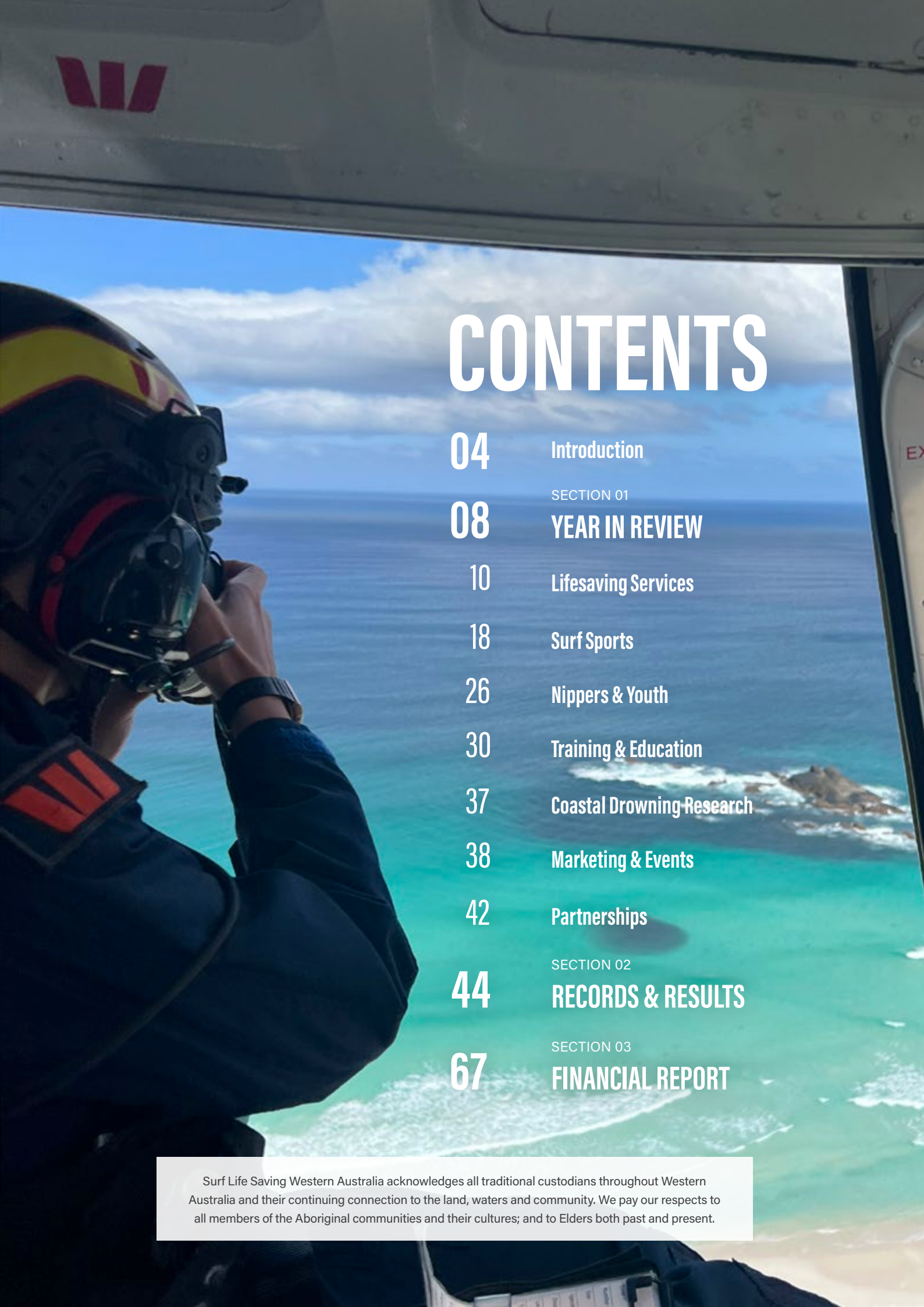

At nearly 13,000 kilometres in length, Western Australia's coastline is the longest of any state in Australia and one of our greatest natural assets. For many Western Australians, the ocean is more than a backdrop - it's central to our lifestyle.

While our connection to the coast brings many benefits, it also comes with responsibilities. Understanding the risks associated with enjoying the ocean is essential to ensuring everyone can enjoy our beaches and waterways safely. Even with preparation, education and awareness, accidents can still happen. That's why the work of Surf Life Saving WA is so important.

With 31 clubs and almost 26,000 members, Surf Life Saving WA plays a vital role in protecting the community across our vast coastline. Its impact extends far beyond patrols and rescues. Through education programs, training and community engagement, the organisation promotes a culture of water safety, strengthens local communities and helps develop the next generation of leaders and volunteers.

In recognition of this important work, the WA Government entered into a new three-year funding agreement with Surf

Life Saving WA in 2025-26. The \$13.2 million investment supports the delivery of helicopter, beach and jet ski patrols that help keep Western Australians safe while enjoying the coast. These services also form an important part of the State's shark hazard mitigation strategy, with aerial patrols accounting for around half of the shark sightings reported through the SharkSmart WA app and website last season.

As Western Australia continues to grow, so too will the demand for safe beaches and the services Surf Life Saving WA provides. I thank the organisation's volunteers, members, staff and supporters for their ongoing dedication and commitment.

On behalf of the Board of Surf Life Saving WA, it gives us great pleasure to present our 2025/26 Annual Report and reflect on the achievements of the past year.

As an organisation, everything we do remains grounded in our strategic goals: zero preventable drowning deaths on the WA coast and supporting an inclusive and vibrant surf life saving community.

This year, our volunteers and clubs, supported by our professional lifesaving services, performed 744 rescues across West Australian beaches. Each rescue represents a near miss for the individual involved and a potential life saved. The impact this has on our community is immeasurable.

While we can once again proudly report that no lives were lost between our red and yellow flags, unfortunately, we continue to see too many lives lost while recreating on our coast. Although coastal drowning deaths decreased by 19% this year, critically, every drowning occurred at an unpatrolled location. We will continue to lead beach safety education and advocacy initiatives that encourage beachgoers to swim between the red and yellow flags at patrolled beaches.

Our commitment to excellence was also evident in the successful rollout of the new Lifesaving CPR. Years in development, this achievement is a testament to the hard work and dedication of our trainers, assessors, and facilitators, and ensures our members continue to receive training that reflects the highest and most current standards in emergency response.

Across the state, our membership continues to thrive, reaching its highest level ever with more than 25,680

members across our 31 clubs. This includes more than 8,700 nippers participating in our Sunday morning Woodside Nippers program, where our youngest members are taught essential beach safety and lifesaving skills. These numbers speak to the presence and purpose that our movement embodies in the community.

Building on this commitment to participation and inclusion, we were also proud to introduce the new All Abilities Woodside Nippers program, with 10 clubs coming on board in our first year - a resounding success and one we look forward to building on in coming years.

To our corporate and government partners, we thank you for your ongoing investment in our movement, and for sharing our commitment to community, inclusion, resilience, respect and safety. Your support helps create a safer coastline and protects the coastal lifestyle that is so important to Western Australians.

As we look ahead to the coming season, we do so with confidence. While challenges will undoubtedly arise, the strength of our volunteers, clubs, staff and partners ensures that Surf Life Saving WA remains well positioned to meet them, continue saving lives and strengthen the communities we serve.

LIFESAVING SERVICES

Key deliverables include, but are not limited to:

Volunteer and paid patrols:

- Lifesavers and lifeguards monitor beaches to prevent accidents and rescue swimmers in distress.

Continuous training:

- Lifesavers and lifeguards complete fitness, rescue techniques, and first aid education.

Community building:

- Clubs foster teamwork, leadership, and community engagement for all age groups.

Public education:

- Programs teach beachgoers about rip currents, hazards, and safe swimming habits.

SURF LIFESAVERS

Recreating along the West Australian coastline is an integral part of our way of life. Through the delivery of patrol, emergency response, and water safety services, Surf Life Saving WA continues to provide a vital community service, enabling millions of people to enjoy our coastline more safely.

The statistics recorded this season reflect another significant year of service across Western Australia. Patrol hours increased by 10.7% to 133,742, delivered by 5,882 patrolling members. Preventative actions remained

consistent at more than 30,000, alongside 395 rescues and 1,534 first aid treatments. These results demonstrate the continued commitment, professionalism, and capability of our volunteer lifesavers in delivering frontline coastal safety services.

