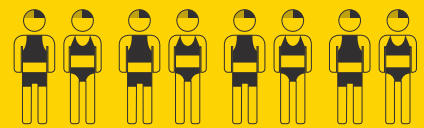

On behalf of the Board of Surf Life Saving WA, it gives us great pleasure to present our 2024/25 Annual Report. As we reflect on the past year and note the many achievements across all facets of our movement, there is much to be proud of.

This year, with the Board and management, we reviewed and updated our strategic plan for 2025 – 2030. Our mission of saving lives and building great communities, underpinned by our strategic goals of zero preventable drowning deaths on the WA coast, and supporting an inclusive and vibrant surf life saving community, remains our focus and drives all that we do.

This season on our beaches, our lifesaving services performed nearly 900 rescues, including more than 200 on just one weekend in January, a truly incredible result. Each of these rescues represents a near miss and a potential life saved, clearly demonstrating that our services are more critical than ever.

Sadly, we still see too many lives lost on our coast. With the help of our members and stakeholders, we will continue to deliver initiatives that aim to reduce this toll and achieve our strategic goal of zero preventable drowning deaths.

Ensuring we remain connected with our regional members continues to be a focus area for the Board. This season, we visited many of our regional clubs including Esperance Goldfields, Denmark, Broome, Dampier, Geraldton, Champion Bay, and Bunbury, and it was inspiring to see the fantastic work our clubs are doing out there.

We also congratulate Esperance Goldfields, Albany, and Broome on their recent club redevelopments and openings. Appropriate and fit-for-purpose facilities are a critical component of the lifesaving services we provide.

Instrumental in everything achieved this season are our corporate partners and stakeholders. We are proud of the longstanding partnerships we have built and grateful for the unwavering support they afford us. None of the achievements outlined in this report would be possible without them.

This season, we are very proud to have extended our relationship with Woodside Energy, which renewed its support for a further five years and expanded it to include our Woodside Jet Ski Program, while Healthway signed on to support our summer surf sports season for a further three years, promoting the Fuel to Go & Play message.

We also continue to work closely with the WA Government through several departments, and this support is essential in helping us deliver many key initiatives that underpin our mission.

And finally, to our more than 24,300 members across Western Australia, you are the heart of our movement, and we thank you for the unwavering passion you demonstrate in all that you do.

SURF LIFESAVERS

Recreating along our coastline plays an important role in the West Australian lifestyle. Through the delivery of beach patrols, emergency response, and water safety services, surf lifesavers are critical to helping the community enjoy aquatic recreational activity more safely. The number of rescues performed each season is a key reason beach users return home alive. Our surf lifesavers are brave and selfless members of their local community. We commend their continued dedication to the organisation.

The statistics recorded this year highlight the outstanding outcomes in what has been one of the busiest seasons in recent times. Surf lifesavers with proficient skills increased by 9% which assisted in achieving a 10% increase in patrol hours committed. Despite a near 20% increase in preventative actions, the number of rescues performed was almost 40% higher than the previous year.

Despite the numerous positive outcomes, with almost 13,000 km of coastline, there is still more to be done to ensure the safety of West Australian beach users.

Supported by the Government of Western Australia and proudly partnered by Westpac, the Westpac Life Saver Rescue Helicopter Service (WLRHS) continues to deliver critical safety outcomes for West Australians recreating along the state's coast. This service remains at the apex of the WA Government Shark Hazard Mitigation Strategy.

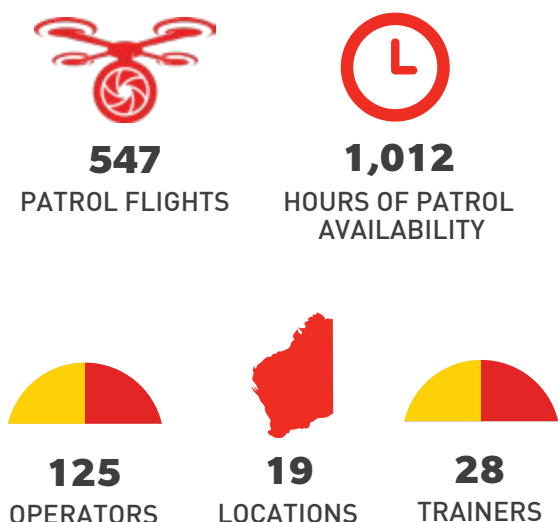
Operating from Rous Head, Fremantle and Busselton Margaret River Airport, the service provides comprehensive aerial patrol and emergency response capabilities from Yanchep to Port Bouvard and from Bunbury to Hamelin Bay. These two aircraft cover some

of the most heavily visited coastal stretches in the state, supporting the more than 30 on-ground lifesaving and lifeguard operations within this area.

A standout operational outcome this season was the 137% year-on-year increase in search and rescue taskings, rising from 27 missions in 2023/24 to 64 this season. This marked increase highlights both the growing demand for aerial emergency response and the critical role that the helicopters play in supporting emergency services and protecting lives along the WA coast.



Drone Patrol



The continued integration of localised drone operations into lifesaving services provides operational benefits through improving the availability of real-time situational awareness and response capabilities to on-beach patrols.

Through the support of a Lotterywest grant, the program has benefited from improved access to equipment and increased operational activity. This has led to an improvement in the availability of member training and the development of club-based trainers.

These initiatives have seen a positive increase in the use of drones to support delivery of lifesaving services, demonstrated by a 33% increase in the hours that a beach patrol had access to a drone operator and equipment, a 135% increase in the number of drone patrol flights, and a 27% increase in the number of clubs integrating drones into their operations this season. These results demonstrate that integration of this lifesaving strategy is moving toward becoming a normalised part of lifesaving operations.

SurfCom

Key to SLSWA operational communications is the state-wide communication and operations control team, known as SurfCom. SurfCom supports volunteer lifesaving and SLSWA centre operations, plus multiple external agencies, including but not limited to WA Police, St John Ambulance WA, Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions, Department of Primary & Regional Development Shark Response units, and nine metropolitan and regional local government areas.

