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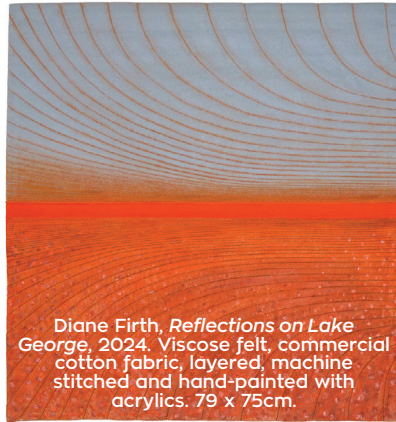
Art in the heart of the goldfields

THIS winter, take the time to discover the creativity of the central goldfields by visiting the galleries in the region.

Located in Maryborough's historic fire station, the Central Goldfields Art Gallery is exhibiting *The Art of Gold* until the end of June.

Featuring golden jewellery on loan from the National Gallery of Australia the provenance of the twelve golden treasures on display relate to Maryborough and surrounds.

Nine of the artworks date from the mid-19th century goldrush in Central Victoria. Known as goldfields jewellery, the collection includes earrings,

brooches and a locket commissioned by miners.

Also on display is *Clay on Country*, a celebration of clay, community, culture and creativity and *Allegories*, a collection of oil paintings by Amphitheatre artist Nick Dridan.

The Golden Textures Contemporary Art Quilt Award 2025 reflects Maryborough's proud textile history. The gallery is thrilled that this year, Linda Steele, president of the OzQuilt Network Inc. will join gallery coordinator Helen Kaptein to select the winner.

"The award showcases contemporary



art quilts from around Australia and the winning work remains in the gallery's art collection, joining an outstanding and growing collection of contemporary Australian art quilts," Helen said.

"Visitors will marvel at the skill and time demonstrated by artists from all around Australia whose subject matters explores aspects of our natural world though to challenging social issues."

The winner will be announced at the exhibition opening on Saturday June 28 at 2.00pm, with the quilts on display until October 12.

Just a short drive from Maryborough is Possum Gully Gallery. Owned by artist Patricia Walsh, visitors can view a range of works from some of Australia's best-known artists, as well as unique garden sculptures.

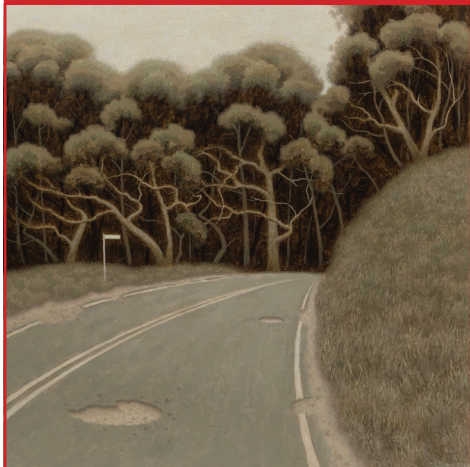
Throughout winter the gallery is holding a studio clearance sale. Printmaking and drawings will be available at special reduced prices, with prices starting at just \$10 and free posters included.

Throughout July, the Talbot Art Group will exhibit an eclectic array of work aptly titled *Diversity in Styles*. Winter is also the ideal time to experience the gallery's Barking Owl night-time silo feature.

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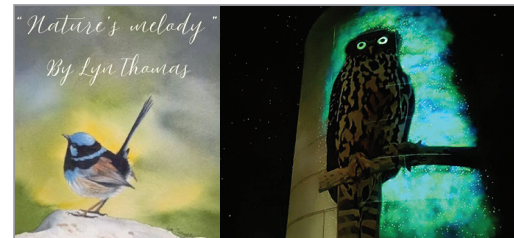

Travel safely this winter

DRIVING in rural areas can be very different to driving in metropolitan areas, especially in the colder months.

Here's our tips to help you safely explore the Central Goldfields during the winter.

