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CHAPTER 1 – STATE CAPITAL PROGRAM 2023-24

Budget Paper No. 4 *State Capital Program* summarises the capital projects the Government will be undertaking in 2023-24 and future years. This budget paper includes *Labor's Financial Statement (LFS) 2022* commitments, newly announced capital projects, works already underway and those expected to finish by 30 June 2023. The information is current as at 8 May 2023.

Productive, long-term investment in infrastructure continues to be a priority for the Government to support vital public services, promote economic growth and boost the state's productivity.

The 2023-24 Budget has added \$9.3 billion total estimated investment (TEI) for new capital projects, including LFS 2022 commitments, to support high-quality healthcare, more schools and kindergartens and safer transport connections.

There is a total of \$201 billion in new and existing capital projects underway to transform the way people move around the state and improve access to jobs and services in local communities.

The 2023-24 Budget funds the commencement of delivery of all the LFS 2022 commitments alongside state-shaping Big Build projects, many of which are in the peak construction phase.

Government infrastructure investment (GII) is projected to average \$19.6 billion a year over the budget and forward estimates which is significantly more than the 10-year average to 2014-15 of \$4.9 billion. This reflects the Government's commitment to a strong and sustainable infrastructure program.

Since 2014, the Government's pipeline of capital investment has supported, and will continue to support, more than 227 000 jobs in this important sector of the Victorian economy.

CONTINUING TO DELIVER THE INFRASTRUCTURE PIPELINE

The 2023-24 Budget continues to deliver on Victoria's Big Build and new investment priorities to support social and economic activity across growing suburbs and regional Victoria.

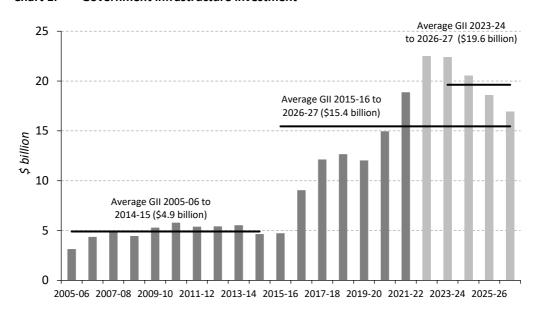
The 2023-24 Budget provides an additional \$9.3 billion to the Government's existing infrastructure program to support vital public services in locations where they are needed most. Investment in new projects will ensure Victoria maintains a strong and sustainable infrastructure pipeline.

Capital expenditure is forecast to reach \$22.5 billion for the 2022-23 financial year which is an increase against the \$18.7 billion achieved in 2021-22.

The Government is delivering some of the biggest and most complex projects in Australia. Market constraints including nationwide labour shortages and supply chain disruptions continue to impact the delivery of the infrastructure pipeline. The Government is using innovative approaches in procurement and construction to address these challenges.

GII is projected to average \$19.6 billion a year over the budget and forward estimates — which is significantly higher than the 10-year average to 2014-15 of \$4.9 billion. This reflects the Government's commitment to a strong and sustainable infrastructure program (Chart 1).

Box 1: Commonwealth review of the Infrastructure Investment Program

In April 2023, the Commonwealth Government announced a review of its Infrastructure Investment Program.

The Commonwealth Government has advised that the review will be undertaken within 90 days and will include engagement with the states, territories and industry stakeholders. The Commonwealth Government has advised that any changes to funding will be reported in a future budget publication following the review.

The Commonwealth Government has not provided a definitive list of projects for the review. Several projects that may be subject to this review have had their TEIs and completion dates updated to 'thi' to reflect uncertainty associated with the review.

During the review, no new contracts will be awarded on jointly funded projects that may be subject to the review.

Victorian Government funding remains allocated to these projects pending the outcomes of the review and/or until advice is received from the Commonwealth Government.

The Victorian Government will continue to advocate for Victoria's fair share of infrastructure funding. This will be guided by the following principles:

- that Victoria is 'no worse off' following the review
- a fair share for Victoria
- a true partnership between Victoria and the Commonwealth to facilitate project delivery
- maintaining 80/20 funding arrangements on corridors of national significance.

Since the 2022-23 Budget, the Government has completed a significant number of projects that are supporting the delivery of services across local communities.

These include:

- the Victorian Heart Hospital, Australia's first specialist cardiac hospital, providing access to world-leading cardiac care and research
- the Stage 1 expansion of the Wonthaggi Hospital, including more emergency department treatment spaces, more inpatient beds and increased surgical capacity
- a new four-storey 120-bed aged care facility in Wantirna, delivering best-practice care in a home-like environment and supporting a range of resident care needs
- new mental health centres at the McKellar Centre and the Northern Hospital, delivering on recommendations of the Royal Commission into Victoria's Mental Health System and addressing critical demand pressures
- two new train stations at Huntly and Raywood and the delivery of over 2 000 new and upgraded car parking spaces at 17 stations, improving commuter access to train stations

- the new multi-jurisdictional Bendigo Law Courts, bringing together specialist courts and key service agencies under one roof
- the Stage 2 upgrade of the Monash Freeway, opening 36 kilometres of new and widened lanes, bridge upgrades and entry/exit ramps
- removal of 9 dangerous level crossings in Deer Park, Glenroy, Preston, and Sunbury making way for new train stations, public space and reducing congestion.

NEW INVESTMENTS IN THE 2023-24 BUDGET

The 2023-24 Budget adds \$9.3 billion to the Government's existing infrastructure program. This will support delivery of the LFS 2022 commitments as well as other high-priority projects to grow the economy and deliver better outcomes for all Victorians.

Major project investments over \$100 million will be included in the Office of Projects Victoria's (OPV) Victorian Major Projects Pipeline (Pipeline). The Pipeline website (www.opv.vic.gov.au/Pipeline) provides up to date information on the Government infrastructure pipeline, making it easier for businesses, suppliers and contractors to plan and contribute to forthcoming major projects.