With almost 13,000 kilometres of coastline to protect, SLSWA remains committed to building volunteer capability, enhancing service delivery, and working with communities to reduce drowning and aquatic-related incidents across Western Australia.

Surf Life Saving WA is the largest provider of contracted lifeguard services in Western Australia, at a state and local government level, complementing the voluntary weekend patrols delivered by our clubs.

This season, our services saw a 30% increase in rescues, up to 312, and a 39% increase in the number of preventative actions to 112,892 performed on the previous season.

Supported by the Western Australian Government and proudly partnered by Westpac, the Westpac Life Saver Rescue Helicopter Service (WLRHS) continued to provide professional aerial coastal surveillance and emergency response support throughout the 2025/26 season.

Operating from bases in Fremantle and Busselton, the Service delivered aerial surveillance across WA's busiest metropolitan and south west coastal regions, supporting our lifesavers and lifeguards, the WA Police, and local governments and the communities they serve.

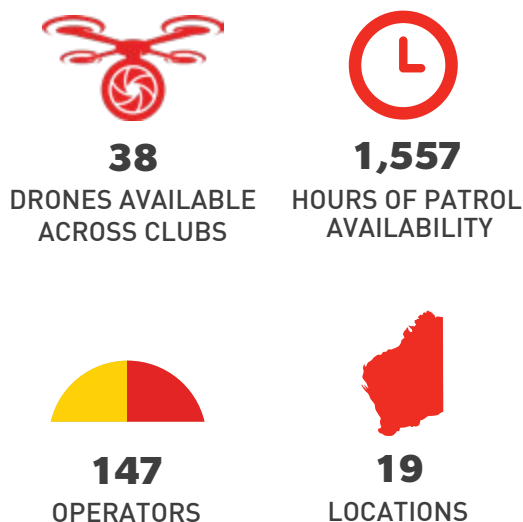
The Service's primary role remained proactive coastal surveillance, with routine patrols assisting in identifying hazards, monitoring beach and water activity, and detecting sharks and other marine risks.

Alongside its surveillance role, the Service continued to provide aerial support to search and rescue incidents and other coastal emergencies, working closely with our lifesavers and lifeguards, the WA Police, and other responding agencies to assist with incidents involving missing persons, vessels, fishers and swimmers in distress, shark sightings, and a range of other coastal emergencies.

Search and rescue activity remained consistent with the previous season, with the Service responding to 60 search and rescue taskings. While annual numbers fluctuate, demand has remained well above the levels experienced across much of the past decade, demonstrating the increasingly important role the helicopter plays in supporting coastal emergency operations.



Drone Patrol



The continued integration of drones into lifesaving operations is enhancing operational capability by providing real-time situational awareness and supporting faster, more informed decision-making during patrols and emergency responses.

With the ongoing support of Lotterywest, the program has continued to strengthen through increased access to equipment, expanded member training, and the development of club-based drone capability.

This season, 19 clubs integrated drones into their patrol operations, supported by 147 proficient drone operators, and a fleet of 38 drones. Collectively, drone teams completed 1,557 patrol hours.

These outcomes reinforce the growing role of drone technology as a key component of frontline lifesaving services across WA, supporting improved surveillance, faster response capability, and enhanced safety outcomes for beachgoers across the state.

SurfCom

Key to SLSWA operational communications is the state-wide communication and operations control team, known as SurfCom. SurfCom supports volunteer lifesaving and SLSWA centre operations, plus multiple external agencies, including but not limited to WA Police, St John Ambulance WA, Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions, Department of Primary & Regional Development Shark Response units, and nine metropolitan and regional local government areas.

SurfCom is responsible for coordinating requests for emergency tasking (13SURF), undertakes operational asset tracking and distress monitoring, incident logging and recording, monitoring Emergency Rescue Communications (ERCN), and recording of operational data that assists with operational situational awareness and analysis.

Surf Alert Modules (SAMs)

SurfCom continues to provide support to the seven (7) SAMs located along our coast.

Remotely operated by SurfCom, these units enhance beach user safety through key features including LED safety messaging screens, audible alerts, shark alarms, and direct intercom access to SurfCom for real-time communication and incident coordination.

During the 2025/26 season, there were 26 shark alert activations from the various SAMs.

13SURF and St John Ambulance First Responder Program

As a conduit to seek first response and request operational support of relevant lifesaving services in a coastal emergency, 13SURF provides external emergency response agencies (specifically St John Ambulance WA and WA Police) with direct access to SLSWA SurfCom operations.

During the 2025/26 season, the 13SURF hotline received 1,157 calls for operational support, with surf lifesavers able to respond to 93 of those requests, a commitment of approximately 50 hours.



Capital Equipment Support Program

Through the Department of Fire and Emergency Services, the WA Government supports the delivery capabilities of our lifesaving services via the SLSWA Lifesaving Capital Equipment Support program, which provided the following valuable resources to clubs this season:

- 7 x Jet Skis
- 8 x Side by Side Vehicles (SSVs); and
- 9 x Inflatable Rescue Boats (IRBs)

Proudly partnered by Woodside Energy and supported by the WA Government, our jet ski operations continue to play an integral role in the delivery of club lifesaving services and emergency response activities.

Supported and facilitated by SLSWA, 27 clubs integrate this equipment into their planned service arrangements and out-of-hours emergency response. A vital element in regular club patrol activities, this season, club volunteers dedicated over 3,680 hours to operating jet skis during lifesaving service delivery.

In addition, our highly skilled and trained operators were tasked with assisting in 12 search and rescue missions along our West Australian coast, plus providing crucial support for three (3) abalone fishing sessions.

Abalone fishing is a popular yet dangerous recreational fishing activity here in WA, with thousands of individuals being issued with a fishing licence each season. This activity remains one of the most tightly regulated fishing activities in the world, with WA's West Coast Zone only open for up to four sessions of one hour each, between December and February each year. This season, due to conditions, three (3) sessions were delivered.

With many fishers unfamiliar with the areas where they harvest abalone, and little to no swimming ability placing them at high risk, the prevention, rescue, and emergency response actions delivered by SLSWA and our lifesavers at these sessions are the single most crucial factor in their safety.

To deliver these services, 16 clubs were involved through planned and coordinated actions underpinned by Local Operating Plans and Hazardous Surf Forecast Assessments, and each fishing session was supported on average by:

- 160 surf lifesavers
- 865 person-hours
- 3 drones
- 30 powercraft (Jet Skis and IRB)
- Westpac Life Saver Rescue Helicopter Service

Pleasingly, this season saw a significant decrease in the number of rescues carried out by our lifesaving services, down 68.6% on last season's four fishing sessions.

To support the participation by surf lifesavers, the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development, via the Recreational Fishing Fund, maintains a service agreement with SLSWA. This support is received with thanks. This season marked the first of a new three-year agreement.



SURF SPORTS

Surf sports play a key role in the surf life saving movement developing the necessary skills to carry out its core purpose – saving lives.

Annually, thousands of members utilise and challenge their lifesaving skills in a competitive sporting environment by participating in various surf sports events throughout the year.

Key Events & Activities

The 2025/26 surf sports season continued to deliver a comprehensive and competitive program, with 43 events conducted across Western Australia. These events provided athletes with consistent opportunities to develop their skills, gain valuable competition experience, and compete throughout the season.

This season represented the second year of the renewed three-year partnership between SLSWA and Healthway under the Fuel to Go & Play naming rights message. SLSWA is pleased to continue working alongside Healthway to promote healthy eating and positive lifestyle choices across the membership and broader surf lifesaving community.

Clubs again played a significant role in the delivery of events throughout the season, with SLSWA providing support where required. This collaborative approach continues to strengthen club involvement in event operations, while also supporting the development of event management capabilities and creating additional fundraising opportunities for clubs.

Fuel to Go & Play WA Surf League

The Fuel to Go & Play WA Surf League adopted a revised format this season, returning to a club team-based structure comprising eight competitors each across the youth, U17, and open divisions. The event was successfully delivered at Sorrento Beach, with a total of 34 teams competing on the day, providing a fantastic start to the summer of racing.

Trigg Island took out the Open category, with Sorrento claiming the titles across both the Youth and U17 categories.

Fuel to Go & Play Regional Nipper Championships

The Fuel to Go & Play Regional Nipper Championships brought surf sports action to communities across WA this summer. From January to February, four regional hubs hosted U8 to U13 nippers for a fun-filled, action-packed series of events: Champion Bay (Mid West), Mandurah (Peel), City of Bunbury (South West), and Denmark (Great Southern).