SurfCom is responsible for coordinating requests for emergency tasking (13SURF), undertakes operational asset tracking and distress monitoring, incident logging and recording, monitoring Emergency Rescue Communications (ERCN), and recording of operational data that assists with operational situational awareness and analysis.

Surf Alert Modules (SAMs)

SurfCom continues to provide support to the seven (7) SAMs located along our coast at Claytons Beach, Leighton Beach, Falcon Bay, Pyramids Beach, Picnic Cove, Twilight Beach and Whyllie Bay.

Remotely operated by SurfCom, these units enhance beach user safety through key features including LED safety messaging screens, audible alerts, shark alarms, and direct intercom access to SurfCom for real-time communication and incident coordination.

13SURF and St John Ambulance First Responder Program

As a conduit to seek first response and request operational support of relevant lifesaving services in a coastal emergency, 13SURF provides external emergency response agencies (specifically St John Ambulance WA and WA Police) with direct access to SLSWA SurfCom operations.

During the 2024/25 season, the 13SURF hotline received 149 calls for operational support. Surf lifesavers were able to respond to 80 requests, committing 50 hours.

Capital Equipment Support Program

Through the Department of Fire and Emergency Services, the WA Government supports the delivery capabilities of our lifesaving services via the SLSWA Lifesaving Capital Equipment Support program, which provided the following valuable resources to clubs this season:

- Six (6) x Jet Skis
- Eight (8) x Side by Side Vehicles (SSVs); and
- Five (5) x Inflatable Rescue Boats (IRBs)

Along with the support of the WA Government, this season, SLSWA partner Woodside Energy extended its partnership to become a key supporter of our Jet Ski operations. The Jet Ski is an integral component of club lifesaving services. It is central to providing efficient and effective emergency response and search and rescue operations, with our respected and highly skilled operators often called upon by external agencies such as the WA Water Police to support emergency response operations.

Supported and facilitated by SLSWA, 26 clubs integrate this equipment into their planned service arrangements and out-of-hours emergency response.

This season, club volunteers dedicated over 2,480 hours to operating jet skis during lifesaving service activities, including crucial support for the four abalone fishing sessions.

Abalone fishing is a popular yet dangerous Western Australian recreational fishing activity, with thousands of individuals being issued with a fishing licence each season. This activity remains one of the most tightly regulated fishing activities in the world, with WA's West Coast Zone only open for four sessions of one hour each (7-8 am), between December and February each year.

With many fishers unfamiliar with the areas in which they harvest the abalone and little to no swimming ability placing them at high risk, the prevention, rescue and emergency response actions delivered by SLSWA and

our lifesavers at these sessions are the single most crucial factor in their safety.

To deliver these services, 16 clubs were involved through planned and coordinated actions underpinned by Local Operating Plans and Hazardous Surf Forecast Assessments and each fishing session was supported on average by:

- 210 surf lifesavers
- 800 person-hours
- 3 drones
- 30 powercraft (Jet Skis and IRB)
- Westpac Life Saver Rescue Helicopter Service

To support the participation by surf lifesavers, the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development, via the Recreational Fishing Fund, maintains a service agreement with SLSWA. This support is received with thanks. This season marked the final year of a three-year agreement.

Surf sports play a key role in the Surf Life Saving movement developing the necessary skills to carry out surf lifesaving's core purpose – saving lives.

Annually, thousands of members utilise and challenge their lifesaving skills in a competitive sporting environment by participating in various surf sports events throughout the year.

Key Events & Activities

The 2024/25 surf sports season delivered a strong and engaging program, with 48 events held across the state, providing athletes with a valuable platform to refine their skills and compete at a high level throughout the year.

Many clubs took on the responsibility of hosting events, with the support of SLSWA where needed. This approach not only enabled increased club involvement but also provided opportunities for clubs to build capacity in event management and generate additional revenue.

This season, as we renewed our longstanding partnership with Healthway for a further three years, and it also marked the transition to a new naming rights health message, from SunSmart to Fuel to Go & Play. We look forward to continuing to work with the team at Healthway to share this healthy eating message with the membership across the coming seasons.

Fuel to Go & Play Regional Nipper Championships

The Fuel to Go & Play Regional Nipper Championships continued to provide an important opportunity for young nippers to get involved in surf sports within their local communities. Held throughout January and February, the events were hosted across four regional locations: Champion Bay (Mid West), Mandurah (Peel), City of Bunbury (South West), and Denmark (Great Southern). Each host club played a key role in delivering a successful event, welcoming and supporting more than 500 enthusiastic participants from the U8 to U13 age groups.

These regional championships also provide an additional qualification pathway to our Fuel to Go & Play WA Nipper Championships.

Fuel to Go & Play WA Surf League

The Fuel to Go & Play WA Surf League continues to attract high levels of participation with a total of 852 entries across the three-event series. Delivered at multiple locations to provide varied conditions, this season's program featured slightly shorter distances and, kicking off the summer sport season, offered abundant racing opportunities for athletes, serving as a selection opportunity for the Western Suns representative teams.

Officials and Coaches

SLSWA has continued to expand and enhance its coaching and officiating programs through a range of initiatives aimed at supporting both metropolitan and regional clubs. These initiatives included inviting High-Performance coaches from Surf Life Saving Australia to share their expertise, giving local participants exposure to diverse coaching styles that they can apply, from Woodside Nippers to advanced athlete development.

With funding received from the Department of Sport & Recreation, we were able to help fund nine surf boat sweeps to attend the ASRL Sweeps Academy in NSW to refine their skills.

With this same funding, we were also able to help the R&R group deliver a successful two-day workshop for over 95 participants, while Fremantle SLSC hosted a Core Officials course that trained 55 new officials. These programs have significantly boosted capability and collaboration across clubs.

Further support has been directed to clubs across the state, from the Great Southern to the Mid West, to address gaps in coaching and officiating development, with a total of 87 individuals (46 males and 41 females) completing training workshops during the season. Of these, 31 were from regions where access to training is often limited, helping bridge the opportunity gap.