Delivering better care and more upgrades to Victoria's health system

The 2023-24 Budget delivers on the Government's commitment to providing better care through vital investments in hospitals and healthcare services across the state. Key investments include:

- \$320 million for the Hospital Infrastructure Delivery Fund to support development activities for major investments at seven hospitals, boosting capacity and ensuring Victorians receive the highest quality healthcare
- \$162 million to build three new public sector residential facilities in Cohuna, Maffra and Numurkah, delivering better aged care services for regional Victorians
- \$53 million for the planning and detailed design for Stage 3 of the redevelopment of the Thomas Embling Hospital
- \$44 million to deliver eight new PET scanners across the state at the Ballarat Base Hospital, Frankston Hospital, Goulburn Valley Health in Shepparton, Northern Hospital in Epping, Sunshine Hospital, Northeast Health in Wangaratta, Warrnambool Base Hospital and the Werribee Mercy Hospital
- \$40 million for the Metropolitan Health Infrastructure Fund to improve the quality and amenity of infrastructure across a range of metropolitan health services, enhancing their service delivery capacity and ability to respond to local priorities
- \$30 million to build a new ambulance station in Armstrong Creek, improving ambulance response times and supporting paramedics in the City of Greater Geelong and surrounding regions
- \$10 million for the Mental Health Capital Renewal Fund to improve the quality and amenity of existing facilities, assisting people with mental health issues.

Box 2: Hospital Infrastructure Delivery Fund

The Government will invest an initial \$320 million to support development activities for its significant investment in new, redeveloped and refurbished hospitals across Victoria. The initial investment will enable important planning and design activities to start, together with land acquisition and enabling works. This funding will allow work to commence for:

- a new hospital for West Gippsland, providing better care closer to home for the West Gippsland community through a new hospital and public sector aged care facility
- a bigger and better Monash Medical Centre to continue to deliver specialist acute inpatient, maternity and specialist health services, providing crucial health capacity in the south-eastern growth corridor
- refurbishment and expansion of the Austin Hospital's emergency department and short stay unit, meaning more patients can be treated faster
- redevelopment of the Dandenong Hospital with an expanded emergency department, new intensive care unit and a new outpatient clinic, providing better care, closer to home for the local community
- redevelopment of the Northern Hospital, with a new emergency department and inpatient tower to support the growing demand in the north
- redevelopment and expansion of the Queen Elizabeth II Hospital, including a new emergency department and two inpatient towers, providing modern facilities for the growing eastern suburbs
- the second stage of the Wonthaggi Hospital, delivering additional capacity and a new birthing complex for families on the Bass Coast.

Following detailed due diligence and design, the Government will confirm TEIs and cash flows in future budgets and associated details including the market engagement and procurement approach, and timelines for each hospital.

Box 3: Delivering Victoria's biggest ever health and hospitals project

In October 2022, the Government announced the start of the biggest hospital redevelopment in Australia's history, with significant upgrades to the existing Royal Melbourne Hospital and Royal Women's Hospital in Parkville, together with a new campus of both hospitals in the future suburb of Arden.

The Government has commenced the 12 year program, with an initial investment worth more than \$2.3 billion to deliver the new Arden medical precinct which will become a centre for elective surgery, outpatient treatment, clinical trials, rehabilitation, and low-risk women's healthcare services.

The future upgrades to the Parkville sites will focus on emergency, trauma and acute care.

From 2025, Arden will be linked to the Parkville precinct when the Metro Tunnel opens, making it easier for healthcare workers, patients and visitors from across the state to travel to and between each campus.

Box 4: Victoria's Mental Health Capital Fund¹

In response to the Royal Commission into Victoria's Mental Health System, a dedicated Mental Health Capital Fund (MHCF) has been established to support the Government's investment in mental health infrastructure. The Royal Commission's recommendations will take a decade or more to implement, delivering a new approach to mental health and wellbeing in Victoria.

The 2023-24 Budget is investing \$63 million in the MHCF to continue to deliver on the Royal Commission's recommendations and improve Victoria's mental health system. Key projects include:

- \$53 million for the planning and detailed design for Stage 3 of the redevelopment of the Thomas Embling Hospital, informing the future delivery of a men's high-security unit, bed refurbishments and supporting infrastructure
- \$10 million for the Mental Health Capital Renewal Fund to improve the quality and amenity of existing facilities, assisting people with mental health issues.

The new initiatives are in addition to the \$1.5 billion in mental health infrastructure investment already funded by the Government, including:

- \$492 million for 120 new acute mental health beds across the McKellar Centre, Northern Hospital, Royal Melbourne Hospital and the Sunshine Hospital
- \$462 million for Stages 1 and 2 to expand and redevelop the Thomas Embling Hospital
- \$196 million for additional acute mental health beds in regional Victoria
- \$141 million for five new youth treatment facilities in Barwon South West, Gippsland, Grampians, Hume and North Eastern Metropolitan Regions, with upgrades to centres in Bendigo, Dandenong and Frankston
- \$65 million for Contemporary Information Architecture for Mental Health and Wellbeing
- \$62 million for improving safety in mental health intensive care areas
- \$36 million for a new Mental Health and Alcohol and Other Drugs Residential Rehabilitation Facility in Mildura
- \$30 million for grants for renewal and refurbishments of acute and community based mental health facilities in 2020-21 and 2022-23
- \$11 million for additional acute mental health beds in Warrnambool
- \$10 million for Mental Health and Alcohol and Other Drugs Emergency Department Hubs in regional Victoria
- \$5 million for the Victorian Collaborative Centre for Mental Health and Wellbeing.