These regional championships also offer a qualification pathway for nippers aiming to take part in the Fuel to Go & Play WA Nipper Championships. This provides greater opportunities and reduces barriers for regional athletes.

WA Championship Events

WA Board Riding Championships

Held in June at Scarborough Beach, the 2025 Championships were met with excellent conditions, with a large swell and clean waves throughout the day providing an ideal setting for competition. The event showcased a strong standard of board riding across all divisions, with Scarboro claiming overall 1st place, North Cottesloe finishing 2nd, and Mullaloo securing 3rd.

WA Pool Rescue Championships

Once again held at Perth's HPC, the Championships featured some impressive racing by athletes. Over the day and a half of competition, we saw many athletes from Nippers through to masters take home their first medals.

Overall, Sorrento took home their 5th consecutive Champion Club title, but not without fierce competition from Cottesloe in 2nd, and Scarboro in 3rd.

These Championships held additional significance as they served as the selection event for the Western Suns Pool Rescue team.

WA IRB Racing Championships

Unfortunately, due to unsafe conditions, the WA IRB Racing Championships was unable to proceed this year.

Fuel to Go & Play WA Endurance Championships

Held in October at Leighton Beach, this event marked the first major competition of the summer championship season, featuring 476 competitors spanning across all ages U12 to 70+. Conditions on the day provided an ideal setting for fast, exciting racing as Sorrento emerged as the Champion Club, capping off a fantastic day of competition.

Fuel to Go & Play WA Country Championships

Hosted by Albany SLSC, the 2026 WA Country Championships attracted a strong field of more than 270 competitors, alongside officials and volunteers, for a successful weekend of competition.

City of Bunbury secured a remarkable 32nd consecutive championship title with 781 points, while Albany finished 2nd on 413 points and claimed the handicap pennant as the most improved club. Esperance Goldfields rounded out the podium in 3rd place with 233 points.

Fuel to Go & Play WA Masters Championships

Returning to Sorrento Beach for a thrilling two-day competition, 321 masters athletes competed across a range of championship events. The weekend format created an exciting atmosphere for both participants and spectators, with many country clubs making the trip to join the action.

Sorrento claimed the top spot with 648 points, followed closely by Trigg Island in second place and Mullaloo securing third.

Fuel to Go & Play WA Little Nippers Championships

Held at Fremantle in February, the Little Nipper Championships brought together 431, U8 and U9 competitors for a fun and exciting day of competition. Young athletes took part across a range of events including beach sprints, beach flags, board races, and swim events, showcasing plenty of enthusiasm and emerging talent.

With great conditions throughout the day, the event created an enjoyable atmosphere and highlighted the strong sense of sportsmanship and camaraderie among participants.

Fuel to Go & Play WA Nipper Championships

With over 1,000 competitors across several weekends, the 2026 Nipper Championships boasted excellent conditions and sunny skies for a fantastic racing and viewing for spectators and competitors alike. With beach events hosted at Leighton Beach, and ocean events at Trigg Beach, the team spirit within all clubs was on full display.

Sorrento claimed the Nipper Champion Club title for the sixth consecutive year, with North Cottesloe finishing 2nd and Scarborough 3rd. Sorrento SLSC also took out the Nipper Handicap pennant as the most improved club, capping off another successful championship.



Fuel to Go & Play WA Surf Life Saving Championships – Youth/Open

The Youth/Open Championships brought together 955 athletes from across Western Australia for an action-packed long weekend at Trigg Beach. Ocean competitors were tested by challenging surf conditions, with strong swell and quality waves creating an exciting spectacle and rewarding those who could adapt to the demanding ocean environment.

Athletes delivered outstanding performances across all beach and ocean disciplines, showcasing the skill, determination, and depth of talent within the state. Sorrento claimed the overall championship, and Scarborough took out the handicap title.

The championships once again highlighted the strength of surf sports in Western Australia, with clubs, officials, volunteers, and supporters contributing to a successful and memorable event.



Western Suns State Teams

This season, SLSWA supported 87 athletes across the representative teams for Pool Rescue, Surf Boats, Ocean/ Beach, and Pathway Cup, as well as the Super Surf Teams League (Broome Pearlers and Scarborough Sunsets).

These teams provide a wealth of experiences for the athletes, providing an opportunity to travel and compete against the best across Australia, with some fantastic results for WA.

The Aussies

The 2026 Australian Surf Life Saving Championships were held on Queensland's North Kirra Beach.

Kicking off with the Youth Championships, highlights included North Cottesloe's dominance in the U14 Beach Sprint - with Edward Wallis taking home gold and Luca De Vries the silver. Both athletes then went on to claim the U14 Mixed Beach Relay title with team mates Amelia Cipolloni and Clara Gordini. Cottesloe's Monty Stork took out the U15 Champion Lifesaver title with a dominant performance.

The WA masters athletes had their share of success, with many competitors winning gold, notably Ceris Humble of Trigg Island, who again came home with three.

In the open competition, WA clubs started with a bang, with both City of Perth's Open Female Beach Relay Team and Sorrento's Open Mixed Beach Relay Team taking gold in their events. Individually, Imogen Herrington and Matthew Lloyd took silver in the Open Female and Male Beach Sprint events, and Jackson Symonds also added to his haul of Australian medals, taking bronze in the Open Male Sprint. Owen Chaloner from North Cottesloe took home gold in the U17 2km Beach Run, Trent Yates from Trigg Island won gold in the U17 Beach Flags, while fellow club member Ned Eldon won the U17 Male Single Ski. Staying with the water events, the Trigg Island duo of Annika Negus and Milly Kok won gold in the U19 Female Board Rescue.

Whilst all this was happening at North Kirra, the boats were racing at Bilinga Beach, with the U23 Female and the U23 Male Boat crews from North Cottesloe, led by sweep David Hunt, taking gold in their events.

In the Adaptive Championships, WA clubs raced extremely well, with competitors performing taking multiple medals in all divisions. Ryan Grant of Coogee Beach took home three gold, while Max Letizia of Sorrento claimed a gold of his own.

Australian Life Saving Team

The international season began at the 2025 Commonwealth Lifesaving Championships in Swansea, Wales, where Eleanor Flowers (Trigg Island) and Mitchell Tuckey (City of Bunbury) represented Australia on the Development Team, alongside Rebecca Hartman (City of Perth) as National Team Coach. Eleanor produced exceptional individual performances, winning gold at the championships, while both West Australian athletes contributed to Australia's medal-winning team performances.

The 2025 World Games in China saw Trigg Island's Jake Smith and Harrison Hynes selected to compete for Australia, while Rebecca Hartman (City of Perth) was appointed Head Coach. Competing against the world's leading lifesaving nations, the Australian team produced an impressive campaign, with the West Australian athletes playing an important role in Australia's success on the world stage.

At the Battle of the Tasman, Eleanor Flowers and Rory Wallace (City of Perth) represented Australia in the pathway competition against New Zealand. Designed to develop the nation's next generation of international athletes, the event provided valuable international racing experience across beach, ocean, and pool disciplines while continuing Australia's strong record in the trans-Tasman series.

The international campaign concluded with the 2025 International Surf Rescue Challenge in New Zealand, where Matthew Lloyd (North Cottesloe) proudly represented Australia. The event brought together elite surf lifesaving athletes from Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, and Japan, with the Australian team delivering another strong performance to continue its success in international surf competition.

Congratulations to all our West Australian athletes, coaches, and officials on an outstanding international season. Their selection, performances, and leadership continue to showcase the strength of our WA membership.



Officials and Coaches

SLSWA continued to strengthen and enhance its coaching and officiating pathways through a range of initiatives designed to support both metropolitan and regional clubs. Throughout the season, 65 participants completed the Youth Officials Program, with courses delivered in both face-to-face and online formats to maximise accessibility for members across the state. Regional engagement remained a strong focus, with the course delivered at the Country Carnival in Albany attracting excellent participation from country members.

In addition, WA surf boat sweeps attended the ASRL Sweeps Academy in NSW to further develop their leadership, technical knowledge, and sweeping skills at a national level.

Participation across these initiatives reflected strong diversity in both age and gender, highlighting the inclusive nature and broad reach of the programs. Collectively, these development opportunities continue to build capability within clubs and support the delivery of safe, engaging, and high-quality surf sports programs across all levels of competition.