The participant data reflects a wide age range and gender diversity, demonstrating the reach and inclusivity of the initiative. These efforts ensure clubs across WA are better equipped to deliver safe, engaging, and high-quality surf sports programs at all levels.



WA Championships Events

WA Board Riding Championships

Held in June at Scarborough Beach, the 2024 Championships saw some of the best conditions in recent years, with large, clean waves that made for thrilling competition, highlighting the skill of competitors. Trigg Island claimed the overall first position, with Sorrento in second, and North Cottesloe third.

WA Pool Rescue Championships

The 2024 WA Pool Rescue Championships were once again held at Perth's HPC and featured some impressive racing by athletes, including two of Australia's best in Trigg Island's Jake Smith & Harrison Hynes. Over the day and a half of competition, we saw many athletes from Nippers through to masters take home their first medals.

Overall, Sorrento took home their fourth consecutive Champion Club title, but not without fierce competition from Cottesloe in second, and Scarboro in third.

These Championships held additional significance as they served as the selection event for the Western Suns Pool Rescue team.

WA IRB Racing Championships

The WA IRB Racing Championships at Trigg Beach saw thrilling competition, with exciting conditions throughout the day testing the team's skills. Mullaloo came out on top, securing their eighth consecutive Champion Club pennant, followed by Fremantle and Coogee Beach, rounding out the top three.

Fuel to Go & Play WA Endurance Championships

Taking place in mid-October, with both ocean and beach events held at Leighton Beach, this event is the first major hit out for the championship season. With a healthy 462 competitors across all disciplines aged U12 – 70+, the slightly rough conditions meant for some fun racing on the day, with Sorrento awarded Champion Club.

Fuel to Go & Play WA Country Championships

The WA Country Championships, held in Bunbury over the January long weekend, brought together 230 competitors from 15 regional clubs. While Friday's swell was looking daunting, the waves calmed by Saturday, offering a fun and exciting environment for competitors.

City of Bunbury dominated the event, winning the overall point score with 879 points, followed by Mandurah on 277 and Secret Harbour with 271 points. This event highlighted the talent and sportsmanship of regional clubs, making for a thrilling weekend of surf life saving competition.



Fuel to Go & Play WA Masters Championships

The Masters Championships, held at Sorrento Beach over two days, saw 334 competitors showcasing their skills across multiple events. The two-day format provided a great atmosphere for both competitors and spectators alike, especially for the country clubs who travelled in for the weekend.

Mullaloo emerged victorious, taking first place with 573 points, followed by Trigg Island in second and Sorrento in third.

Fuel to Go & Play WA Little Nippers Championships

Held at Fremantle Beach in February, the Little Nipper Championships saw an exciting display of young talent, with 462 participants aged U8 and U9, representing 20 different clubs. The competition featured a variety of events, including beach sprints, beach flags, board races, and swim.

Perfect conditions on the day made for an enjoyable and competitive atmosphere, highlighting the spirit of sportsmanship and camaraderie amongst the participants.

Fuel to Go & Play WA Nipper Championships

The Nipper Championships over the March long weekend at Trigg Beach were held under perfect, sunny conditions, creating a fantastic atmosphere for both competitors and spectators. With an impressive 866 competitors, the championships were a celebration of talent, teamwork, and great sportsmanship.

Sorrento claimed the Nipper Champion Club title for the fifth consecutive year, while North Cottesloe finished in second, ahead of Mullaloo in third. Mullaloo was also recognised as the Nipper Handicap winner for the most improved club, adding to the excitement of the weekend.

Fuel to Go & Play WA Surf Life Saving Championships – Youth/Open

The 2025 Youth and Open Championships saw over 1,200 athletes compete across two weekends of thrilling competition. Trigg held the beach events, followed by City Beach with the ocean events. City of Perth SLSC proudly hosted as part of their 100-year celebrations, the milestone setting added a special sense of occasion to what is already the pinnacle event on the surf sport calendar.

With intense competition across all disciplines and age groups, the championships highlighted the impressive depth of talent across the state, while livestreaming both days of competition showcased the athletes' performances to a broader audience.

Sorrento emerged as the overall winner, claiming the club's first-ever Championship banner, in addition to the Handicap title and the Champion Youth Club, closing out an impressive and dominant season of sport.



Western Suns State Teams

SLSWA supported 95 athletes across the representative teams for Pool Rescue, Surf Boats, Ocean/Beach, Pathway Cup, as well as two Super Surf League Teams, the Broome Pearlers and Scarborough Sunsets.

Delivering some of the biggest surf seen at this competition in many years, our Western Suns Youth/Open team took on the SLSA Interstate Championships at Wanda, NSW, in December 2024, delivering some fantastic performances in the water and on the sand.

Despite the running track being thoroughly washed away due to the large surf, our beach athletes performed well with both Holly Fraser & Emma Atwell taking second placings in the Beach Flags, and our Open Mixed Beach Relay team also finishing with a silver medal.

Overall, the team performed well, and as our youngest team ever selected, the experience gained will stand them in good stead for years to come.

NIPPERS & YOUTH



Woodside Nippers

The past season saw a total of 8,421 Nippers enrolled in the Woodside Nippers program across our 31 clubs, marking growth from the previous season. Several regional clubs also experienced substantial increases, with Busselton, Dalyellup Beach, and Esperance Goldfields each recording growth of 20% or more.

We were also delighted to renew our highly successful partnership with Woodside for a further five years, through until 2028/29. This partnership continues to provide invaluable support to our Nippers and clubs across WA, helping teach vital beach safety skills to young West Australians.

Youth Program

SLSWA's Youth Programs, for members aged U14-U17, continue to engage young members across all pillars of surf life saving, and provide clubs with a framework to run engaging and purposeful sessions on Sunday mornings. This season, 1,918 youth members were involved across the Programs.

The Youth Leaders Program (YLP) is an opt-in initiative that enables participants to progress through three achievement levels: Bronze, Silver, and Gold. This season, 25 members achieved the Bronze level, 13 the Silver level, and 23 reached the Gold level. These achievements were celebrated at the 2025 Nipper & Youth Awards.

