## Q ELIZABETH QUAY

The mosaic colours represent the riverbed, submerged and winding. On the upper levels of the building the river is reflected through the changes of light throughout the year.

ARTIST: EVELINE KOTAI WITH MATTHEWS AND SCAVALLI ARCHITECTS



Inspired by many elements of the Noongar people this mosaic sits at the base of the BHP Billiton Water Park. A collaboration between artists Sandra Hill and Jenny Dawson, the artwork represents the Dreaming story of the creation of the Milky Way.

This giant artwork runs the entire length of the inlet, illuminating the water.

Spanda links the river, the land and the sky to welcome visitors to the quay. Suitably, its form creates a feeling of openness and inclusion. Spanda has been designed to be appreciated from all angles, interpreted in many different ways and to interact with the art piece by walking through it.

#### Bessie Mabel Rischbieth OBE (1874-1967) ARTIST: JON TARRY

Bessie Rischbieth is remembered for lobbying for civil rights and conservation throughout her lifetime in Perth. Her passion for the Swan River is fitting with the Elizabeth Quay project, which reconnects the city with the waterfront, encouraging the people of Perth to enjoy the river's natural beauty.

#### The Black Swan

#### ARTISTS: ANNE NEIL, RICHARD WALLEY AND JOHN WALLEY

This mural tells the story of how Western Australia's native Black Swans came to be. The swans, originally white, were attacked by eagles tearing out all their feathers after the swans visited the eagles lagoon. Crows flew to the rescue covering the swans with their own black feathers, transforming the swans coat to black and their bloodstained bills red forever.

#### Signature Ring ARTISTS: SIMON GAUNTLETT AND MATTHEW NGUI

This public art piece has hundreds of thousands of past school students signatures etched in copper plates that were collected in 1999 as part of the millennium celebrations. Signature Ring features fibre optics that illuminate interactive panels representing the passage of time.

First Contact is a stunning five metre tall, cast aluminium artwork by renowned indigenous artist, Laurel Nannup depicting the arrival of European settlers to Perth.

As the European boats arrived, the local Noongar people believed that these ships, were their past ancestors returning from the sea.