NIPPERS & YOUTH



Woodside Nippers

The 2025/26 season saw a total of 8,773 Nippers enrolled in the Woodside Nippers program across all 31 clubs within the state, marking growth once again from the previous season. Several clubs, both metropolitan and regional, experienced significant increases of 20% or more, including Albany, Alkimos, Broome, and Trigg Island.

The partnership with Woodside entered its third year under the renewed sponsorship agreement, continuing to provide significant support to the Woodside Nippers program in

Western Australia. This contribution ensured that every participating Nipper across the state was provided with an age-group skull cap, high-vis safety rash vest and wide-brimmed hat, strengthening participant safety whilst enhancing the visibility and consistency of the program.

In addition, clubs received supplementary funding to support the purchase of essential equipment, helping to ensure the program remained well resourced and effectively delivered across the state.

Youth Program

Our Youth Program continues to support members within the U14-U17 age groups through both the Youth Recognition Program (YRP) and the various Youth Pathways that are available for them to participate in.

Designed to engage young members across all pillars of surf life saving, the program provides clubs with a framework to run an engaging and purposeful program as they work towards improving retention across these age groups. This season, there was a total of 1,927 registered youth members.

The YRP is an opt-in initiative that enables participants to progress through Bronze, Silver, and Gold levels by recording their volunteer hours. This season, 50 youth members achieved their Bronze level, 22 achieved Silver, and a further 22 achieved Gold level. The achievements of the Gold level recipients were celebrated at clubs across the state where the members were presented with their Gold YRP certificate and an SLSWA branded Engine backpack.

Throughout the season, a range of Youth Pathway courses were delivered across the state. Designed to introduce youth members to the different roles and opportunities available to them as they progress through their journey in

surf life saving, the courses were delivered both in-person and online, allowing for metropolitan and regional member participation. Opportunities to deliver the courses in person in the regions were also taken advantage of, with a course run at the 2026 Fuel to Go & Play Country Carnival in Albany attracting large numbers of participants.

Youth Development Camps

During the first two weeks of January, our South West Development Centre (SWDC) once again hosted the TOAD and Rise-Up camps.

The Rise-Up Camp welcomed 53 U17 members from 20 clubs across the state. Following their arrival in Margaret River, participants commenced the camp with a range of games and icebreaker activities before taking part in a series of adventurous challenges over the following days, including abseiling and coasteering.

The camp activities and experiences are designed to build resilience, encourage personal growth, and challenge participants beyond their comfort zones. Members also completed the Bronze Medallion to First Aid upgrade course, a prerequisite for the Advanced Resuscitation Techniques Certificate (ART), supporting and encouraging further pathway development within lifesaving.

The TOAD Camp hosted 59 youth members from the U14-U15 age groups, with representation from 26 clubs. The SWDC facilities were well utilised, where many games of volleyball helped foster connection and camaraderie amongst participants. Camp highlights included coasteering, surfing lessons, and the much-anticipated nightly games of Spotlight, while participants also worked towards attaining their Radio Operators Certificate.

The Youth Development Camps continue to be generously supported by the Scottish Masonic Charitable Foundation of WA through their ongoing sponsorship. SLSWA is sincerely grateful for their valued contribution, which helps make these opportunities possible for young members across the state.

ALL ABILITIES

This year, a three-year Inclusive Participation Grant was awarded by the Department of Creative Industries, Tourism and Sport to establish an All Abilities Surf Sports Program. This provided funding to employ an All Abilities Program Facilitator and a part-time All Abilities Surf Sports Officer.

A Project Steering Working Group was formed and tasked with structuring the program to the objectives provided and designing the program resources and kits.

A series of training workshops held in the Perth Metropolitan, Mid West, and Great Southern regions were then delivered to program coordinators and volunteers from clubs to assist with the implementation of the program. Fifty-one volunteers participated across six workshops before the All Abilities Woodside Nippers program was launched to clubs in June 2025.

Year one saw ten clubs participate – Albany, Alkimos, Champion Bay, Floreat, Fremantle, Quinns Mindarie, Scarborough, Secret Harbour, Sorrento and Trigg Island, with a total of 95 All Abilities participants enrolled and enjoying the adapted activities.

To round out the year, SLSWA convened an All Abilities Camp at the SWDC in April for club coordinators and volunteers. Joined by a guest facilitator, the weekend provided an opportunity for networking, learning, and sharing experiences as well as reviewing current resources and suggesting new additions to the resource kits.

Surf Life Saving WA Life Membership recognises those members who have rendered distinguished voluntary service for Surf Life Saving in Western Australia for a period of at least 20 years.

Carolyn Wilson – Secret Harbour SLSC

Joining Secret Harbour in 2003, Carolyn's commitment spans multiple areas, including Surf Sports, Education and Training, and Governance. In 2015, she was awarded Life Membership of Secret Harbour SLSC.

Her officiating journey began almost immediately, sparking over two decades of service as she progressed from a Level 1 official to Senior Official, Referee, and respected mentor.

Her record of leadership is exemplary, having served in officiating and refereeing roles at the Country and Pool Rescue Championships, and Open, Youth, Masters, and Nipper Championships since 2012.

Nationally, Carolyn has long been a fixture at the Australian Championships, her service and standards earning her the national Official of the Year title, a title she has won at the state level on three occasions. Her expertise has also taken her to six Lifesaving World Championships.

Beyond officiating, Carolyn is a committed educator, she has spent over a decade as a training officer and assessor, and has invested in our next generation, serving for nine years as a Group Leader at SLSWA's Youth Camps.

Peter McDonnell – Scarboro SLSC

Joining Scarboro in 1969, Peter quickly earned his Bronze and Instructor's Certificate, taking on patrol and training duties for many seasons.

In 1983, drawing on his professional communications background, Peter became Scarboro's Radio Officer and, for nearly 30 years, maintained the club's radio operations and trained members.

But Peter's impact reached far beyond his home club. He was the backbone of the state's radio control centres, frequently working double shifts and weekends when other operators failed to show up. Records show he volunteered 60 to 80 hours every season for more than 25 years, to keep the communication lifeline open for our lifesavers.

While a teenage cycling accident left Peter legally blind and unable to drive, he simply adapted, commuting by bus, pushbike, and on foot, demonstrating true dedication.

Awarded Life Membership of Scarboro in 1996, and in 2019, the Surf Life Saving Australia 50 Year Long Service Award, Peter's unequalled dedication has undoubtedly saved lives and protected volunteers across the West Australian coast.

2026 SLSWA SPORTING HALL OF INDUCTEE

Western Australia has a strong history and track record of producing outstanding surf sports athletes who have honed their skills at our local surf clubs and gone on to dominate surf sports at a state, national and international level.

The Sporting Hall of Fame recognises these outstanding athletes and their exceptional efforts.

Gabrielle Murphy – City of Perth SLSC

With more than 17 years of experience in senior competition, Gabby has established an exceptional career that continues to this day.

In individual competition, she has secured 10 WA Championship titles, including eight Open Beach Flags and two Open Beach Sprint crowns.

On the national stage, a second and third in the Open Beach Sprint, and internationally, multiple podium finishes across both disciplines. In team competition, Gabby's collaboration has yielded 12 WA Beach Relay titles, two Australian titles, and a World Championships title.

Named the 2022 WA Open Athlete of the Year and a two-time Team of the Year recipient, Gabby has represented WA on four Western Suns state teams, in the Super Surf Teams League, and as a member of the Surf Life Saving Australia U20 International Surf Rescue Challenge team, where she was undefeated in her sprint and flag competitions.

A former Club Captain and long-serving Patrol Captain, Gabby balances shift work to mentor emerging athletes, embodying true sportsmanship.

TRAINING & EDUCATION



Member Awards

Overview & Key Achievements

Throughout the season, SLSWA club trainers, assessors, and facilitators demonstrated ongoing tenacity and commitment in delivering a comprehensive suite of courses, skills maintenance programs, and professional development sessions to the membership. This dedication directly resulted in the critically important completion of more than 9,000 skills maintenance checks and the issuance of over 4,000 new awards, reinforcing the capability and readiness of our frontline personnel who deliver outstanding community service and assist in preventing the loss of life and mitigating the occurrence of catastrophic injury.