Drive for the conditions

Check your weather app before hitting the roads, as wet roads and black ice can reduce grip, sometimes without warning. Fog and heavy rain can drastically decrease visibility, making it hard to see other vehicles and turn-off signage. Also note that some roads are subject to flooding in heavy rain and unsealed roads may become unsuitable for standard vehicles in wet conditions, so be careful when following GPS directions.

Slow down

Just because road signs say 100 doesn't mean you need to stick to this in bad weather. Travel just a little slower, especially in unfamiliar areas, as there may be pot holes in the roads or other unseen hazards. Always pause before taking off from stop signs or intersections in case other vehicles lose traction.

Maintain a safe braking distance

It takes much longer to stop in the wet, so don't follow other cars too closely when it's raining, or if the roads are wet and icy. Tailgating is unsafe and illegal, especially on hilly or unfamiliar roads.

When in doubt, pull over

In wet weather use your air conditioner to prevent your windscreen from fogging up. If visibility becomes so limited you can't see the edges of the road or other vehicles at a safe distance try pulling over and waiting for conditions to ease.



Look out for wildlife

Kangaroos and wallabies usually move around during dusk but can also be active on darker winter days. Slow down when driving through areas of heavy bushland as they can appear suddenly, and remember - if you see one kangaroo, there are probably more nearby.

If you hit an animal when driving, report the collision to Wildlife Victoria's Emergency Response Service hotline on (03) 8400 7300.

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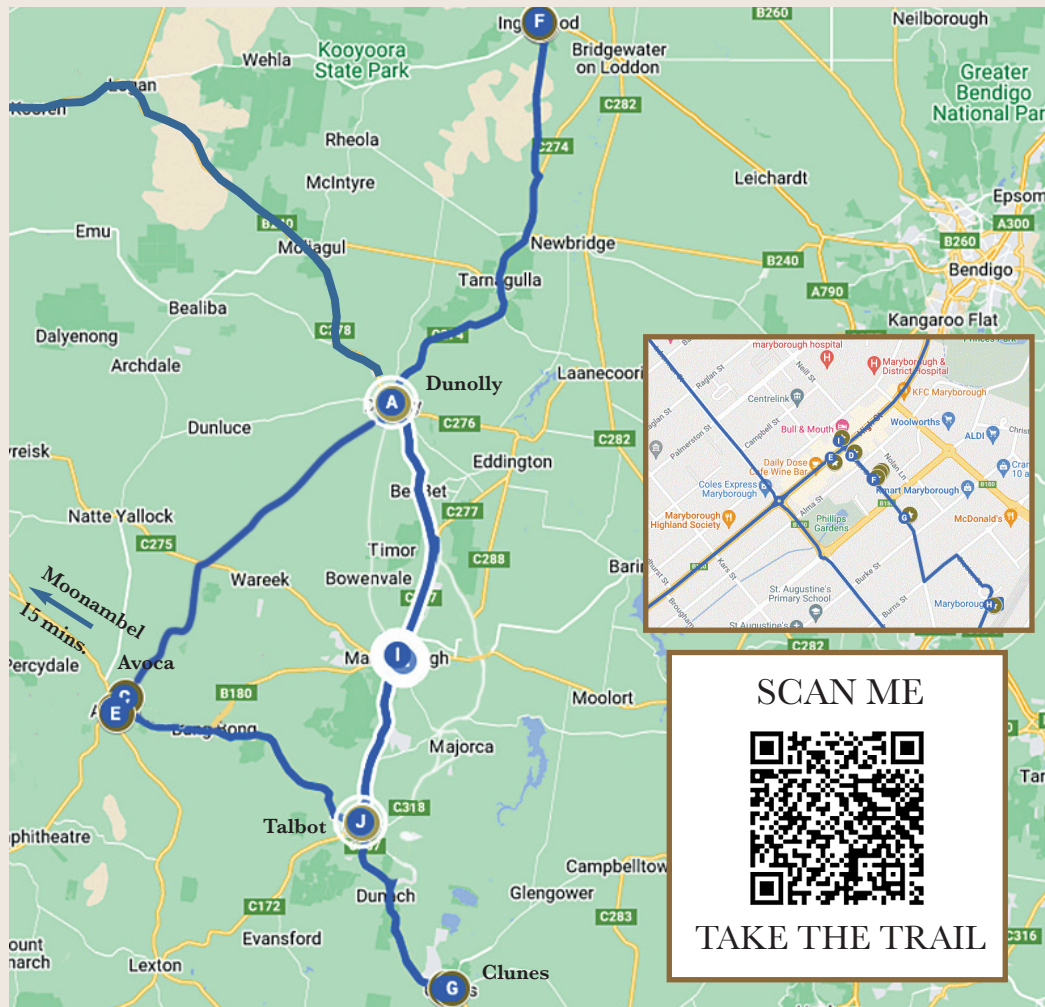

