A NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR MEL CANTWELL

THE CHILDREN IS ONE OF THOSE RARE PIECES OF WRITING THAT IS AT ONCE INTRIGUING AND DEVASTATING - ITS LENS FOCUSSED ON THE HUMAN CONDITION, ITS IMPACT GROUNDED IN THE LIVE EXPERIENCE.

Kirkwood's characters are in constant conflict and evolution, with themselves and each other. They, like the cast, are rich in experience and intellect; dynamic; vulnerable and funny.

In the making of this production I am surrounded by a creative team that brings all the qualities and skills necessary to navigate a work that is technically and emotionally demanding. It requires a phenomenal level of commitment and honesty, and a generosity of spirit that I think sings loud through the work.

The environment, and the Environment figure largely in the realisation of this work and its design. I have the good fortune here of working with my long-term collaborators Rachael Dease, Matthew Marshall and Bruce McKinven. There is great joy in building lasting artistic relationships, and they are integral forces in creating the atmosphere of this production.

Humble thanks go to the brilliant Lucy Kirkwood for allowing us to adapt the language of the work to bring it closer to home, and to Kate Champion for her inspired programming – presenting us with a play that is completely of the now; relevant, challenging and prescient.

It is my hope that you find its delicacy and bravery as profound as I do, and that your time with these extraordinary words and actors stays in your heart and mind beyond the bounds of the theatre and this performance.

BRUCE MCKINVEN'S SET DESIGN FOR THE CHILDREN CREATES A POWERFUL VISUAL METAPHOR FOR ISOLATION AND VULNERABILITY.

"Rose arrives to ask a question. The magnitude of the question is slowly revealed through the play. The consequences it poses for Hazel and Robin, and indeed the legacy to the community – are enormous. This is an intimate play set in a single room of a small cottage – but the backdrop it is set against is of a far greater scale.

This sense of scale is what I responded to. A highly focussed and isolated environment set within an abstracted notion of the post-apocalyptic world in which these characters have found themselves."

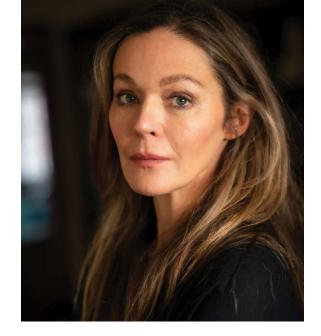

Recent directorial works include Mary Stuart for Perth Festival and Performing Lines WA; The Arsonists (WAAPA); Whale Fall (Perth Festival and PICA); Nocturna (The Kabuki Drop); Slap and Tickle (Adelaide Cabaret Festival); The Average Joe (Fringeworld); Blink (Winter Arts Festival) and The Elders Project (Fremantle Festival / Art on the Move).

She received an Emerging Leader's fellowship from ISPA (International Society for Performing Arts) and has been a guest artist and speaker for numerous national festivals and institutions. She has a BA (Film, ECU) and post-graduate Bachelor of Performing Arts (Directing, WAAPA). Mel has been a guest lecturer and director for Notre Dame University; ECU and WAAPA and has been commissioned by PICA, Playlab, Black Swan, City of Perth, Lotterywest, Barking Gecko and Perth Festival. She is Co-Artistic Director of Lost and Found Opera and Creative Director of The Kabuki Drop.

BRUCE MCKINVEN SET & COSTUME DESIGNER

Bruce is the Senior Production Designer for *Dark Mofo* Festival in Hobart designing most of the festival's major events including *Winter Feast*. He is also Artistic Associate for Brisbane Powerhouse, designing a series of new outdoor event spaces for the performance venue and contributing to the upcoming *Melt* Festival as a key creative.

Bruce has a 30-year career designing for theatre, arts festivals, dance and events across Australia, working with some of the nation's leading practitioners and companies, including Company B Belvoir, Bell Shakespeare, Adelaide Festival, Brisbane Festival, Perth Festival, Queensland Theatre Company, Sydney Theatre Company, La Boite, Expressions Dance Company, Dance North, Queensland Ballet, Force Majeure, Australian Dance Theatre and Singapore Dance Theatre.

For Black Swan he has designed Prima Facie (Set), Dirty Birds, Summer of the Seventeenth Doll, Let the Right One In, Switzerland, Clinton the Musical, Next to Normal, The White Divers of Broome (Set), Cat on a Hot Tin Roof.

Bruce has a long collaboration with Mel Cantwell, having previously worked together at Perth Theatre Company, The Kabuki Drop, and most recently at the Perth Festival, designing *Mary Stuart*.





MATT MARSHALL LIGHTING DESIGNER

Born and raised in Perth Western Australia, Matthew Marshall is a graduate of the West Australian Academy of Performing Arts (WAAPA) Production & Design course in 2000.