Strategic Initiatives & Modernisation

Of significance this season was the seamless change management program delivered to introduce improvements

in CPR, known as Lifesaving CPR, an internationally evidence-based program backed by clinical analysis that dramatically improves sudden cardiac arrest survival rates.

Steered by SLSA and key contributors including SLSWA's Leesa Equid and David Reid through the SLSA Medical Advisory Group, a dedicated cohort of 290 trainers successfully upskilled 4,428 WA members to the amended CPR protocols.

The Rescue Water Craft (RWC) course was also modernised, with an updated training manual and refined operational techniques. To embed these changes, highly successful interclub sessions were conducted, bringing Inflatable Rescue Boat (IRB) and RWC operators together to collaborate on the latest protocols and reinforce the gains already established in IRB operations and training.



Interagency Collaboration

To strengthen emergency response frameworks, SLSWA continued to maintain and improve interagency cooperation, with numerous clubs conducting multi-agency training scenarios with Marine Rescue, St John WA, and the WA Water Police. These joint exercises significantly enhanced mutual capability understanding, streamlined communication protocols, and identified key operational efficiencies to optimise future collaborative responses. These interactions are essential to maintaining member confidence when incidents require multi-agency responses.

VET Funding & Capability Building

Leveraging support from the federal government's Vocational Education and Training (VET) Funding grant, SLSWA continued to offer members complimentary access to HLTAID011 Provide First Aid and HLTAID015 Provide Advanced Resuscitation and Oxygen Therapy units of competency. This nationally accredited training was delivered to 542 members. These emergency response competencies empower our members to improve their operational capacity and confidence, and assist in expanding the patrolling and response capacity of our clubs.

At a national level, SLSWA retained a core involvement in addressing and shaping member education and training needs, with SLSWA members actively contributing to numerous national advisory panels and working groups, including:

Rookie Lifeguard Program

The Rookie Lifeguard Program is now embedded as a core participation program developing youth membership and helping to establish a line of future lifesavers who develop the confidence to take on beach management and team leadership roles within their club and state-level activities.

Held at the South West Development Centre, the region's diverse beaches and coastline provide a perfect development ground for participants.

Attendees spent five days participating in organised activities including Search & Rescue (SAR) scenarios, board & tube rescues, the Lifeguard Mission, coasteering, and numerous team-building exercises, with all participants achieving their Silver Medallion Aquatic Rescue Award.

Ten participants from this year's alumni were selected to participate in the additional immersion program, completing shifts and being mentored by experienced SLSWA Lifeguards, gaining insight into the roles and responsibilities of a professional beach lifeguard.

Youth Lifeguard Program

In its second year, the Youth Lifeguard Program continues to give U14/15 members a hands-on introduction to lifesaving services, assisting them to explore the opportunities available in the lifeguarding industry. Over two days, participants developed their awareness and skills in negotiating the surf, rescue, and emergency responses through a range of practical and engaging activities.

The program featured advanced surf skills, first aid and powercraft sessions, with the jet ski and IRB activities proving a favourite among participants as they experienced real surf conditions with the assistance of the enthusiastic City of Perth SLSC members.

The Westpac Life Saver Rescue Helicopter was a highlight that included observing a diver-drop exercise and interacting with the crew, before finishing the program with a team-based lifeguard rescue challenge, rounding out everything learnt over the two days.



Nipper Lifeguard Program

A full capacity of 34 U13 members participated in this year's Nipper Lifeguard Program, which continues to provide an exciting introduction to the opportunities available within our lifesaving services. Designed as a pathway program, the one-day experience encourages young members to continue their surf life saving journey while developing awareness, practical skills, confidence, and connections with members from other clubs.

Participants took part in basic first aid training, a powercraft session, with the jet ski experience proving to be a clear favourite, and a visit from the Westpac Life Saver Rescue Helicopter, which included a diver-drop demonstration and the use of smoke markers, while also meeting the helicopter crew.



Young Leaders Camp

In August 2025, the second annual Young Leaders Camp was held at the South West Development Centre. Designed for up-and-coming leaders between the ages of 18 and 25, this year saw 14 members enjoy a weekend of networking and learning as they participated in a range of workshops and discussions covering a broad range of topics including leadership styles, emotional intelligence, and negotiating conflict.

A panel discussion featuring SLSWA President Heidi Gan OLY, Board Member Jack Dowie, and Education Committee Chair Shelley Rourke provided the attendees an opportunity to ask the panellists questions about leadership and their experiences within surf life saving, whilst attendees also partook in coasteering in some challenging conditions, testing the lifesaving, leadership, and teamwork skills learnt across the weekend.



SLSA Masterclass

Held from in July 2025, at the University of South Australia, the annual SLSA Masterclass program is an opportunity for current senior leaders within our surf life saving clubs to strengthen their strategic thinking and leadership skills, working with other like-minded individuals from across Australia and New Zealand.

SLSWA continues to support WA members' participation in the Masterclass by fully subsidising two representatives. In 2025, WA was represented by Misty Wallace (Busselton) and Logan Ovenden-Clarke (Swanbourne Nedlands).

SLSA Women's Mentoring Program

The SLSA Women's Mentoring Program continues to support the development of emerging female leaders across Surf Life Saving, strengthening leadership capability and building a strong pipeline of future leaders for the organisation.

This season saw the Program's 7th cohort commence the Women's Mentoring Program. It was again fantastic to see Western Australia strongly represented, with Vickie Rasmussen (Mullaloo), Elise Stallard and Sarah Mahony (Coogee Beach) participating as mentors, and Ashley Atwell (Cottesloe) representing WA as a mentee.

SLSA National Leadership College

During the first week of February, 24 young surf lifesavers from across Australia, with participants also hailing from New Zealand and Japan, came together for SLSA's National Leadership College (NLC) in Sydney. The annual leadership and development program is designed to challenge participants intellectually, socially, emotionally, and physically, with skills gained designed to be taken back to clubs and into other areas of the participants' daily environments.

This year, WA was represented by the 2025 SLSWA Young Volunteer of the Year, Jordana Broomhall (Swanbourne Nedlands), and James Currey (Fremantle).

SLSWA continued to deliver nationally recognised first aid and emergency response training to members, community groups, and corporate clients. As a Registered Training Organisation (RTO 51104), this included accredited units of competency, including HLTAID011 Provide First Aid, along with non-accredited programs such as the Community Surf Rescue Certificate.

A key achievement during the season was the successful transition of the RTO to audited compliance with the 2025 Standards for Registered Training Organisations. This included introducing a new Governance and Quality Framework, and strengthening SLSWA's training systems and quality assurance processes while ensuring learners continued to receive high-quality, nationally recognised training that meets the latest regulatory requirements.

Community Education Programs

Our community education programs equip people of all ages with the knowledge and practical skills to stay safe in and around the water. Delivered by SLSWA and affiliated surf life saving clubs, these programs reach thousands of participants each year through schools, universities, community organisations and local initiatives, helping build individuals' confidence while encouraging safe behaviours in aquatic environments that can help maintain a safer recreational or leisure environment.

BeachSAFE Presentations, an introduction to beach and ocean safety through classroom and practical beach-based sessions, saw extended reach this season, including delivery to school children at Rottnest Island.

Our practical Beach Activities and Surf Survival programs develop participants' surf awareness and water skills, while the Life Skills for Life program introduces children as young as four years of age, along with parents, carers, and community groups, to essential first aid and emergency response concepts using an approach that is engaging and interactive. All of these programs play an important role in supporting the creation of safer communities by building the confidence and capability of West Australians to enjoy our coastline safely.

SurfBabies & SurfKids

The SurfBabies & SurfKids program is a flagship community education initiative, introducing young children and their families to the beach in a supportive and fun environment that promotes safe behaviours and hazard awareness. Designed for children aged 2–7 years, the programs build confidence in and around the water while developing basic surf awareness and encouraging positive family experiences at the beach.

1,163 participants were welcomed into the program across nine locations, with Yanchep joining the program for Series 2 to meet growing demand. In addition, Albany successfully delivered a similar program during Series 2, further expanding the program's reach. The continued growth of SurfBabies & SurfKids reflects its popularity with families and its important role in developing the next generation of confident and beach-safe West Australians.