Box 5: New and existing regional investment in health

The Government is continuing its investment to improve access and the quality of healthcare services in our regions, with funding of:

- \$162 million to build three new public sector residential facilities in Cohuna, Maffra and Numurkah, delivering better aged care services for regional Victorians
- \$44 million for PET scanners across the state including regional Victoria, at the Ballarat Base Hospital, Goulburn Valley Health in Shepparton, Northeast Health in Wangaratta and the Warrnambool Base Hospital
- \$30 million to build a new ambulance station in Armstrong Creek, improving ambulance response times and supporting paramedics in the City of Greater Geelong and surrounding regions.

These new investments build on existing regional health investment including:

- \$596 million for the redevelopment and expansion of the Ballarat Base Hospital, delivering a new emergency department, a new helipad, additional car parks, a women and children's hub, state of the art theatre suite and an extra 100 inpatient and short stay beds. The redevelopment will be undertaken over multiple stages with construction expected to be completed in 2028
- more than \$500 million to build the new Barwon Women's and Children's Hospital, providing contemporary maternity and paediatric facilities and delivering additional capacity for Geelong and its surrounding communities. Site preparation has commenced in 2023
- \$384 million for the redevelopment of the Warrnambool Base Hospital, delivering a bigger emergency department, more operating theatres, an extra 22 inpatient beds and dedicated areas for pathology services and dialysis. Construction of stage one works has commenced and is expected to be completed in late 2023, with completion of the main construction works expected in 2027.

Building great local schools, early childhood centres and TAFE facilities for Victorians

The 2023-24 Budget continues the Government's investment in education and training, with more than \$1.3 billion provided for new schools, upgrades to existing schools and additional maintenance. A further investment of \$1.1 billion is made in early childhood learning including the Best Start, Best Life program and Three-Year-Old Kinder.

Funding of \$573 million will be provided to build an additional nine new schools to continue to deliver on the Government's commitment to open 100 new schools by 2026. This will bring the total number of new schools since 2019 to 84. Funding is also provided for an additional stage at two recently opened schools, and planning and early works for three more new schools. In addition, \$21 million is provided for land acquisition for future new schools.

Other key education capital investments in the 2023-24 Budget include:

- \$913 million to continue the delivery of infrastructure to increase the capacity for early learning as part of the Best Start, Best Life initiative to progressively transition Four-Year-Old Kindergarten to Pre-Prep
- \$266 million for capital upgrades at 43 schools and \$20 million for the School Upgrade Delivery Fund for planning and development of capital upgrades at a further 54 schools
- \$208 million to continue delivery of new kindergarten facilities on government school sites to increase capacity for Three-Year-Old Kinder
- \$170 million in the Building Better TAFE Fund to deliver new, and upgrade existing, campuses
- \$147 million for relocatable buildings to relieve pressure at schools that are reaching their capacity, providing additional functional spaces for learning
- \$104 million for essential maintenance and compliance to ensure issues with school asset conditions are addressed
- \$90 million to expand capacity to meet enrolment demand at Coburg High School, Huntly Primary School, Richmond Primary School, and Saltwater P-9 College with the additional capacity to be ready for the 2027 school year
- \$84 million to build six new tech schools in Brimbank, Dandenong, Frankston, Hume, Wangaratta and Warrnambool to improve student's skills and knowledge through immersive and hands-on learning experiences
- \$25 million to support the construction of new hydrotherapy pools at specialist schools
- \$10 million for the Minor Capital Works Fund, providing an opportunity for schools to seek funding for minor capital projects that are a priority for their school
- \$10 million for the Inclusive Schools Fund to continue providing accessible playgrounds, outdoor sensory areas and indoor inclusive learning spaces.

Box 7: Best Start, Best Life - Best Kindergartens for Victorian kids

The 2023-24 Budget continues the Government's capital investment in the Best Start, Best Life program. To support this ambitious reform, the Government is investing a further \$913 million to continue the delivery of early learning infrastructure capacity. Funding provided in this Budget is in addition to the initial investment of the \$1.3 billion announced in the 2022 Victorian Economic and Fiscal Update.

Four-Year-Old Kindergarten is transitioning to Pre-Prep over the next decade, increasing to a universal 30-hour a week program for play-based learning for four-year-old children in Victoria. The staged roll-out will allow time to grow the necessary workforce and infrastructure, and to get ready to run expanded programs.

New kindergartens operated by local councils or not-for-profit organisations are planned to be opened by 2027. This will help support the infrastructure capacity required to meet the universal 30-hours a week program. The majority of these facilities will be co-located or nearby government school sites to help avoid the double drop-off.

The Government has also committed to build 50 government-owned and government-operated Early Learning Centres across Victoria in communities that have the greatest need for more childcare and kindergarten places. They will offer childcare, Three and Four-Year-Old Kindergarten and then transition to include Pre-Prep. In some cases they will be co-located with services like maternal and child health services and playgroups.

In November 2022, the Government announced that the first four Early Learning Centres opening in 2025 will be co-located at:

- Eaglehawk North Primary School
- Moomba Park Primary School
- Murtoa College
- Sunshine Primary School.

Box 8: New and refurbished TAFEs

The Government is investing \$170 million in the Building Better TAFE Fund to build new campuses and upgrade existing TAFEs. This will improve lifelong education pathways, supporting Victorians to get the jobs they want and address skill shortages in the workforce.

Two new TAFE campuses will be built in Melton and Sunbury to provide more local training opportunities for these two high-growth areas. The Melton campus will be a dedicated construction skills facility that will support approximately 600 students every year.

In partnership with the Bendigo Kangan Institute, the new Sunbury campus will provide more accessible training for Hume-based students.

Two regional TAFE campuses will be refurbished to deliver health and community services in Victoria. The Geelong Gordon TAFE will repurpose space and create a new Disability Services Hub plus a Student Hub. A Community Health and Learning Hub will be established at the Bendigo Kangan Institute in Castlemaine which will be used as a training facility for nursing students.

The Building Better TAFE Fund will also establish a \$50 million TAFE Clean Energy Fund to make capital investments in regional TAFEs, which includes committing to the following projects:

- building an Innovation and Design Centre at the South West TAFE
- creating a Clean Energy Centre at TAFE Gippsland's Morwell Campus
- Stage 2 of the Asia Pacific Renewable Energy Training Centre at Federation TAFE.