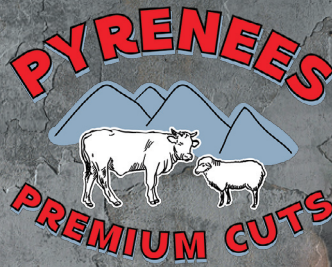

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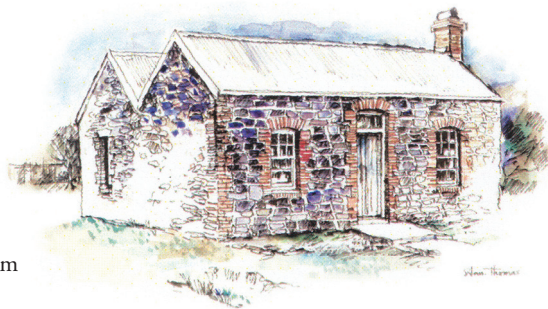

Finding family

WHILE the search for gold continues to attract thousands of hopeful prospectors to the central goldfields each year, treasure of a different kind also draws an increasing number of visitors to the region – missing pieces in their family-history puzzle.

The popularity of TV shows such as *Who Do You Think You Are?* and *Find My Family*, along with the advent of DNA ancestry searches, has seen a surge in curiosity about life in the early days of the colony.

While websites such as Trove.com offer invaluable information, there is nothing quite like walking the same streets as your great-grandparents, marvelling at the ingenuity of those who endured in harsh conditions with no mod-cons, or standing at the gravesite of a long-lost relative.

One of the first places to start your search is the local historical society. Most communities boast a small, dedicated band of local volunteers whose mission is to keep history alive for future generations.

Throughout the next editions of *Goldfields Getaway* we will highlight the invaluable work of the historical societies throughout the goldfields.

The Maryborough Midlands Historical Society (MMHS) is located at the Museum and Resource Centre in Palmerston Street, which includes the recently-restored Worsley Cottage. Dating back to the late-1800s, the cottage is furnished with many artefacts from that time, as well as photographs and items belonging to the Worsley family. On the same property is a slab squatters' hut dating from around 1844.

Barbara Nielsen, who is president

of the MMHS, said they receive enquiries and visitors from all over Australia.

"Our archives include resources such as cemetery, marriage and gaol records, hospital admissions, microfilmed versions of *The Maryborough Advertiser*, rate books, photographs and maps," she said.

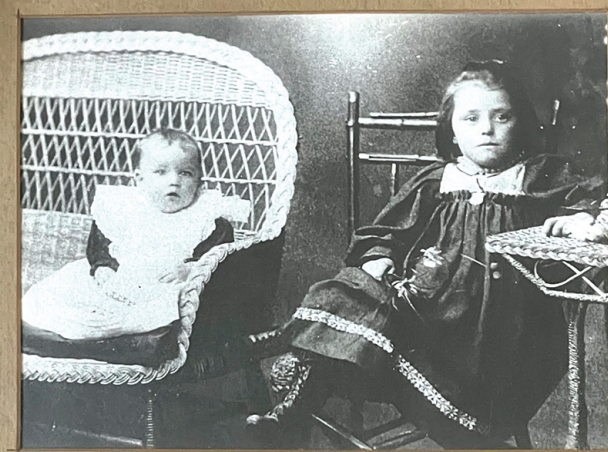
"Sometimes researchers find information in unexpected places. A recent interstate visitor discovered to his astonishment that the name of the ship on which his German ancestors made the voyage to Australia had been recorded in the Maryborough Hospital Admissions register."