Many of these exceptional young members continue to develop their leadership skills by taking on roles within their clubs, contributing to the future of surf life saving in WA.

A range of Youth Pathway Courses were also delivered, introducing youth members to the roles available to them as they progress through their journey in surf life saving. Delivered both in person and online, allowing for a strong representation of members from both metropolitan and regional clubs, the following attendance was demonstrated:

- Youth Age Manager/Coach – 50 participants
- Youth Trainer – 25 participants
- Youth Official – 37 participants

Youth Development Camps

The annual Rise-Up and TOAD camps were successfully held throughout December and January at the South West Development Centre (SWDC), which once again proved to be an ideal venue for delivering these activities.

The Rise-Up camp welcomed 59 U17 members, who kicked off their experience with a series of games and ice-breaker activities to build connections. Over the following days, participants took part in adventurous challenges, such as abseiling and coasteering, which encouraged them to push their limits and develop resilience. They also completed a bridging course to upgrade their Bronze Medallion to First Aid Certificate, a prerequisite for the Advanced Resuscitation Techniques Certificate.

The TOAD camp hosted 60 youth members from the U14 and U15 age groups. During their stay, participants earned their Radio Operators Certificate and engaged in a variety of team-building activities. Highlights included coasteering, surfing, and the ever-popular nightly game of spotlight, creating a memorable and enjoyable experience for all involved.

We are once again incredibly grateful to the Scottish Masonic Charitable Foundation of WA for their generous and ongoing sponsorship, which continues to make these opportunities for our Youth members possible.

Youth Committee

This season, the Board established the new Youth Committee, comprising U17 members, to provide feedback on programs and initiatives for their peers. With the SLSWA Development Committee setting objectives for the Youth Committee, the resultant cross-collaboration enabled a valuable youth perspective to be brought to the table.

The committee met five times during the season, also having the opportunity to sit with the SLSWA Board and share ideas, including initiatives to help clubs increase youth participation and retain youth members.

TRAINING & EDUCATION



MEMBERS

Member Awards

This season, SLSWA volunteer Trainers, Assessors, and Facilitators (TAFs) delivered over 3,000 awards to club members, providing them with the skills, knowledge and awareness to deliver essential lifesaving and emergency response services for their club and community.

This season also saw the rollout of the Silver Medallion Aquatic Rescue (SMAR) course to clubs after trials were conducted throughout the previous season. This training provides enhanced rescue skills, including rock entries, search patterns, and underwater patient recovery. Over 100 members gained their SMAR qualification during the season.

Following a national update in IRB operations, there was a focus this season on upgrading powercraft TAFs, IRB drivers, and IRB crew to be trained in the new skill requirements. The new skills include refined rescue techniques and IRB patient approach procedures. SLSWA representatives have been active in providing feedback to

the Surf Life Saving Australia (SLSA) Powercraft Advisory Group, contributing to the ongoing development of IRB and RWC operations.

Thanks to a grant from Lotterywest, SLSWA continues to expand drone operations through developing TAFs to train members within their own clubs, as well as offering centralised course opportunities. Through these training pathways, the SLSWA Drone Program has now extended to 19 clubs with 28 TAFs and 125 operators.

SLSWA has continued to offer free HLTAID011 Provide First Aid and HLTAID015 Provide Advanced Resuscitation and Oxygen Therapy Units of Competency to members with assistance from the Federal Government's Vocational Education and Training (VET) Funding grant. This nationally accredited training was delivered to 528 members this season. Providing these nationally accredited emergency response awards offers the opportunity for volunteer club members to develop their lifesaving skills while also increasing the patrolling capacity of surf clubs.

Rookie Lifeguard Program

This season marked the fifth year of delivering the Rookie Lifeguard Program, held at the South West Development Centre with 30 members from metropolitan and regional clubs.

The program provided hands-on training across key operational areas, including the Woodside Jet Ski Team, Westpac Life Saver Rescue Helicopter, advanced rescue skills, and leadership development.

For the first time, the program provided participants the opportunity to gain the Silver Medallion in Aquatic Rescue, a significant advancement that bolstered their readiness for frontline lifeguard service.

Upon completion of the Rookie Lifeguard program, ten Rookies were selected for the Immersion Program, gaining on-the-job experience alongside professional SLSWA Lifeguards at iconic locations such as Rottnest Island and Smiths Beach.

Youth Lifeguard Program

The 2024/25 season saw the further expansion of the SLSWA Lifeguard Academy with the introduction of the Youth Lifeguard Program. This two-day program for U14/15 youth members offers a fun and interactive introduction to SLSWA's Lifesaving Services, featuring a range of activities designed to help attendees develop essential skills and knowledge for a career in the industry.

Activities include advanced surf and ocean skills training, introduction to powercraft, including Jet Skis and IRBs, insight into professional Lifeguarding, as well as first aid and emergency response training.



Nipper Lifeguard Program

In its second year, over 30 participants took part in the one-day Nipper Lifeguard Program. For U13 Nippers, the day offers a range of engaging activities that introduce the lifesaving skills and knowledge applicable to working as a Lifeguard while developing relationships with members from other clubs and having fun.

Activities delivered in the program included practical surf skills and basic first aid sessions, as well as information related to Lifeguard and powercraft operations, and the Westpac Life Saver Rescue Helicopter service. These sessions were delivered by a range of presenters, including Lifeguards, helicopter crew, and SLSWA Instructors, and provided an insight into surf life saving opportunities beyond the Woodside Nippers program.



Young Leaders Camp

In August 2024, the inaugural Young Leaders Camp was hosted at the South West Development Centre in Margaret River. Hosting 19 up-and-coming leaders between the ages of 18 and 25, the camp provided valuable opportunities for learning and networking.

Workshops covering topics such as leadership styles, emotional intelligence, and conflict negotiation, while a panel discussion with SLSWA President Heidi Gan, Board Member Jack Dowie, and former SLSWA Development Committee Chair Angela Razvi, provided attendees with the opportunity to ask questions about leadership and the panellists' experiences in surf life saving.