These investments will support the Government's Climate Change Strategy to net-zero emissions.

A better transport system for all Victorians

The Government continues to invest in critical transport infrastructure to ensure Victorians can access employment, education and public services reliably and safely. The key transport investments in the 2023-24 Budget include:

- \$2.8 billion² boost over 10 years for road maintenance and renewal, including flood recovery works, improving road safety and helping maximise the productivity of the Victorian road network
- \$674 million to upgrade key roads and intersections in major growth areas and regions, improving network efficiency, travel times and road safety
- \$650 million³ to upgrade the Melton line to facilitate the operation of longer trains, delivering better train services and increasing train capacity for the western rail corridor
- \$601 million to purchase 23 new VLocity trains to enable capacity uplifts on the Melton line through running nine-car services, as well as retiring the ageing classic fleet trains on the Geelong and Melton corridors
- \$353 million to expand the Kananook train stabling facility on the Frankston line, delivering additional stabling and maintenance capacity to support metropolitan train services and network resilience
- \$287 million to increase the capacity of the South Dynon train maintenance facility to maintain the expanding VLocity train fleet, supporting delivery of service uplifts and more reliable services on the regional network
- \$238 million for investment in enabling infrastructure works and facilities to support the Metro Tunnel network integration and future operations
- \$60 million for major upgrades at Boronia Station to address critical safety issues and improve accessibility to comply with the Disability Standards for Accessible Public Transport (DSAPT)
- \$59 million to deliver a package of critical works and enabling infrastructure to ensure Next Generation Trams can be safely deployed on routes 57, 59 and 82
- \$50 million to deliver a package of local road safety upgrades for motorists, pedestrians and cyclists
- \$40 million to rebuild the Dromana Pier, St Leonards Pier and the Warneet North and South Jetties
- \$32 million to deliver proactive maintenance works for the West Gate Bridge to improve user safety, maintain serviceability and support freight movement
- \$28 million to increase heavy maintenance capacity to support the growing regional train fleet and support the reliability and punctuality of regional passenger rail services.

Box 9: More VLocity trains for the regions

The 2023-24 Budget continues the Government's investment in Victoria's regional rail network, with \$601 million for 23 new VLocity trains to increase train capacity for commuters on the Melton line.

These new trains will continue to replace the older classic fleet, improving reliability, accessibility and passenger experience on the Geelong and Melton corridors. The trains will be deployed on the Melton line and will provide up to 50 per cent more rail capacity for commuters between Bacchus Marsh and Ardeer stations following completion of station and infrastructure upgrades.

The new trains will continue to be manufactured in Victoria at Alstom's Dandenong manufacturing facility, supporting local manufacturing and supply chain jobs, creating a pipeline of work to provide certainty to the workforce.

The Government is also investing in the South Dynon train maintenance facility and additional heavy maintenance capacity to service the growing regional rail fleet and delivering more services, more often.

These investments will improve connections from Melbourne to outer suburban growth areas and the regions, providing fairer access to jobs, transport and services.

Box 10: Delivering better roads to get families home sooner and safer

The Government is delivering on two LFS 2022 commitments to improve the safety and efficiency of Victoria's roads.

The \$674 million Road Blitz to Get Families Home Sooner and Safer package will upgrade key roads and intersections in Victoria's major growth areas and regions, improving network efficiency, travel times and road safety.

The Government is also investing \$50 million for the Delivering Better Local Roads initiative to increase safety on our local roads for motorists, pedestrians and cyclists alike.

These LFS 2022 commitments will deliver a suite of projects across Victoria, including:

- Point Cook Road intersection upgrade, Altona Meadows
- Ballan Road intersection upgrade, Wyndham Vale
- Thompsons Road intersection upgrade, Clyde North
- Grant Street intersection upgrade, Bacchus Marsh
- Barwon Heads Road upgrade Stage 2, Armstrong Creek
- Watson Street interchange upgrade, Wallan
- development of the Western Highway Business Case
- a shared user path between Montmorency Station and Eltham Station
- safer and better shared user paths, Ashwood
- installation of electronic variable speed signs, Gembrook Primary School
- installation of electronic speed signs, Centre Road, Clayton
- a safer pedestrian crossing, Bentleigh Greek Orthodox Church on Centre Road
- installation of pedestrian operated signals, Fletcher Road, Frankston
- road safety upgrades adjacent to Port Melbourne Secondary College
- planning an upgrade to improve safety at the intersection of Station Street and McLeod Road, Carrum
- installation of new pedestrian signals, Hall Road near Rowellyn Avenue, Carrum Downs
- development of a traffic management plan for Wyndham
- construction of a pedestrian bridge, Diamond Creek.

Box 11: Removing more dangerous and congested level crossings

Announced in October 2022, the Government is removing more of Victoria's most dangerous and congested level crossings, meaning that 110 level crossings will be removed by 2030.

The \$6.5 billion package for 25 additional level crossing removals includes sites on the Melton, Frankston, Hurstbridge, Sunbury, Upfield, and Werribee lines. At completion, the Frankston, Sunbury and Werribee lines will be entirely free from level crossings, along with the Cranbourne, Pakenham and Lilydale lines. This will improve travel times, enhance safety for commuters and create more accessible communities.

The additional level crossing removals will continue to support Victoria's economy by creating and maintaining jobs in the construction, manufacturing, engineering, software programming and cleaning industries. Overall, the level crossing removal program has created thousands of jobs and this will continue as more crossings are removed. At peak construction, there have been around 6 000 people working on the projects, with more than 79 million work hours completed.

As at May 2023, a total of 68 level crossings have been removed.

Key achievements since the 2022-23 Budget include removing level crossings at the following sites:

- Robinsons Road, Deer Park.