The Museum and Resource Centre is open to the public on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10am to noon and on Sundays from 2pm to 4pm. Barb encourages anyone with specific enquiries to contact the Society via phone or email (see display ad).

"Some lucky visitors are surprised to find that their Maryborough family history has already been researched and documented – in most cases by the late Margaret Walkley, our longtime family history specialist," Barbara said.

"Gold rush era society was more diverse than it is today. The population of Victoria increased dramatically, gold seekers travelling from many nations, for example China, the US and European countries. Thousands of these immigrants flocked to the Maryborough goldfields.

"Our Research Centre contains information on many of these families and their descendants, some of whom still live in the area today."

Finding family

CEMETERIES are living public archives, rich with history and stories.

Each headstone—or unmarked grave—indicates a life once lived, offering insight into local heritage, cultural traditions, and historic events. From family names to wartime service, these resting places reveal the past in quiet, powerful ways.

Local cemetery trusts often help with family history research, sometimes for a

small fee. Please be mindful that they are bound by the Privacy and Data Protection Act 2014 (Vic), and may only be able to provide limited information to direct family members.

By exploring cemeteries and learning about those who came before us, we keep their stories alive and deepen our connection to the past, ensuring their legacies are not forgotten.

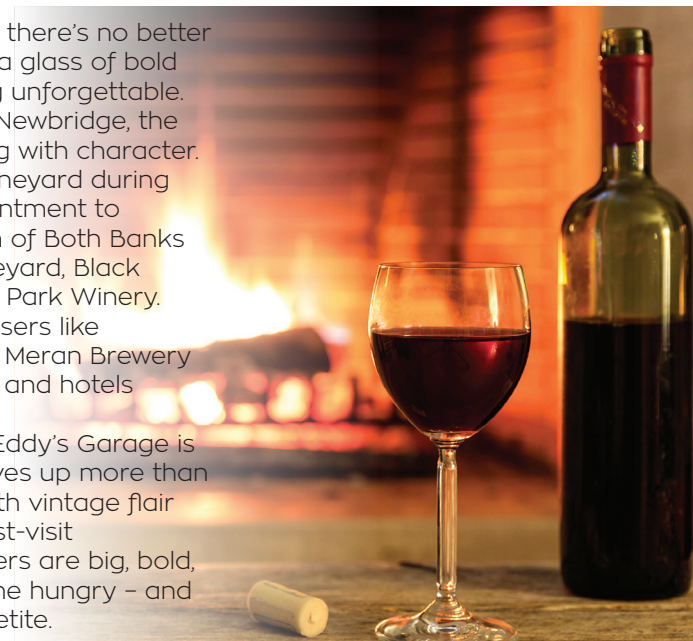
AS the chill of winter rolls in, there's no better way to stay cosy than with a glass of bold red and a bite of something unforgettable.

Around Bridgewater and Newbridge, the local wine scene is brimming with character.

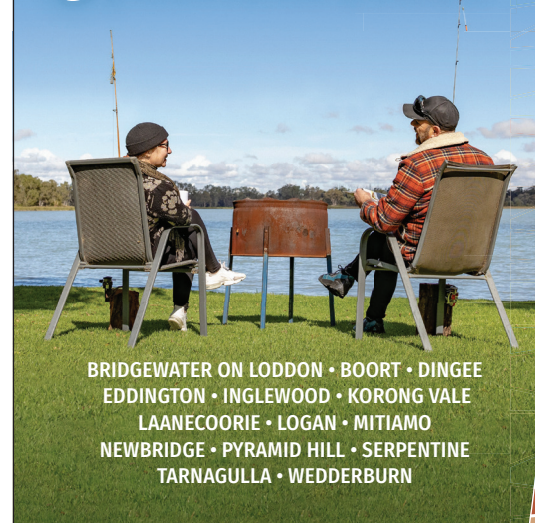

Australia's finest lamb through cooking demonstrations and tastings.