The coasteering activity, undertaken in challenging conditions, tested lifesaving skills and also put into practice new leadership skills acquired over the weekend. The camp was ultimately a great success and will continue into future seasons.

SLSA Masterclass

The annual SLSA Masterclass was held at the University of South Australia from 24 – 28 July, 2024. For members aged 30 and above who hold senior leadership roles in surf life saving, the program aims to provide participants with strategic thinking concepts and tools, as well as equip them to better lead within their club or workplace.

SLSWA continues to support its members' attendance at the Masterclass by fully subsidising two representatives from WA. Last season, those representatives were Kate Hutchison (Swanbourne Nedlands) and Shaun Caruana (Busselton).

SLSA National Leadership College

During the last week of January 2025, 24 young surf lifesavers from across Australia and New Zealand came together in Sydney for the annual SLSA National Leadership College, a week-long program designed to develop leadership skills and foster connections among our young, emerging leaders within surf life saving.

SLSWA continues to support its members' attendance at the Leadership College by fully subsidising the successful West Australian applicants. This year, WA was represented by Dominic Bertschinger (Swanbourne Nedlands), Julian Ming (North Cottesloe), and Nikita Fredonnet (City of Perth).



COMMUNITY First Aid Training

SLSWA continues to provide First Aid and emergency response training to members, as well as community and corporate customers. As a Registered Training Organisation (RTO 51104), we deliver nationally Vocational Education and Training (VET) accredited First Aid Units of Competency, including HLTAID011 Provide First Aid, to the Western Australian community. We also deliver non-accredited training, including the Community Surf Rescue Certificate, which is a recognised award for teachers and instructors delivering training, coaching, or education sessions in an open water environment.

This season, SLSWA also completed RTO re-registration, which is a requirement for all RTOs every seven years. This is an intensive process that involves a compliance audit of all aspects of course delivery and administration. Following the successful outcome of the audit, SLSWA is now registered through to 2031.

BeachSAFE Presentations

Surf Life Saving WA's "Introduction to BeachSAFE" presentations teach surf awareness and ocean safety to groups from schools, universities, and community organisations that may have limited access to the ocean. These sessions provide safety information regarding beach and ocean conditions, marine life, and environmental factors.

BeachSAFE presentations can be classroom-based or delivered on the beach, to be combined with practical sessions to offer basic surf skills and awareness to course participants.

SurfBabies & SurfKids

The SurfBabies and SurfKids programs provide a fun opportunity for children and their parents to participate in beach activities, develop basic surf sense, and build confidence to recreate in the ocean safely.

Open to children aged 2-7, these programs are held on Saturday mornings over two six-week series commencing in October and February. This season saw the program delivered to 1,020 participants in eight beach locations of Alkimos, Busselton, Coogee, Cottesloe, Leighton, Mullaloo, Sorrento, and Quinns.

BeachSAFE Communities

In November 2024, Stockland announced its acquisition of several Lendlease communities across Australia, including Alkimos Beach and Alkimos Vista, with a commitment to continue its support for the delivery of our highly successful BeachSAFE programs for the 2025/26 season.

Celebrating the eleventh year of the partnership, this coastal aquatic safety initiative helps develop essential

life skills and build awareness and confidence in residents through the delivery of vital beach safety and First Aid programs. The first of its kind in Australia, we are proud to celebrate its 11th year in 2024/25

Please note: All figures presented are sourced through the National Coronial Information System (NCIS), media and internal SLS systems. Currently, all cases included remain open in the NCIS and, as such, should be considered interim and subject to change once confirmed through both internal and the coronial investigations and validation processes.

Coastal drowning death: where the location of the drowning is on the coast, in the ocean up to 3NM offshore or inland up to five times the width of the inlet/river.

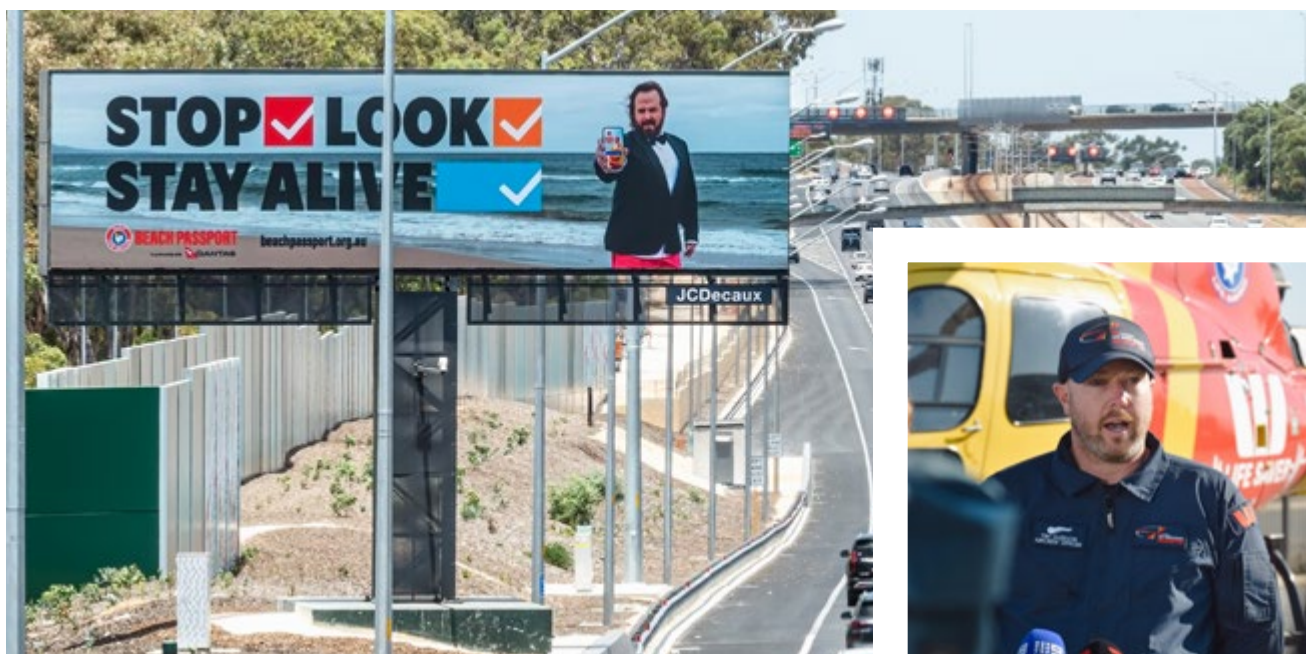
Ocean drowning death: where the location of the drowning is in the ocean between 3NM and 12NM (the Australian territorial water limit).