A total of 74 level crossings are expected to be removed by the end of 2023 – on track for the Government to complete 85 level crossing removals by 2025 and 110 by 2030.

Liveable local communities

The Government is investing to provide the infrastructure required to build strong, healthy and liveable communities.

The key investments in the 2023-24 Budget include:

- \$136 million to install air conditioners in Victoria's public housing high-rise tower dwellings which are home to over 13 000 Victorians across more than 40 towers
- \$11 million to upgrade visitor facilities and infrastructure at the You Yangs (Wurdi Youang) and Serendip Sanctuary to enhance and protect the natural and cultural precinct.

To boost the state's emergency services capabilities, the 2023-24 Budget includes capital funding for the redevelopment of emergency service facilities including the Country Fire Authority (CFA) stations at Kinglake West, Raywood and Yarram, Victorian State Emergency Services (VICSES) facilities at Bannockburn and Kilmore and for additional works at the Frankston VICSES satellite facility in Skye.

Funding is also provided to support the redevelopment and upgrades of Life Saving Victoria facilities at Bancoora Beach and Port Melbourne and to progress planning of the future upgrade of the Keysborough CFA and Footscray VICSES facilities.

Investment is provided for a new computer system to support emergency services Triple Zero call-taking and dispatch functions which will increase emergency call handling capacity and support improvements to operational response times.

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DELIVERING EXISTING INVESTMENTS

The Government continues to deliver its existing pipeline of significant infrastructure. Many state-shaping projects are in the peak construction phase including the Big Housing Build, the Metro Tunnel, the North East Link and the West Gate Tunnel. Planning, development and early works are also progressing for the Suburban Rail Loop. This existing works program is creating thousands of jobs and delivering benefits for generations of Victorians to come.

The DTF Capital Investment Dashboard (<u>www.dtf.vic.gov.au/capital-investment-dashboard</u>) provides an overview of major capital projects in Victoria from 2015-16 to 2023-24.

Box 12: Suburban Rail Loop

The Suburban Rail Loop (SRL) will be delivered in stages over several decades. The initial stage, SRL East, will be constructed between Cheltenham and Box Hill. SRL East will improve access to key education, health and employment centres in Melbourne's east and south-east, relieving pressure on roads and reducing congestion and travel times across the network.

SRL East is expected to cost between \$30–\$34.5 billion. Announced State funding totals \$11.8 billion, which covers development and planning costs, initial and early works and a provision towards the main works packages. The Victorian Government is seeking a matching contribution from the Commonwealth Government, with an initial investment announced of \$2.2 billion over three years. Funding will also be realised through a range of private sector investment and value capture sources.

Key achievements in 2022-23 include:

- progressing initial and early works including preparation for the tunnel boring machines, project development, environmental and planning approvals, land acquisition, geotechnical investigations, power connection works and precinct development planning and activation
- commencing procurement for the tunnelling packages by releasing the Request for Proposal. Tunnelling is expected to start in 2026, with the world's leading companies already expressing strong interest in participating.

This transformative project is well on its way to having the first trains running in 2035, as well as reshaping the precincts around the SRL stations, creating more housing options, services and public and open space.

Box 13: Big Housing Build

The Big Housing Build invests \$5.3 billion to deliver over 12 000 social and affordable dwellings, including \$1.3 billion directed to regional areas. Since 2020, more than 7 600 homes have been completed or are underway, and more than 2 000 households have either moved or are getting ready to move into brand new homes. The Big Housing Build has created more than 30 000 jobs, providing a vital boost to local and regional economies.

Homes Victoria is implementing alternative delivery approaches, such as the Ground Lease Model, to attract private capital and respond to construction market pressures.

Key achievements in 2022-23 include:

- the completion of the first 'fast start' site in Dunlop Avenue, Ascot Vale, on time and on budget delivering 100 social and 100 affordable dwellings and five fully accessible apartments for people with a disability
- over 870 homes tenanted or ready to be tenanted across regional Victoria since the commencement of the program
- 32 projects contracted to deliver over 200 specialised mental health supported dwellings
- targeted programs to deliver new housing across areas of regional Victoria, including \$765 million committed across 18 local government areas identified under the Minimum Investment Guarantee
- continued evaluation of proposals as part of the Homes for Aboriginal Victorians Rounds
- the continued delivery of social and affordable homes to Victorians most in need, including victim survivors of family violence, people who are homeless or at risk of homelessness, young people leaving state care, and those leaving the justice system.

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Partnerships Victoria projects

Partnerships Victoria projects continue to deliver value for money outcomes for Victorians with more than \$50 billion invested in 37 contracted projects.

This whole of life procurement approach has continued to evolve, responding to market conditions and project specific characteristics, ensuring the model remains fit for purpose. Recent Partnerships Victoria projects are being delivered with a focus on appropriately managing risks and achieving broader community objectives, including precinct development.

The Government is preparing the next evolution of the Partnerships Victoria framework which will reflect these recent model innovations and developments, ensuring these projects continue to deliver value for all Victorians.

Frankston Hospital Redevelopment

The redevelopment and expansion of the Frankston Hospital will deliver a new multistorey tower with additional bed capacity, new operating theatres, enhanced mental health and oncology services along with expanded maternity and paediatric services. The redevelopment will also include a new car park and two statewide emergency department initiatives: a five-bed emergency department mental health, alcohol and other drugs hub, and a dedicated paediatric zone.

The Frankston Hospital Redevelopment was procured as an availability Public Private Partnership (PPP). A consortium comprising Lendlease, Honeywell, Compass and Capella Capital were awarded the contract. Construction of the main works is expected to be completed by the end of 2025, with the redevelopment operational in 2026.

The project is being managed by the Victorian Health Building Authority in conjunction with Peninsula Health.