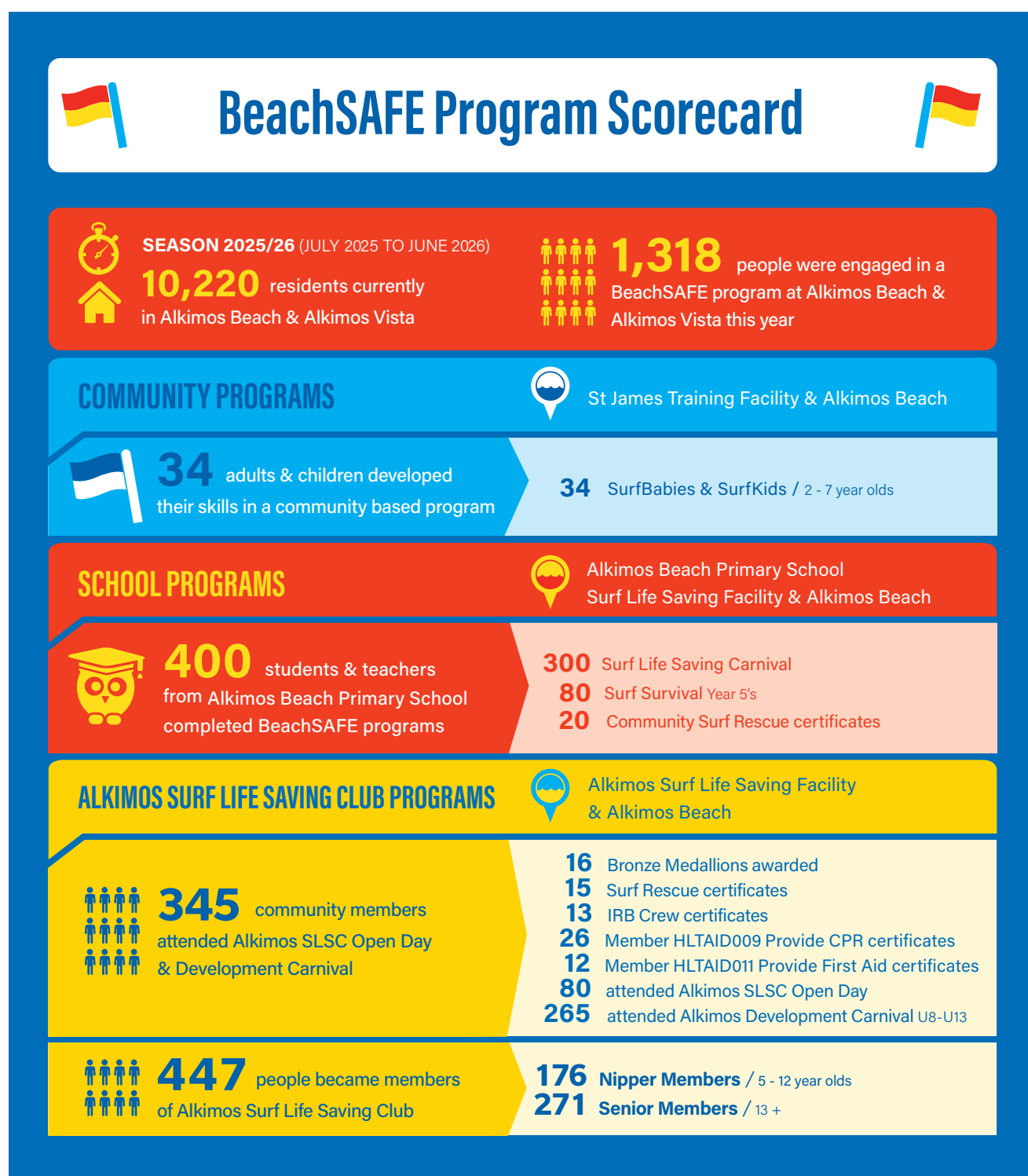
Alkimos BeachSAFE Communities

This pioneering coastal aquatic safety initiative continues to make a lasting impact by equipping the local Alkimos residents with essential lifesaving skills and the confidence to stay safe around our coastline through the delivery of vital beach safety and first aid programs.

The first partnership of its kind in Australia, proudly celebrating its 12th year this season, we are delighted to

announce a further two-year extension of the partnership, ensuring this successful collaboration continues through to 2028. We sincerely thank Stockland for its ongoing investment into coastal safety and for the strong partnership that has been built.

SLSWA collects and analyses coastal drowning data to identify trends and support evidence-based decision-making for drowning prevention efforts. Data is collected through media monitors and confirmed through the National Coronial Information System (NCIS).

The figure of 21 is lower than the previous year, and while we continue to work toward a goal of zero preventable drowning deaths on the WA coast, we recognise that this figure would be significantly higher were it not for the rescues performed by our lifesaving services.

Please note: All figures presented are sourced through the National Coronial Information System (NCIS), media and internal SLS systems. Currently, all cases included remain open in the NCIS and, as such, should be considered interim and subject to change once confirmed through both internal and the coronial investigations and validation processes.

Coastal drowning death: where the location of the drowning is on the coast, in the ocean up to 3NM offshore or inland up to five times the width of the inlet/river.

Ocean drowning death: where the location of the drowning is in the ocean between 3NM and 12NM (the Australian territorial water limit).

MARKETING & EVENTS



Marketing & Public Relations

We continue to leverage the iconic, highly regarded Surf Life Saving brand across our marketing and PR activities, which focus on supporting our mission of saving lives and building great communities.

This summer, we again participated in year two of the national beach safety campaign featuring Australian actor Angus Sampson, which was rolled out nationally across TV, print, online, and outdoor advertising.

With a primary target audience of men, who continue to be overrepresented in coastal drowning deaths, the STOP. LOOK. STAY ALIVE safety message encourages

beachgoers to prioritise their safety through specific actions and highlighting the surf lifesaving services and resources available to help keep them safe.

National partner QANTAS once again partnered with the online Beach Passport education initiative, further leveraging its reach across its owned assets, including in-flight and at airports.

We again delivered a comprehensive Woodside Nippers campaign across digital, print, and large-format outdoor advertising, driving club registrations and, in its first year of delivery, the All Abilities Woodside Nippers program. With

campaign resources provided to clubs to leverage the paid activity, the resultant content helps strengthen and solidify the highly regarded children's beach safety program.

A key focus of our PR activity remains building the profile of SLSWA, sharing beach and coastal safety initiatives and messages, and supporting our clubs and members in showcasing their work and its value to the community.

With a proactive and targeted approach, we were successfully able to achieve exceptional media coverage across a range of key areas and activities, including our 2025 Coastal Bravery Awards, the Westpac Life Saver Rescue Helicopter Services, summer lifesaving statistics, the heroic actions of our clubs and members in keeping West Australian beachgoers safe, our abalone patrols, and key beach safety messaging, in particular around recognised high risk activities and occasions.

As we seek to engage with our members, partners, and stakeholders, social media plays a key role in our strategy for communicating beach safety messaging, celebrating the achievements of our members and clubs, highlighting the contributions of our partners and stakeholders, and keeping the membership engaged and abreast of activities across the state.

This year, with an increased focus on short-form video content, we experienced positive growth and engagement across our social media platforms, including a nearly 50% increase in Instagram followers, a 9% increase on Facebook, a 14.5% increase on LinkedIn, and a 4.5% increase on YouTube.

Our X account continues to be a high-value platform for communicating timely beach safety messages, with our handle including reports of shark sightings and beach closures, helping people make better-informed decisions regarding beach use. The channel also continues to play an integral role in the state government's Shark Mitigation Strategy.

Our fortnightly My Beach eNewsletter is distributed to over 24,000 email addresses and remains central to sharing information with our membership and stakeholders.

Surf Life Saving Foundation

SLSWA is part of Surf Life Saving Australia's (SLSA) national fundraising program, which generates essential income to support frontline lifesaving services, volunteer development, community education, coastal safety initiatives, and the long-term sustainability of the movement. During the year, SLSA distributed almost \$10 million to state and territory centres. A significant milestone was the successful integration of the Surf Life Saving Foundation's fundraising operations into Surf Life Saving Australia, creating a more unified approach to supporter engagement, operational efficiency and investment in lifesaving outcomes.

SLSA further strengthened its position as one of the nation's most trusted charities, achieving a record RepTrak reputation score of 94.9. Supporter generosity was also reflected in outstanding Gifts in Wills growth, with online pledges increasing from 126 to 518 during the year. The estimated value of future bequests increased more than sixfold, demonstrating a growing commitment from supporters to help safeguard the future of surf lifesaving.