SLSWA collects and analyses coastal drowning data to identify trends and support evidence-based decision-making for drowning prevention efforts. Data is collected through media monitors and confirmed through the National Coronial Information System (NCIS).

The figure of 27 is higher than the previous year, and while we continue to work toward a goal of zero preventable drowning deaths on the WA coast, we recognise that this figure would be significantly higher were it not for the rescues performed by our lifesaving services.

MARKETING & EVENTS



Marketing

Surf Life Saving WA continues to focus on marketing activities underpinned by our mission of saving lives and building great communities, and ensuring the iconic and highly respected Surf Life Saving brand remains central in all that we do.

This summer, we participated in the national safety campaign starring Australian actor Angus Sampson. Launched in November, the STOP. LOOK. STAY ALIVE campaign was rolled out nationally across TV, print, online, and outdoor advertising mediums.

With a primary target audience of men, who continue to be overrepresented in coastal drowning deaths, the campaign aimed to encourage beachgoers to make safety a priority when going to the beach, highlighting the surf life saving services and resources available to help keep them safe.

The campaign also partnered with new national partner Qantas to unveil the Beach Passport, a free, online beach safety educational tool. Available in both adult and child versions and multiple languages, the Passport was designed to equip every beachgoer with basic beach safety

knowledge. Qantas also offered everyone who completed the Beach Passport 150 Qantas Points, along with the opportunity to go in the draw for 1 million points.

Nationally, West Australians accounted for 12% of the Beach Passport completions.

We also continue to invest in marketing activities to support club membership, specifically with a focus on our Woodside Nippers program. This season, we again delivered a multi-channel marketing campaign utilising print, social, digital and out-of-home advertising mediums to support club recruitment efforts. Clubs were also provided with a range of digital resources to leverage this activity across their own channels and activities.

Thanks to our partnerships with Woodside Energy and Westpac, we were also afforded exciting opportunities to feature in their campaigns over summer, providing some exceptional brand visibility during this peak summer period, helping the surf life saving and beach safety message to remain top of mind for West Australian beachgoers.

Digital & Social Media

As we seek to engage with our members, partners, and stakeholders, both digital and social media play a key role in our strategy for communicating beach safety messaging, celebrating the achievements of our members and clubs, highlighting the contributions of our partners and stakeholders, and keeping the membership engaged and abreast of activities across the state.

This year, we experienced positive growth and engagement across our social media platforms, including a 7% increase in Facebook followers, nearly 14% on Instagram, 14.5% on LinkedIn, and 17.5% on YouTube.

Our X account continues to play a key role in delivering up-to-date and timely beach safety messages, including shark sightings and beach closures, helping people make better-informed decisions regarding beach use, and it continues to play an integral role in the state government's Shark Mitigation Strategy.

We also communicate year-round with our clubs, members and stakeholders via our fortnightly My Beach eNewsletter, distributed to over 23,500 email addresses, and our weekly Club News to club committees and administrators.

Media & Public Relations

We have had another successful year in the media, achieving exceptional coverage as we've continued to take a proactive and targeted approach to sharing stories highlighting the activities and achievements of our members and services across all four pillars of the organisation.

With the weekly updating and release of national and state lifesaving and drowning statistics across the summer period, we were able to deliver timely media updates, helping keep beach safety messaging at the forefront of beachgoers' minds.

This approach also enabled us to capitalise on the activities of our lifesaving services, highlighting the critical role they play in keeping West Australian beachgoers safe.

We also achieved excellent coverage of the achievements of our members across a breadth of areas, through our Nipper & Youth Awards, Awards of Excellence, and the accomplishments of athletes in the surf sports arena.

Surf Life Saving Foundation

In July 2024, Surf Life Saving WA (SLSWA) proudly rejoined Surf Life Saving Australia (SLSA)'s national fundraising programs, marking a significant shift back to nationally integrated fundraising. This decision followed an 18-month collaborative journey with SLSA, ensuring alignment with best-practice fundraising standards and providing a guaranteed financial distribution for the term of the fundraising agreement. The move reflects SLSA's transformation into a national leader in fundraising excellence and offers SLSWA increased scale, reduced risk, and greater reach, benefiting both WA surf life saving clubs (SLSCs) and local supporters.

Since the transition, SLSA has maintained a strong focus on community engagement, ensuring fundraising activity continues under SLSWA branding and speaks directly to local supporters.

WA donors were thoughtfully transitioned to the national Guardians of the Surf regular giving program, and many received a dedicated supporter tier in recognition of their contributions. State-specific content was a hallmark of two successful campaigns - the Seasonal and Tax Appeal campaigns. The SLSWA Autumn Newsletter, delivered as part of a personalised supporter journey, celebrated the impact of volunteer surf lifesavers across WA and reinforced the vital role community contributions play in keeping WA beaches safer.

As part of the new national fundraising arrangement, SLSWA now also benefits from the expertise of SLSA's Grant Seeking Unit (GSU), a dedicated national service that helps SLSCs access vital grassroots funding. The GSU offers a suite of services to the clubs, including grant writing, proofreading, acquittal support, and funding opportunity research, completely free of charge. To date, 13 of SLSWA's 31 clubs have received tailored support, resulting in successful funding for a wide range of initiatives that have strengthened club capacity.

