Housing

By 2031, we'll need up to 75,000 new homes.

Giving people a choice of housing that is affordable, of the right type and size, and in the right places can have a big impact on the wellbeing of communities.

Ensuring that enough homes are being built will help to reduce the cost of housing in the Lower Hunter.

Since 2006, the majority of homes have been built in existing urban areas. Building more homes in new areas of the Lower Hunter will help to ensure there is an adequate supply and choice of housing across the region.

Jobs in the Lower Hunter have grown at a rate of 3% in the past 10 years, compared with 2% across NSW.

The Lower Hunter's strong economy is underpinned by its coal and natural water resources, productive agricultural sector, manufacturing sector, and innovative business culture.

As well as continuing to support these sectors, it's important to ensure there is a wider range of job and business opportunities.

Areas that have been identified for growth include:

- the airport and port-related industries
- tourism expansion to the cruise ship and resort sectors
- clean energy and low-carbon technology and research
- manufacturing of transport infrastructure (rail, buses and ferries)
- expansion of the University of Newcastle in the city and potentially other regional locations

Transport

We want public transport to provide 20% of all commuter trips to and from the Newcastle CBD.

More than a million people live in the Lower Hunter, Central Coast, Upper Hunter and lower Mid North Coast.



We need to plan for efficient transport connections in, out and around the Lower Hunter.

We also need to ensure that transport helps to support housing and employment opportunities in the major centres, and increase the number of trips made by public transport.

Major planned projects, which will help to boost the economy, include:

- \$1.7 billion Hunter Expressway
- \$1 billion upgrade of the rail line between Sydney and the Lower Hunter
- improvements to the Northern
 Sydney Freight Corridor between
 Hexham and Strathfield
- \$11.2 billion expansion of the Port of Newcastle and the coal chain that links it to the Upper Hunter, which will double the Port's capacity

Community infrastructure



The Lower Hunter's population is changing. The proportion of people aged 65 and over is likely to increase from 16% to 24%. This will have an impact on the types of homes we live in and the services we use.

Social infrastructure such as schools, hospitals, shops and cultural, recreational and sporting facilities help to ensure residents have the services they need.

This can help to promote encourage community involvement, give people access to a better lifestyle, and improve social inclusion.