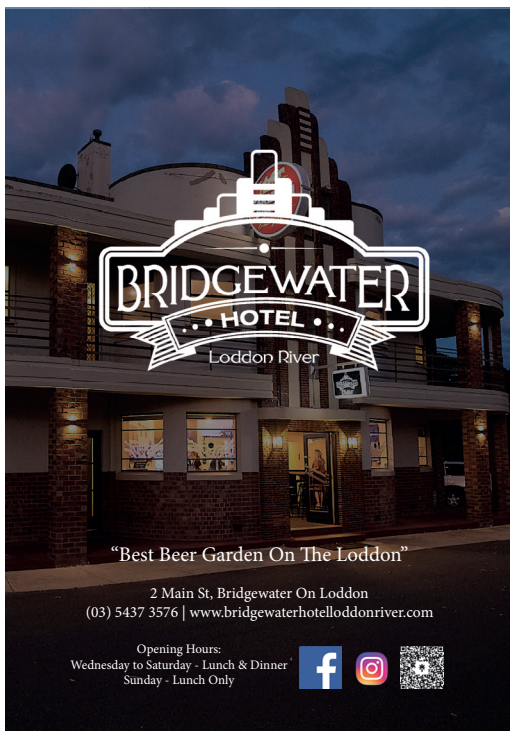
- **Careers and Technology Hub:** A platform for emerging technologies and career opportunities within the agricultural sector, aiming to inspire the next generation of industry leaders.

Keeping history alive

IN mid-1972, a small group calling themselves the Maldon Flywheelers – self-confessed ‘machinery tragics’, had the wild dream of an agricultural machinery showpiece for the town of Maldon.

They began gathering any discarded and superseded equipment that would fit the bill: Items that would show the vast array of machinery needed to feed, water, warm and inform the growing communities of central Victoria.

Thanks to their sheer doggedness, years of funding submissions and VCAT appeals, the Maldon Vintage Machinery & Museum was formally opened in 2006. Renee Thompson is the

museum’s project coordinator and said the whole town is involved in some way with the success of the museum.

Situated on the site of the once rich Great Western Cymru Company Mine,

Renee describes it as a flywheeler’s haven, with many treasures in working order.

“But – and there is a big but – we are so much more,” she said.

“Our museum has evolved into an incredibly unique display of history covering many eras with a specialty of showing how life was once worked and lived, with the use of hand tool, horsepower, to the industrial revolution with engines and electricity to solar power, moving towards the way we live today.”

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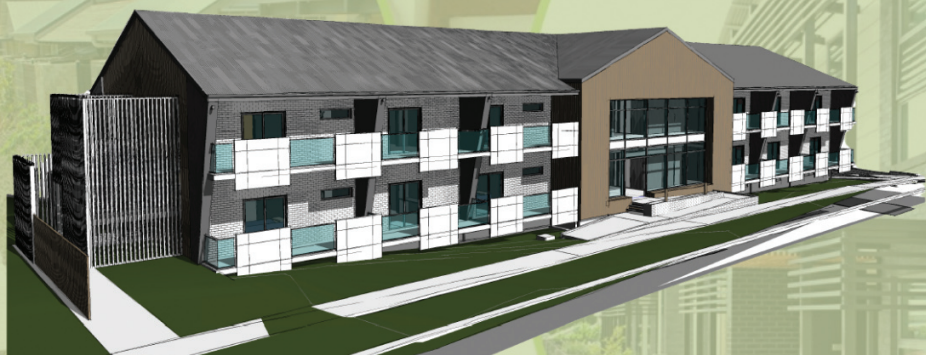