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE

Surf Life Saving Western Australia Inc. (SLSWA) is an incorporated body under the Associations Incorporation Act 2015 (WA) and is recognised as the official 'State Centre' and controlling authority for Surf Life Saving in Western Australia. SLSWA is subject to compliance with the Rules and Regulations of Surf Life Saving Australia Ltd (SLSA) and is recognised for administering and focusing on surf lifesaving in Western Australia (WA). This statement summarises SLSWA's governance practices that were in effect during the year, highlighting decisions and reporting in accordance within the Rules and Regulations of SLSWA.

Communications with Members

The SLSWA Board aims to ensure that members are kept informed of all major developments affecting surf lifesaving. Information is communicated to members through this document (SLSWA's Annual Report), bulletins, circulars, minutes and memorandums with respect to changes in business, financial position, future development, results and activities, and quarterly State Council meetings and member advisory board meetings. Electronic information is also available on the SLSWA website: www.mybeach.com.au

General Meetings of Members (State Council)

The State Council is the legal owner of SLSWA. Its role is to amend the SLSWA Constitution, review and elect the Board, review SLSWA's financial position and approve the strategic outcomes presented by the Board.

The State Council comprises the Chairman (President of the Board), Ms Heidi Gan OLY and a Club Delegate from each of the affiliated clubs in WA each with the right to vote at general meetings. The Chairman may exercise a casting vote but no deliberative vote. SLSWA Life Members, Board Members, and the Chief Executive Officer have the right to be present and to debate at general meetings, but not to vote. SLSWA full-time and honorary officers and individual members were allowed to attend general meetings as visitors. In addition to the AGM on 7 September 2024, the Board under Part 21, Para 21.1 of the SLSWA Constitution, convened two State Council meetings held on 15 June 2024 and 7 September 2024.

Board Members are elected in accordance with Part 25, Para 25(a) of the SLSWA Constitution.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

For the year ended 30 April 2025

Note 1: Material accounting policy information

The accounting policies that are material to the company are set out below. The accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the previous financial year, unless otherwise stated.

New, revised or amending Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted

The Association has adopted all of the new, revised or amending Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

Any new, revised or amending Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted. The incorporated association's assessment of the impact of these new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations, most relevant to the incorporated association, are set out below.

AASB 18 Presentation and Disclosure in Financial Statements

This standard is applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2027 and early adoption is permitted. The standard replaces IAS 1 'Presentation of Financial Statements', with many of the original disclosure requirements retained and there will be no impact on the recognition and measurement of items in the financial statements. But the standard will affect presentation and disclosure in the financial statements, including introducing five categories in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income: operating, investing, financing, income taxes and discontinued operations. The standard introduces two mandatory sub-totals in the statement: 'Operating profit' and 'Profit before financing and income taxes'. There are also new disclosure requirements for 'management-defined performance measures', such as earnings before interest, taxes, depreciation and amortisation ('EBITDA') or 'adjusted profit'. The standard provides enhanced guidance on grouping of information (aggregation and disaggregation), including whether to present this information in the primary financial statements or in the notes. The incorporated association will adopt this standard from 1 January 2027 and it is expected that there will be a significant change to the layout of the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

The accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are consistent with those followed in the preparation of the Association's annual financial statements for the previous reporting period.

Basis of preparation

This financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards (including Australian Accounting Interpretations), other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board, the requirements of the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012 and the Associations Incorporation Act 2015.

The financial report covers Surf Life Saving Western Australia Inc. as an individual entity. Surf Life Saving Western Australia Inc. is an Association incorporated in Western Australia under the Associations Incorporation Act 2015.

The financial report of Surf Life Saving Western Australia Inc. as an individual entity complies with all Australian equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards (AIFRS) in their entirety. Compliance with AIFRS ensures compliance with International Financial Reporting Standards.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the Association in the preparation of the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

The accounting policies set out below have been consistently applied to all years presented.

Reporting Basis and Conventions

The financial report has been prepared on an accrual basis and is based on historical costs modified by the revaluation of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities for which the fair value basis of accounting has been applied. The amounts presented in the financial report are present in Australian dollars and have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

Accounting Policies

(a) Income Tax

The Association has obtained tax-exempt status under current Australian Taxation legislation

(b) Current and non-current classification

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification.

An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the Association's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash and cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

Notes to the Financial statements for the year ended 30 April 2025

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the Association's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

(c) Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value as indicated less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Property

Freehold land and buildings are recorded at their fair value (being the amount for which an asset could be exchanged between knowledgeable willing parties in an arm's length transaction), based on periodic, but at least triennial valuations by external independent valuers. During the intervening periods, the fair values are determined on the basis of a directors' valuation.

If the carrying amount of a class of assets is increased as a result of a revaluation, the net revaluation increase is credited to a revaluation reserve in equity. However, the net revaluation increase is recognised in the profit or loss to the extent that it reverses a net revaluation decrease of the same class of assets previously recognised in the profit or loss.

If the carrying amount of a class of assets has decreased as a result of a revaluation, the net revaluation is recognised in the profit or loss. However, the net revaluation decrease is debited to the revaluation reserve in equity to the extent of any credit balance existing in any revaluation surplus in respect of that same class of asset. The net revaluation decrease recognised in the revaluation reserve reduces the amount accumulated in equity.

Plant and Equipment

Plant and equipment is measured on the cost basis less depreciation and impairment losses.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by Directors to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the assets' employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to present values in determining recoverable amounts.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of plant and equipment along with the motor vehicles and building fit outs are depreciated on a diminishing value basis or straight-line basis over their useful life from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets (excluding land and buildings) are:

Assets residual values and useful lives are reviewed and adjusted, if appropriate, at each balance date.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains and losses are included in the statement of comprehensive income.

(d) Impairment of Assets

At each reporting date, the Association reviews the carrying values of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the assets fair value less costs to sell and value-in-use, is compared to the assets carrying value. Any excess of the assets carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the statement of comprehensive income.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the Association estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Notes to the Financial statements for the year ended 30 April 2025

(e) Fair Value Measurement

When an asset or liability, financial or non-financial, is measured at fair value for recognition or disclosure purposes, the fair value is based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date; and assumes that the transaction will take place either: in the principal market; or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market.