In March 2026, SLSA launched Red & Yellow Day, a national initiative celebrating volunteer surf lifesavers and promoting surf safety. More than 140 clubs, including several in WA, participated in the inaugural fundraising appeal to support local lifesaving activities, and local landmarks around Perth were lit up in the red and yellow to show their support.

Strong support from corporate partners continued, with Ampol raising more than \$433,000 for advanced lifesaving and emergency response training, including abalone patrols here in WA, while Isuzu UTE Australia helped drive the most successful Tax Appeal on record, contributing to more than \$665,900 being raised.

Grant activity in WA through the SLSA Grant Seeking Unit also continued to grow this year, with 32 club applications lodged and successful funding secured directly for WA clubs increased from \$58,973 last year to \$315,275 this year. The increased activity and funding outcomes are an encouraging reflection of the relationships being developed with clubs across the state.

Life & Sporting Hall of Fame Member Dinner

Once again, we were pleased to host our annual Life and Sporting Hall of Fame Member Dinner. Held in the Trigg Island SLSC rooms, the dinner brought together more than 50 members for an enjoyable evening of catching up, sharing stories, and celebrating our shared history.

The event continues to be a great opportunity for some of Surf Life Saving WA's longest-serving members to reconnect and hear about the organisation's achievements and highlights from the past year.

2026 *Winners*

Nearly 500 attendees representing WA's surf life saving clubs, partners, and stakeholders came together to celebrate the achievements of the season at the annual Surf Life Saving WA Awards of Excellence.

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE

Surf Life Saving Western Australia Inc. (SLSWA) is an incorporated body under the Associations Incorporation Act 2015 (WA) and is recognised as the official 'State Centre' and controlling authority for Surf Life Saving in Western Australia. SLSWA is subject to compliance with the Rules and Regulations of Surf Life Saving Australia Ltd (SLSA) and is recognised for administering and focusing on surf lifesaving in Western Australia (WA). This statement summarises SLSWA's governance practices that were in effect during the year, highlighting decisions and reporting in accordance within the Rules and Regulations of SLSWA.

Communications with Members

The SLSWA Board aims to ensure that members are kept informed of all major developments affecting surf lifesaving. Information is communicated to members through this document (SLSWA's Annual Report), bulletins, circulars, minutes and memorandums with respect to changes in business, financial position, future development, results and activities, and quarterly State Council meetings and member advisory board meetings. Electronic information is also available on the SLSWA website: www.mybeach.com.au

General Meetings of Members (State Council)

The State Council is the legal owner of SLSWA. Its role is to amend the SLSWA Constitution, review and elect the Board, review SLSWA's financial position and approve the strategic outcomes presented by the Board.

The State Council comprises the Chairman (President of the Board), Ms Heidi Gan OLY and a Club Delegate from each of the affiliated clubs in WA each with the right to vote at general meetings. The Chairman may exercise a casting vote but no deliberative vote. SLSWA Life Members, Board Members, and the Chief Executive Officer have the right to be present and to debate at general meetings, but not to vote. SLSWA full-time and honorary officers and individual members were allowed to attend general meetings as visitors. In addition to the AGM on 6 September 2025, the Board under Part 21, Para 21.1 of the SLSWA Constitution, convened two State Council meetings held on 14 June 2025 and 6 September 2025.

The Board is responsible to members for overall business performance. It enacts SLSWA's strategic direction and priorities to be both appropriate and achievable; ensures the financial viability and security of SLSWA; established the policy and regulatory framework for governing SLSWA; monitors organisational compliance with relevant legislation and regulations; assesses risks facing the organisation; and appoints committees and honorary officers to carry out aspects of their work.

The Board comprised the Chairman and seven Board Members who are individual members of SLSWA, each with the right to one vote on any question. The Chairman has a casting vote but no deliberative vote. These are honorary positions that attract no remuneration except for reimbursement of expenses such as telephone, travel and accommodation costs incurred whilst performing Board activities. Board Members are elected in accordance with Part 25, Para 25(a) of the SLSWA Constitution.

Conflict of Interest

In the event of any uncertainty as to whether it was necessary for a Board Member to refrain from discussions or voting, the issue was immediately determined by the Board.

Code of Conduct

The Board has in place a Code of Conduct contained in its Personnel Handbook which all full-time and honorary officers and committee members must adhere to. An induction program, including the provision of the handbook and member brochure was made available to all SLSWA personnel.

Chief Executive Officer

SLSWA's most senior employee, the Chief Executive Officer is appointed by the Board and is subject to annual performance reviews by the Board. The role is responsible for the day-to-day operations of SLSWA. Mr. James O'Toole was appointed to this position, officially commencing on 18 February 2015.

Committees of the Board

Committees and member advisory boards are constituted by Part 33 of the SLSWA Constitution to assist the Board in the discharge of its responsibilities. The committees and member advisory boards are for held for one-year term, this term being 2025/2026. The Australian Honours and Awards Committee Chair appointment is held for two-year term, this being 2024/2025, 2025/2026.

The role of each General Committee is to support the Board by providing advice in relation to the various objectives of that respective General Committee.

Australian Honours and Awards Committee

The Life Members and Awards Committee recommends to the Board nominations of individual members for SLSWA Life Membership, SLISA Life Membership, appropriate levels of Australian Honours and Awards. The committee comprised Timothy Tucak (Chair), Garry Williams, Stephen Carrick, Tracey Tenaglia and Bronwyn Meldrum (Nominee of the SLSWA CEO).

Lifesaving Committee

The Lifesaving Committee develops, monitors and reviews standards, policy and procedures relating to water safety, patrols, training and assessment. The committee comprised Richard Lisett (Chair), Mitchell Shackles, Maren Scriven, Pia Claudius (Resigned Feb), Patrick Rivers (invitee), Kai Libricky (Invitee) and Lachlan Olive (Nominee of the SLSWA CEO).

Sports Committee

The Surf Sports Advisory Committee selects finalists and winners for Awards of Excellence categories and makes recommendations through the CEO to the Board of Directors regarding the direction of surf sports in WA. The committee comprised Glenn Eldon (Chair), Aaron Bell, Christie Jones, Justin Meldrum and Graham Snook and Charlie Rigby (Nominee of the SLSWA CEO).

Development Committee

The Development Advisory Committee recommends initiatives to provide leadership opportunities and pathways to all members and clubs in WA and is involved in establishing good practice models for the development of our junior members. NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

For the year ended 30 April 2026

Note 1: Material accounting policy information

The accounting policies that are material to the company are set out below. The accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the previous financial year, unless otherwise stated.

New, revised or amending Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted

The Association has adopted all of the new, revised or amending Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

Any new, revised or amending Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted. The incorporated association's assessment of the impact of these new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations, most relevant to the incorporated association, are set out below.

AASB 18 Presentation and Disclosure in Financial Statements

This standard is applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2027 and early adoption is permitted. The standard replaces IAS 1 'Presentation of Financial Statements', with many of the original disclosure requirements retained and there will be no impact on the recognition and measurement of items in the financial statements. But the standard will affect presentation and disclosure in the financial statements, including introducing five categories in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income: operating, investing, financing, income taxes and discontinued operations. The standard introduces two mandatory sub-totals in the statement: 'Operating profit' and 'Profit before financing and income taxes'. There are also new disclosure requirements for 'management-defined performance measures', such as earnings before interest, taxes, depreciation and amortisation ('EBITDA') or 'adjusted profit'. The standard provides enhanced guidance on grouping of information (aggregation and disaggregation), including whether to present this information in the primary financial statements or in the notes. The incorporated association will adopt this standard from 1 January 2027 and it is expected that there will be a significant change to the layout of the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

The accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are consistent with those followed in the preparation of the Association's annual financial statements for the previous reporting period.

Basis of preparation

This financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards (including Australian Accounting Interpretations), other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board, the requirements of the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012 and the Associations Incorporation Act 2015.

The financial report covers Surf Life Saving Western Australia Inc. as an individual entity. Surf Life Saving Western Australia Inc. is an Association incorporated in Western Australia under the Associations Incorporation Act 2015.

The financial report of Surf Life Saving Western Australia Inc. as an individual entity complies with all Australian equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards (AIFRS) in their entirety. Compliance with AIFRS ensures compliance with International Financial Reporting Standards.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the Association in the preparation of the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

The accounting policies set out below have been consistently applied to all years presented.