Geelong Convention and Exhibition Centre

The Geelong Convention and Exhibition Centre (GCEC) precinct is the centrepiece project of the Geelong City Deal. The precinct will include a 1 000-seat plenary venue which will also include more than 3 000 square metres of flexible multipurpose space to allow large and small events to run concurrently. Details of commercial opportunities to activate the precinct and create better connections to the Geelong CBD and Western Beach, such as a hotel and commercial spaces, will be determined through the tender process.

The GCEC will be procured as part of an availability PPP. The procurement process is underway, with the State expected to announce a preferred bidder and start works later in 2023.

The project is being managed by Development Victoria and Regional Development Victoria, as part of the Geelong City Deal.

High Capacity Metro Trains

The project is delivering 65 High Capacity Metro Trains (HCMT). The first HCMT began operating on the Pakenham line in December 2020. With more than 30 HCMTs now in service, 100 per cent of the trains on the Cranbourne–Pakenham line are HCMTs. The remaining trains will continue to progressively enter passenger service and will run through the Metro Tunnel to Sunbury from 2025. More than 750 drivers have been trained to operate the new trains and the project has consistently exceeded the contracted local content commitment.

The HCMT project was procured as an availability PPP. The Evolution Rail consortium comprising Downer EDI, CRRC Changchun and Plenary were awarded the contract.

This project is being managed by the Department of Transport and Planning.

Homes Victoria Ground Lease Model Project 1

The Homes Victoria Ground Lease Model Project 1 will deliver 1 110 dwellings at existing housing sites at New Street, Brighton; Racecourse Road, Flemington; and Bangs Street, Prahran. The project will provide much-needed additional social housing in these areas and the opportunity for tenants to live in an integrated community. The project features a mix of 619 social, 126 affordable and 365 market rental dwellings, including specialist disability accommodation. At least 75 per cent of the new social housing dwellings will be targeted to priority-access applicants.

The project is being delivered as an availability PPP under a ground lease model. The Building Communities consortium were awarded the contract. The consortium will be responsible for designing, constructing, financing, operating and maintaining all dwellings for a period of 40 years, with Homes Victoria retaining ownership of the land and dwellings. The project is currently under construction with the Brighton and Flemington sites expected to be completed in late 2023 and Prahran in early 2024.

The project is being managed by Homes Victoria.

Homes Victoria Ground Lease Model Project 2

The Homes Victoria Ground Lease Model Project 2 will deliver up to 1 400 new social, affordable and market rental dwellings, including specialist disability accommodation. These dwellings will be delivered across four Homes Victoria owned sites located at Horace Petty, South Yarra; Essex St, Prahran; Barak/Beacon Roads, Port Melbourne and Bluff Road, Hampton East.

The successful consortium will design, construct, finance, operate and maintain the dwellings over a 40-year concession term. At the end of the concession, the land and all homes will revert to Homes Victoria. The Request for Proposal process is currently underway and the successful respondent is expected to be announced in mid-to-late 2023.

The project is being managed by Homes Victoria.

Metro Tunnel Project

The Metro Tunnel is the biggest rail project currently under construction in Victoria. Project delivery works are continuing with tunnelling for the twin rail tunnels complete and track installation also complete. Fit-out is underway on the five new underground stations. Dynamic testing of trains within the tunnel is due to commence later this year, in readiness for the Metro Tunnel opening in 2025.

The Tunnels and Stations package was procured as an availability PPP. The Cross Yarra Partnership consortium comprising Lendlease, John Holland, Bouygues Construction and Capella Capital were awarded the contract. The consortium will design, construct, finance and maintain 9-kilometre twin tunnels, five underground stations and commercial opportunities at the new stations for 25 years. In December 2020, the contract was subsequently amended as part of a commercial settlement between the project parties to resolve delivery issues that arose during construction.

The project is being managed by the Major Transport Infrastructure Authority – Rail Projects Victoria.

New Footscray Hospital

Building a bigger and better Footscray Hospital will cut wait times and reduce pressure on nearby hospitals. With an increase of nearly 200 beds, the new hospital will treat approximately 15 000 additional patients and enable around 20 000 additional people to be seen by the emergency department each year. There will also be more outpatient, mental health, palliative care and surgical services.

The new Footscray Hospital was procured as an availability PPP. The Plenary Health consortium comprising Multiplex, Honeywell, Compass and Plenary were awarded the contract. The consortium will finance, design, construct and maintain the hospital for 25 years following construction completion. Construction is underway, with the hospital expected to open in 2025.

The project is being managed by the Victorian Health Building Authority in partnership with Western Health as the public operator of all clinical services.

New Melton Hospital

The new Melton Hospital will deliver high-quality care for the people in the western region of Melbourne, with services including a 24-hour emergency department, at least 274 beds, an intensive care unit, maternity and neonatal services, mental health services, radiology services and ambulatory care. Once completed, it will have the capacity to treat 130 000 patients each year, including almost 60 000 patients in the emergency department.

The new hospital will be Victoria's first all-electric hospital, supporting the Government's climate policy and renewable energy targets. It will activate the Cobblebank precinct, stimulating further investment and development in the area to drive employment growth and nearby residential developments to increase housing supply.

The new Melton Hospital is currently under procurement as an availability PPP. Construction is expected to commence in 2024 and be completed in 2029.

The project is being managed by the Victorian Health Building Authority in conjunction with Western Health.

North East Link

The North East Link is the largest investment in a road project in Victoria's history. It will complete the missing link in Melbourne's orbital freeway network between an upgraded Eastern Freeway and the M80 Ring Road. The new road will improve traffic flow, reduce travel times, remove non-local traffic from local roads and increase reliability for road users with up to 135 000 vehicles using the freeway daily.

A state-owned tolling company has been established to collect tolls for the North East Link, with toll revenue going towards the cost of building and maintaining the project. The North East Link State Tolling Corporation (STC) is a statutory corporation established under the *North East Link Act 2020* to be the long-term holder of the North East Link toll road assets. The STC will fund the delivery and operations of the Primary Package (Tunnels) and has responsibility for collecting toll revenue. The STC will also be the responsible road authority for the North East Link toll road under the *Road Management Act 2004* and will manage and control the use of the asset.

