Before closer of submissions I add this to a previous email on the subject of the imminent closer a of very valuable piece of transport infrastructure.

Reports in the Newcastle Herald, dated 16th April 2013, clearly show why we need to retain the rail line into the Newcastle CBD.

The report says about 3000 students and 200 staff will use the new Business and Law facility of the Newcastle University legal precinct. Should the rail terminate at Wickham it would be predictable that a large number would prefer to use vehicle (cars), rather than change modes of transport over a kilometre away. Add to this the new precinct will have to be serviced, trades people, deliveries, visiting lecturers, all requiring transport, again the motor vehicle. While other cities around the world are expanding their rail infrastructure why are we going the opposite way?, instead of satisfying the few look outside the square and make Newcastle transport the envy of others, improve on what we have.

I ask you to read the Online Comments of the Newcastle Herald 16/4/2013 re Rail for campus.

In the past few years I have become to appreciate what we have, I enjoy rail travel in all its forms. Driving in to Newcastle is becoming more difficult, or should I say parking is becoming more difficult, so the rail offers an alternative. My mobility is getting such that changing transport on any journey is not my preference.