Fair value is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming they act in their economic best interest. For non-financial assets, the fair value measurement is based on its highest and best use. Valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, are used, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

(f) Employee Benefits

Provision is made in respect of the Association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled, plus related on-costs. Employee benefits payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits.

(g) Revenue recognition

The Association recognises revenue as follows:

Revenue from contracts with customers

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the association is expected to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer. For each contract with a customer, the association: identifies the contract with a customer; identifies the performance obligations in the contract; determines the transaction price which takes into account estimates of variable consideration and the time value of money; allocates the transaction price to the separate performance obligations on the basis of the relative stand-alone selling price of each distinct good or service to be delivered; and recognises revenue when or as each performance obligation is satisfied in a manner that depicts the transfer to the customer of the goods or services promised.

Grants/ Sponsorship

Grant revenue is recognised in profit or loss when the Association satisfies the performance obligations stated within the funding agreements. If performance obligations are not sufficiently specific and enforceable, the Association recognises this revenue, at a point in time, which is generally on receipt.

Donations

Revenue from donations is recognised upon receipt of the funds.

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Volunteer services

The Association has elected not to recognise volunteer services as either revenue or other forms of contributions received. As such, any related consumption or capitalisation of such resources received is also not recognised.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(h) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

Cash flows are presented in the cash flow statement on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

(j) Financial assets

Initial recognition

Financial liabilities are classified, at initial recognition, as financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss, loans and borrowings or payables, as appropriate.

All financial liabilities are recognised initially at fair value and, in the case of loans and borrowings and payables, net of directly attributable transaction costs. The Association's financial liabilities include trade and other payables and accruals.

Notes to the Financial statements for the year ended 30 April 2025

Subsequent measurement

Trade and Other payables, Accruals

After initial recognition, trade and other payables and accruals are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Gains and losses are recognised in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income when the liabilities are derecognised.

Derecognition

A financial liability is derecognised when the associated obligation is discharged, cancelled or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognised in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

(j) Right of Use Assets

A right-of-use asset is recognised at the commencement date of a lease. The right-of-use asset is measured at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability, adjusted for, as applicable, any lease payments made at or before the commencement date net of any lease incentives received, any initial direct costs incurred, and, except where included in the cost of inventories, an estimate of costs expected to be incurred for dismantling and removing the underlying asset, and restoring the site or asset.

Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful life of the asset, whichever is the shorter. Where the Association expects to obtain ownership of the leased asset at the end of the lease term, the depreciation is over its estimated useful life. Right-of use assets are subject to impairment or adjusted for any remeasurement of lease liabilities.

The Association has elected not to recognise a right-of-use asset and corresponding lease liability for short-term leases with terms of 12 months or less and leases of low-value assets. Lease payments on these assets are expensed to profit or loss as incurred.

(k) Lease Liabilities

A lease liability is recognised at the commencement date of a lease. The lease liability is initially recognised at the present value of the lease payments to be made over the term of the lease, discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease or, if that rate cannot be readily determined, the Association's incremental borrowing rate. Lease payments comprise of fixed payments less any lease incentives receivable, variable lease payments that depend on an index or a rate, amounts expected to be paid under residual value guarantees, exercise price of a purchase option when the exercise of the option is reasonably certain to occur, and any anticipated termination penalties. The variable lease payments that do not depend on an index or a rate are expensed in the period in which they are incurred.

Lease liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. The carrying amounts are remeasured if there is a change in the following: future lease payments arising from a change in an index, or a rate used; residual guarantee; lease term; certainty of a purchase option and termination penalties. When a lease liability is remeasured, an adjustment is made to the corresponding right-of use asset, or to profit or loss if the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset is fully written down.

Note 2: Critical accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a material risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

Revenue Recognition & Timing

For grant funding received, the determination of whether the grant agreement includes sufficiently specific performance obligations and enforceability, was a significant judgement involving discussions with a number of parties at the Association and consideration of the terms and conditions within the agreement.

Grants received by the Association have been accounted for under both AASB 15 and AASB 1058 depending on the terms and conditions and decisions made. If this determination was changed, then the revenue recognition pattern would be different from that recognised in these financial statements.

Fair value measurement hierarchy

The Association is required to classify all assets and liabilities, measured at fair value, using a three level hierarchy, based on the lowest level of input that is significant to the entire fair value measurement, being: Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the entity can access at the measurement date; Level 2: Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly; and Level 3: Unobservable inputs for the asset or liability. Considerable judgement is required to determine what is significant to fair value and therefore which category the asset or liability is placed in can be subjective.

The fair value of assets and liabilities classified as level 2 is determined by the use of valuation models. Land and buildings have been valued based on similar assets, location and market conditions.

Impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill and other indefinite life intangible assets

The Association assesses impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill and other indefinite life intangible assets at each reporting date by evaluating conditions specific to the Association and to the particular asset that may lead to impairment. If an impairment trigger exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined. This involves fair value less costs of disposal or value-in-use calculations, which incorporate a number of key estimates and assumptions.

Employee benefits provision

The liability for employee benefits expected to be settled more than 12 months from the reporting date are recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

Incremental borrowing rate

Where the interest rate implicit in a lease cannot be readily determined, an incremental borrowing rate is estimated to discount future lease payments to measure the present value of the lease liability at the lease commencement date. Such a rate is based on what the Association estimates it would have to pay a third party to borrow the funds necessary to obtain an asset of a similar value to the right-of-use asset, with similar terms, security and economic environment.

Estimate of Useful Life of PPE

The incorporated association determines the estimated useful lives and related depreciation and amortisation charges for its property, plant and equipment and finite life intangible assets. The useful lives could change significantly as a result of technical innovations or some other event. The depreciation and amortisation charge will increase where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives, or technically obsolete or non-strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold will be written off or written down.

Trade receivables are non-interest bearing and on 30-day terms. A provision for impairment loss is recognised when there is objective evidence that an individual trade receivable is impaired. No impairment loss was recognised in respect of trade receivables in 2025 (2024: Nil).

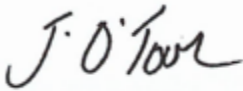
