I am fortunate to have two homes, one in Bondi and one on the south coast. I live between the two as we have a business in sydney. Much of the time my Bondi apartment is empty and I thought that offering it as part of airbnb would allow the resource to be used and would provide me a link to travellers from around the world. It also generates income which I declare and which allows me to fund my staying in sydney for other business reasons.

Let me provide one story that shows the power of airbnb. I had a Japanese couple come to stay this year. They have been coming to sydney for ten years for the wedding anniversary, always staying in a hotel in Bondi. This year, thanks to airbnb they wanted to experience living like a local. I had lots of email communication with them prior to their stay, they asked to meet me during their stay which I did and they had the most wonderful time. I use a local linen and cleaning service to help me provide quality accommodation for my guests. In addition, I always set the apartment up for my guests in a personal way. For my Japanese guests, I left fresh fruit and Australian native foods as part of their welcome pack. They told me they were so excited by this simple gesture. On their departure, they left me a number of small gifts from Japan, we met and took photos of each other and the building and have agreed to stay in touch. They sent me a link to all their holiday photos and they were simply gorgeous guests enjoying a lovely holiday together, some nights they ate in, having bought food from local shops which I recommended, other nights they went for dinner, again all in the local restaurants I recommended. That is why people stay in airbnb, it is a personal connection that is not available from even the best concierge. I have travelled to Japan and if I did so again, would look them up, as we are now "traveller friends". They want to come back next january and so I have offered them a free nights accommodation for that booking as they were delightful guests. This is the spirit of what airbnb can be. It is not just a money making exercise, it is great way to develop real connections with sydney and people from all over the world.

I have been running airbnb for 18 months and have not had one complaint from my building about my guests.