The Primary Package (Tunnels) is being delivered as an availability PPP with an incentivised target cost regime that applies to costs incurred during the design and construction phase of the project. This procurement model balances the complexity of Victoria's longest road tunnels, with strong incentives for on-time and on-budget delivery and whole-of-life outcomes. The project is underpinned by an innovative financing structure incorporating both public and private investment to drive successful project outcomes and delivery.

The Spark consortium comprising WeBuild, GS Engineering and Construction, CPB Contractors, China Construction Oceania, Ventia, Capella Capital, John Laing Investments, DIF and Pacific Partnerships were awarded the contract to deliver the Primary Package (Tunnels).

The procurement of the four Freeway Packages to connect to the M80 Ring Road and upgrade the Eastern Freeway is underway. The new link will be tolled, with the State retaining toll revenues, while the Eastern Freeway and the M80 Ring Road will remain toll free.

The project is being managed by the Major Transport Infrastructure Authority – North East Link Program, in conjunction with the Department of Transport and Planning and the STC.

West Gate Tunnel

As Melbourne's second river crossing, the West Gate Tunnel will provide an alternative to the West Gate Bridge. It will give direct freight access to the Port of Melbourne and remove thousands of trucks from local streets. The project is a network-wide solution to reducing congestion along the M1 corridor, expanding travel choices for motorists, and reducing travel times across one of Melbourne's main cross-city road corridors.

The State entered into a PPP contract with the Transurban Group for the building, operation, tolling, financing and maintenance of the West Gate Tunnel. In March 2022, the State and Transurban Group entered into amending and settlement deeds to formally document the resolution of various commercial issues related to the project. The project is expected to be completed by late 2025. The excavation of the two twin tunnels for the project is now complete. The tunnel boring machine (TBM) Vida broke through in February 2023 and the second TBM Bella broke through in May 2023.

The project is being managed by the Major Transport Infrastructure Authority – West Gate Tunnel Project.

High-value high-risk projects

Projects identified as being high-value and/or high-risk (HVHR) are subject to more rigorous scrutiny, independent checking, and government approval processes (HVHR Framework).

A number of the Government's new investments will be assured under the HVHR Framework. The DTF website (www.dtf.vic.gov.au/infrastructure-investment) provides further information on the HVHR Framework and Gateway review process.

DTF, in conjunction with OPV, also undertakes a range of regular and targeted assurance activities on HVHR projects to provide advice to the Government. Assurance activities occur at key decision points throughout the project lifecycle, from project inception through to development, procurement, delivery and operations.

Table 2 lists 10 new and 55 existing projects which are monitored under the framework.

VICTORIA CONTINUES TO LEAD THE WAY IN INFRASTRUCTURE

Evolving our approach to procurement and delivery

The Government is reforming its infrastructure procurement framework to streamline and enhance the delivery of its infrastructure pipeline. This modernised suite of policy and contracts will ensure there is a consistent and transparent approach to infrastructure procurement across departments and delivery agencies.

The Government is developing new standard form contracts starting with the development of a new Enhanced Design and Construct deed, Incentivised Target Cost deeds, and a revised Partnerships Victoria deed harmonised with the New South Wales Government. These new standard form contracts will increase procurement efficiencies by minimising the need for bespoke legal and commercial drafting to only focus on matters which address unique project risks and characteristics.

Creating the right skills and resources

Victoria faces unprecedented workforce challenges in the delivery of its infrastructure pipeline. Infrastructure Australia forecasts that public infrastructure projects across Australia (including small projects) faced a shortage of 214 000 skilled workers in 2022.4 This is projected to grow to a peak shortage of 248 000 people in 2023. Infrastructure Australia has also found that every occupational group involved in public infrastructure now face shortages, with engineers, scientists and architects particularly affected, followed by finishing trades and labour, and structures and civil trades.⁵

In a response to labour shortages, the Government has been working to enhance major project delivery skills and resources through a series of targeted initiatives:

- providing free TAFE and Big Build Apprenticeships to match labour with specific skills needs, with more than 20 infrastructure related courses now available through Free TAFE alone
- delivery of the Australian Major Projects Leadership Academy (AMPLA), the preeminent national leadership program for major project delivery, producing more than 200 graduates
- improving the culture of the construction sector to make it a more appealing place to work for people of all backgrounds, including implementation of the Women in Construction Strategy and the Building Equality Policy to create training and employment opportunities for women
- continuing to play a key part in the Construction Industry Culture Taskforce's development of the new Culture Standard, including two Victorian-based pilots of the standard currently underway
- actively encouraging the Federal Government to increase skilled migration.

Responding to market constraints

The Government will continue to roll out a coordinated set of responses to address market capacity challenges, including:

- initiatives to address supply chain disruptions and increase the efficiency of resource
 use, including by identifying regulatory barriers in the supply chain and how to remove
 them
- promoting Victoria's Digital Asset Policy to pioneer technology and digital engineering to improve resource utilisation in major infrastructure programs
- increasing the uptake of modern construction methods including offsite and modular construction in Victorian major infrastructure projects
- harnessing new technologies such as artificial intelligence and machine learning to uncover efficiencies in major project delivery.

Balance sheet opportunities

The Government has a strong track record of realising value from assets with the proceeds being reinvested in Victorian infrastructure or used to support other state projects.

The Government has ensured it retains ownership of assets while improving services, controlling prices, and delivering value for Victorians.

VicRoads Modernisation

In August 2022, the Government entered a joint venture partnership to modernise VicRoads' registration, licensing and custom plates functions. Following a competitive and robust market engagement process, a consortium of Aware Super, Australian Retirement Trust and Macquarie Asset Management were selected as the State's partners.

The partnership has been structured as a 40-year concession, with the State receiving upfront proceeds of \$7.9 billion whilst also retaining an interest in the VicRoads joint venture.