RACHAEL DEASE COMPOSER & SOUND DESIGNER

Rachael Dease is an award-winning composer and sound designer encompassing art music, dance and theatre scoring, installation and songwriting. Her compositions often explore memory, ritual and human connection. Awards include the Martin Sims Award and Melbourne Fringe Music Award for her critically acclaimed song cycle City of Shadows, PAWA for Best Music for Let The Right One In and The Bleeding Tree, and the 2021 WAM Award for Best Experimental Artist. Work for theatre and dance includes the Helpmann Award-nominated It's Dark Outside (The Last Great Hunt) and Sunset (Strut Dance/Maxine Doyle). Residencies include PICA, The Arctic Circle and Malthouse Theatre. In 2020, Dease released *Hymns for End Times* which was performed with the West Australian Symphony Orchestra for Perth Festival 2021. In 2022, Rachael collaborated with Maxine Doyle and Es Devlin on Here Not Here for Gothenburg Opera Dance Company and continued this collaboration in 2023 with Salamander for Brisbane Festival.





IZZY TAYLOR STAGE MANAGER

A graduate of WAAPA's BA of Performing Arts in Stage Management, Izzy engages across many theatrical disciplines from plays, musicals, ballet, events, and devised works. In the past three years they have worked with Black Swan on Barracking for the Umpire (WA Regional Tour), The Pool, Things I Know To Be True and Toast as Stage Manager and City of Gold, The Tempest, and Playthings as Assistant Stage Manager.

Other projects include Stage Manager for *The Hypotheticals* (The Last Great Hunt), Production Stage Manager for *At the End of the Land* (Too Close to the Sun), Company Stage Manager for *The Gruffalo* Melbourne Tour (CDP Theatre Producers), threetime Stage Manager & Technical Mentor on *Project 10* (West Australian Ballet), and Stage Manager for the premieres of both *Unheimlich* (Performing Lines WA & PICA) and *Minneapolis* (Performing Lines WA). Outside of stage managing, Izzy also works as a stage technician in props, lighting, mechanist and wardrobe teams.

KIRA FEENEY ASSISTANT STAGE MANAGER

Kira Feeney (she/they) is a proud Palawa who grew up on Wathawurrung land in Victoria and moved to Boorloo in 2021 to study the Aboriginal Performance course at WAAPA. There, they found a passion for Stage Management and went on to complete their Advanced Diploma in Stage Management. Since then, she has worked as an ASM for Black Swan on The Pool (2024), Ilbijerri on Big Name No Blankets (2024), Yirra Yaakin on Brothers Wreck (2024), and Stage Managed Bad Feminist (2023) at The Blue Room Theatre.

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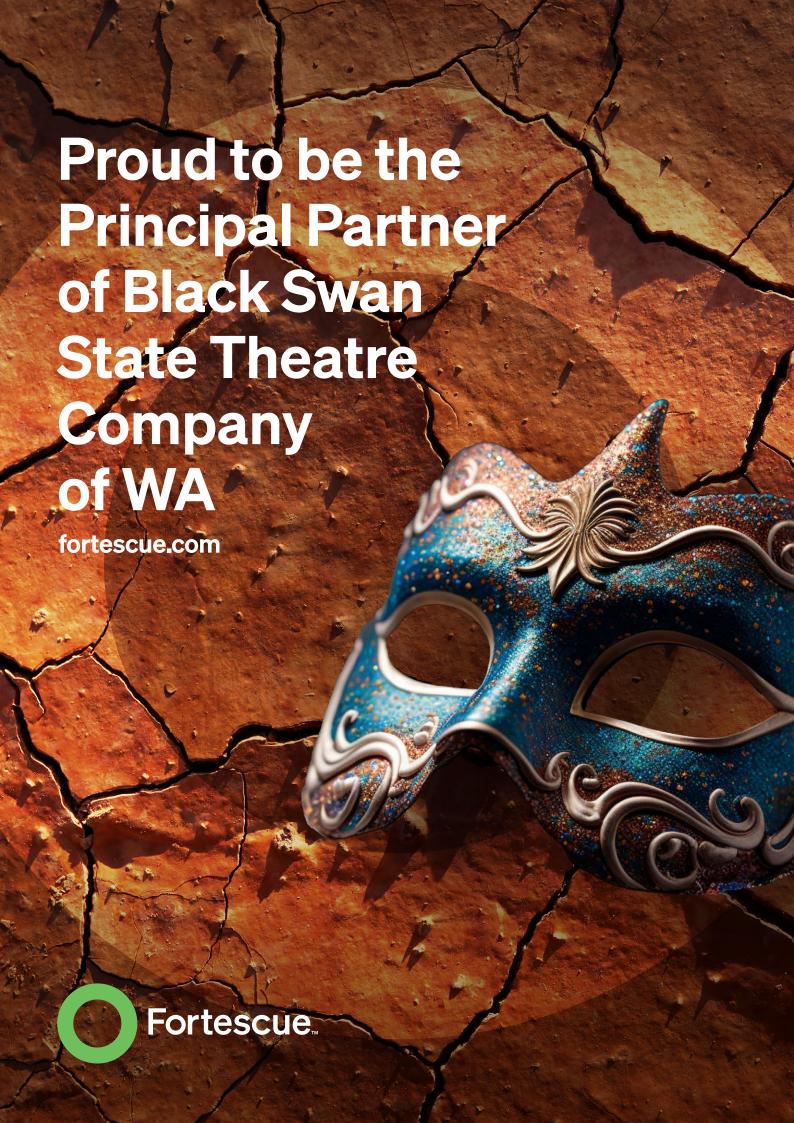
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