Reporting Basis and Conventions

The financial report has been prepared on an accrual basis and is based on historical costs modified by the revaluation of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities for which the fair value basis of accounting has been applied. The amounts presented in the financial report are present in Australian dollars and have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

Accounting Policies

(a) Income Tax

The Association has obtained tax-exempt status under current Australian Taxation legislation

(b) Current and non-current classification

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification.

An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the Association's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash and cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

Notes to the Financial statements for the year ended 30 April 2026

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the Association's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

(c) Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value as indicated less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Property

Freehold land and buildings are recorded at their fair value (being the amount for which an asset could be exchanged between knowledgeable willing parties in an arm's length transaction), based on periodic, but at least triennial valuations by external independent valuers. During the intervening periods, the fair values are determined on the basis of a directors' valuation.

If the carrying amount of a class of assets is increased as a result of a revaluation, the net revaluation increase is credited to a revaluation reserve in equity. However, the net revaluation increase is recognised in the profit or loss to the extent that it reverses a net revaluation decrease of the same class of assets previously recognised in the profit or loss.

If the carrying amount of a class of assets has decreased as a result of a revaluation, the net revaluation is recognised in the profit or loss. However, the net revaluation decrease is debited to the revaluation reserve in equity to the extent of any credit balance existing in any revaluation surplus in respect of that same class of asset. The net revaluation decrease recognised in the revaluation reserve reduces the amount accumulated in equity.

Plant and Equipment

Plant and equipment is measured on the cost basis less depreciation and impairment losses.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by Directors to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the assets' employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to present values in determining recoverable amounts.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of plant and equipment, motor vehicles, fixtures and fittings, and buildings is depreciated on either a diminishing value or straight-line basis over the asset's useful life from the time the asset is held ready for use. Freehold land is not depreciated. The building component of land and buildings is depreciated over its estimated useful life.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets (excluding land and buildings) are:

Assets residual values and useful lives are reviewed and adjusted, if appropriate, at each balance date.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains and losses are included in the statement of comprehensive income.

(d) Impairment of Assets

At each reporting date, the Association reviews the carrying values of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the assets fair value less costs to sell and value-in-use, is compared to the assets carrying value. Any excess of the assets carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the statement of comprehensive income.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the Association estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Notes to the Financial statements for the year ended 30 April 2026

(e) Fair Value Measurement

When an asset or liability, financial or non-financial, is measured at fair value for recognition or disclosure purposes, the fair value is based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date; and assumes that the transaction will take place either: in the principal market; or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market.

Fair value is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming they act in their economic best interest. For non-financial assets, the fair value measurement is based on its highest and best use. Valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, are used, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

(f) Employee Benefits

Provision is made in respect of the Association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled, plus related on-costs. Employee benefits payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits.

(g) Revenue recognition

The Association recognises revenue as follows:

Revenue from contracts with customers

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the association is expected to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer. For each contract with a customer, the association: identifies the contract with a customer; identifies the performance obligations in the contract; determines the transaction price which takes into account estimates of variable consideration and the time value of money; allocates the transaction price to the separate performance obligations on the basis of the relative stand-alone selling price of each distinct good or service to be delivered; and recognises revenue when or as each performance obligation is satisfied in a manner that depicts the transfer to the customer of the goods or services promised.

Grants/ Sponsorship

Grant revenue is recognised in profit or loss when the Association satisfies the performance obligations stated within the funding agreements. If performance obligations are not sufficiently specific and enforceable, the Association recognises this revenue, at a point in time, which is generally on receipt.

Donations

Revenue from donations is recognised upon receipt of the funds.

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Volunteer services

The Association has elected not to recognise volunteer services as either revenue or other forms of contributions received. As such, any related consumption or capitalisation of such resources received is also not recognised.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(h) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

Cash flows are presented in the cash flow statement on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

(i) Financial assets

Initial recognition

Financial liabilities are classified, at initial recognition, as financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss, loans and borrowings or payables, as appropriate.

All financial liabilities are recognised initially at fair value and, in the case of loans and borrowings and payables, net of directly attributable transaction costs. The Association's financial liabilities include trade and other payables and accruals.

Notes to the Financial statements for the year ended 30 April 2026

Subsequent measurement

Trade and Other payables, Accruals

After initial recognition, trade and other payables and accruals are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Gains and losses are recognised in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income when the liabilities are derecognised.

Derecognition

A financial liability is derecognised when the associated obligation is discharged, cancelled or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognised in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

(j) Right of Use Assets

A right-of-use asset is recognised at the commencement date of a lease. The right-of-use asset is measured at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability, adjusted for, as applicable, any lease payments made at or before the commencement date net of any lease incentives received, any initial direct costs incurred, and, except where included in the cost of inventories, an estimate of costs expected to be incurred for dismantling and removing the underlying asset, and restoring the site or asset.

Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful life of the asset, whichever is the shorter. Where the Association expects to obtain ownership of the leased asset at the end of the lease term, the depreciation is over its estimated useful life. Right-of use assets are subject to impairment or adjusted for any remeasurement of lease liabilities.

The Association has elected not to recognise a right-of-use asset and corresponding lease liability for short-term leases with terms of 12 months or less and leases of low-value assets. Lease payments on these assets are expensed to profit or loss as incurred.

(k) Lease Liabilities

A lease liability is recognised at the commencement date of a lease. The lease liability is initially recognised at the present value of the lease payments to be made over the term of the lease, discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease or, if that rate cannot be readily determined, the Association's incremental borrowing rate. Lease payments comprise of fixed payments less any lease incentives receivable, variable lease payments that depend on an index or a rate, amounts expected to be paid under residual value guarantees, exercise price of a purchase option when the exercise of the option is reasonably certain to occur, and any anticipated termination penalties. The variable lease payments that do not depend on an index or a rate are expensed in the period in which they are incurred.

Lease liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. The carrying amounts are remeasured if there is a change in the following: future lease payments arising from a change in an index, or a rate used; residual guarantee; lease term; certainty of a purchase option and termination penalties. When a lease liability is remeasured, an adjustment is made to the corresponding right-of use asset, or to profit or loss if the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset is fully written down.

Note 2: Critical accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a material risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

Revenue Recognition & Timing

For grant funding received, the determination of whether the grant agreement includes sufficiently specific performance obligations and enforceability, was a significant judgement involving discussions with a number of parties at the Association and consideration of the terms and conditions within the agreement.

Grants received by the Association have been accounted for under both AASB 15 and AASB 1058 depending on the terms and conditions and decisions made. If this determination was changed, then the revenue recognition pattern would be different from that recognised in these financial statements.

Fair value measurement hierarchy

The Association is required to classify all assets and liabilities, measured at fair value, using a three level hierarchy, based on the lowest level of input that is significant to the entire fair value measurement, being: Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the entity can access at the measurement date; Level 2: Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly; and Level 3: Unobservable inputs for the asset or liability. Considerable judgement is required to determine what is significant to fair value and therefore which category the asset or liability is placed in can be subjective.

The fair value of assets and liabilities classified as level 2 is determined by the use of valuation models. Land and buildings have been valued based on similar assets, location and market conditions.

Impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill and other indefinite life intangible assets

The Association assesses impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill and other indefinite life intangible assets at each reporting date by evaluating conditions specific to the Association and to the particular asset that may lead to impairment. If an impairment trigger exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined. This involves fair value less costs of disposal or value-in-use calculations, which incorporate a number of key estimates and assumptions.

Employee benefits provision

The liability for employee benefits expected to be settled more than 12 months from the reporting date are recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

Incremental borrowing rate

Where the interest rate implicit in a lease cannot be readily determined, an incremental borrowing rate is estimated to discount future lease payments to measure the present value of the lease liability at the lease commencement date. Such a rate is based on what the Association estimates it would have to pay a third party to borrow the funds necessary to obtain an asset of a similar value to the right-of-use asset, with similar terms, security and economic environment.

Estimate of Useful Life of PPE

The incorporated association determines the estimated useful lives and related depreciation and amortisation charges for its property, plant and equipment and finite life intangible assets. The useful lives could change significantly as a result of technical innovations or some other event. The depreciation and amortisation charge will increase where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives, or technically obsolete or non-strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold will be written off or written down.

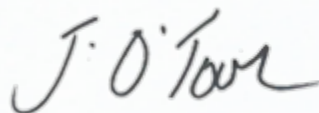
