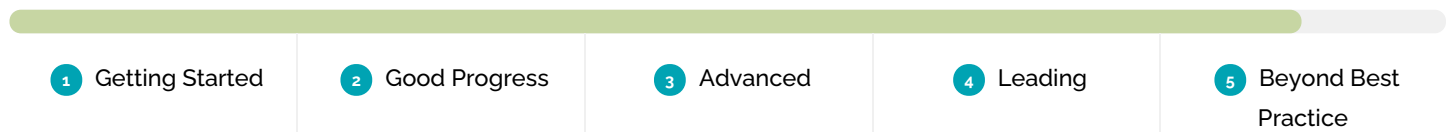
About APCO

APCO's vision is a packaging value chain that collaborates to keep packaging materials out of landfill and retains the maximum value of the materials, energy and labour within the local economy.

Describe any innovative packaging sustainability initiatives you have implemented during your 12-month reporting period.

Teams use a milk-on-tap system to significantly reduce the volume of single-use plastic packaging entering site and, in turn, the amount of litter generated through daily hospitality operations. Wherever possible, the hospitality and cleaning teams also procure goods in bulk packaging to minimise loose, disposable packaging that can become waste or litter. Waste reduction and litter prevention are further supported through ongoing staff education and the organisation's long-standing Zero Trash initiative, which has introduced practical, creative ways to reduce single-use items across site and transitioned all food and beverage service ware to durable, reusable alternatives. This year, the initiative has been further strengthened through a range of targeted actions to reduce plastic and associated litter, including procuring 'Who Gives a Crap' toilet paper in the guest pavilions; supplying unwrapped dishwasher tablets; providing compostable coffee pods in hotel rooms; and eliminating single-use slippers in hotel rooms.

APCO Action Plan Commitments

For each of the Packaging Sustainability Framework criteria listed below, a description is provided along with the commitments made by the organisation in their APCO Action Plan.

Criterion 1:

Governance & Strategy:

This criteria considers actions to integrate packaging sustainability into business strategies.

- Develop a strategy that includes goals (objectives) and targets for packaging sustainability that addresses the Sustainable Packaging Guidelines (SPGs) or equivalent.

Criterion 2:

Design & Procurement:

This criteria considers actions taken to ensure that sustainability principles are considered in the design or procurement of both new and existing packaging through use of the Sustainable Packaging Guidelines (SPGs).

Criterion 3:

Recycled Content:

This criteria considers actions taken to increase or optimise the amount of recycled material used by your

organisation.

- Aim to use recycled content in any packaging where this is feasible, including:
 - Primary packaging
 - Secondary packaging
 - Tertiary packaging

Criterion 4:

Recoverability:

This criteria considers actions taken to improve the recovery of packaging at end-of-life and increase use of reusable packaging.

- Investigate whether all of our packaging is recyclable at end-of-life and identify any gaps and opportunities for greater reuse or recycling.

Criterion 5:

Disposal Labelling:

This criteria considers the extent to which packaging has been labelled to help consumers determine what to do with packaging at end-of-life.

- As packaging is updated or refreshed, add on-pack information for consumers on recyclability or correct disposal.

Criterion 6:

On-site Waste:

This criteria considers progress in increasing the amount of on-site solid waste being diverted from landfill.

- Develop a system to collect and recycle used packaging generated at our facilities.

Criterion 7:

Problematic Materials:

This criteria considers the extent to which organisations are actively phasing out problematic and unnecessary single-use plastic packaging and preventing/reducing litter.

- Help reduce litter by:
 - Conducting regular clean ups on-site
 - Looking for opportunities to redesign packaging to eliminate components that may have the

propensity to become litter