The establishment of this joint venture is the result of a 15-month process that included consultation with VicRoads workers, unions, motorists' groups and other stakeholders. The joint venture will fund an essential upgrade to the VicRoads IT system resulting in an improved customer service offering.

The joint venture partners are reputable Australian industry superannuation funds and long-term investors with combined experience delivering the New South Wales, South Australian, Victorian and Western Australian land titles services, as well as data centres and telecommunications infrastructure. More than 75 per cent of the consortium's funding is coming from Australian superannuation funds, meaning that Australian's retirement savings are being invested back into essential services provided by VicRoads.

The Government has also delivered on its commitment to protect the jobs of existing VicRoads employees, while creating more than 120 new jobs to oversee the joint venture, support the IT modernisation process and bolster the Government's road safety role. Continued ownership of VicRoads by the Government will ensure control over regulation and policy, data and privacy provisions and pricing of essential fees, with information to remain secure and stored in Australia.

SUMMARY FINANCIAL TABLES AND COVERAGE OF BUDGET PAPER NO. 4

In the 2023-24 Budget, a total of \$201 billion of capital projects are either commencing or already underway (refer to Table 3). These include projects in both the general government and public non-financial corporations (PNFC) sectors.

In Chapter 2 General government capital program 2023-24 and Chapter 3 Public non-financial corporations capital program 2023-24, there can be differences between cash flows and the estimated completion date. These can arise because of differences between practical and financial completion dates or where funding from non-State Government sources, including the Commonwealth Government, is received in the later stages of the project after State Government funding ceases.

Movements in the state capital program

The Budget Paper No. 4 2023-24 State capital program includes 714 projects that are funded by the Government (budget-funded projects) and have been classed as either existing, or completed projects, since they were last reported in the 2022-23 Budget. The overall performance of the capital program continues to meet expectations with high adherence to project budgets with less than one per cent program variance on cost since the last reporting period. However, the market capacity and material supply constraints have resulted in extended timeframes for some projects, particularly smaller projects under \$100 million in value.

Analysis of all 714 existing and completed budget-funded projects shows a 0.3 per cent (\$565 million) net increase in project costs measured since the *2022-23 Budget*, and a 21 per cent variance on project completion timeframes measured since the *2022-23 Budget*.

Analysis of 130 budget-funded major projects with a TEI above \$100 million shows a 0.2 per cent (\$391 million) net increase in project costs and a 15 per cent variance on project completion timeframes, measured since the 2022-23 Budget. The cost variance is significantly lower than prior years and the variance against timeframes for large projects has also reduced showing improved overall program performance.

The variances to project-specific estimated completion dates and TEI amounts are explained in footnotes included in the tables in Chapter 2 General government capital program 2023-24 and Chapter 3 Public non-financial corporations capital program 2023-24.

Project TEI and estimated completion date reporting

In Chapter 2 General government capital program 2023-24 and Chapter 3 Public non-financial corporations capital program 2023-24, completion timeframes and details of the TEI are provided with estimated expenditure to 30 June 2023 and beyond, except for some project information which may not be reported for the following reasons:

- where a project is subject to further planning, design development and early works
- due to undertaking a procurement process where disclosure of capital costs may impact potential pricing of tenders from the market or the cost and construction schedule is yet to be contracted
- where commercial arrangements affecting a project's delivery schedule are yet to be finalised
- where funding consideration of future works packages are yet to be considered

- where a project's continuation may be subject to a review
- where funding based on a preliminary cost estimate has been placed in contingency and not specifically disclosed and will require final consideration before the total estimated investment is confirmed.

Summary table of the general government capital program

The individual new and existing capital projects listed in Chapter 2 *General government capital program 2023-24* and summarised in Table 4 mainly comprises projects funded by the Government through the annual budget process, where the resulting asset or infrastructure is owned and managed by a general government sector agency. This includes schools, hospitals and roads.

Total capital expenditure recorded in each agency's financial statements may differ in some cases due to the agency's reporting of other capital expenditure. This includes expenditure relating to an agency's ongoing capital programs (such as minor works, refurbishments and vehicle fleet purchases), and capital expenditure of outer budget entities (such as individual schools and hospitals) funded through their own revenue sources, such as donations.

The Government also funds infrastructure (including major public transport infrastructure) where the resulting assets are accounted for in the PNFC sector. These projects, although funded through the annual budget process, are listed in Chapter 3 *Public non-financial corporations capital program 2023-24* against the relevant PNFC entity.

The measure of general government infrastructure investment includes:

- net investment in assets for the general government sector (which appears in the general government sector financial statements as cash flows from investments in non-financial assets)
- capital funding provided through the budget for PNFC sector infrastructure (which appears in the general government sector financial statements as cash flows from investments in financial assets for policy purposes)
- estimated private sector construction-related cash outflows on PPP projects.

Summary table for public non-financial corporations capital program

The PNFC sector entities primarily fund infrastructure and other investments from cash flows arising from their operating activities, borrowings, proceeds from asset sales and Victorian and Commonwealth Governments funding and grants.

For significant investments, PNFC entities are required to submit a detailed business case for the Treasurer's approval. The threshold above which business cases are required is set for each entity according to a five-tiered approach, being \$5 million, \$15 million, \$30 million, \$80 million or \$100 million, depending on the relative size and risk of the PNFC entity. The five thresholds have been developed to ensure that the business case review and approval process focuses on those projects that are complex, high value and/or high risk.

Table 6 summarises the value of the capital program for PNFC entities.

Projects with a TEI equal to or greater than \$1 million are listed individually in Chapter 3. The estimated expenditure on other capital is also detailed in each entity's table of projects.

Changes in TEI and project priorities, for example estimated completion dates, may occur from year to year, subject to approval by the entity's board.

Information for ongoing projects, such as upgrades or maintenance works, is provided by the entity based on the budget estimates period, using planning data where appropriate.
