In 2017, we wish to connect you to our Ngati Rehia whakapapa, and to the essence of what the Pearl of the North is about.

Look 5km West towards Takou Bay, lays the Mataatua Waka of which Ngati Rehia is Kaitiaki, settled in its resting place, resisting currents and manmade nuisances to hold steadfast to the river bed.

Further North, Ngati Kura and Ngati Rehia are one people, interwined and the subject of the beautifully hand crafted taonga 'Nga Whiringa e Rua'.

Set out early and paddle east into the rising sun, follow the wash of the magnificent magical coastline. Lion Rock catches the eye and one's efforts can't help but intensify just to get a good close up look of this Sphinx- like rock then onwards to Wiwiki and the Nine Pins.

Next appears Mataka, a maunga born witness to every piece of history that has evolved and shaped our country. Holding status over our identity and testaments of our ancestors and their era.

In the distant is the Hole in the Rock, Rawhiti, Russell, Opua, Waitangi and inland as far west as Waimate North, Puketi Forests around northeast to the the Cavalli Island, one can only feel blessed to be surrounded by all these beautiful places and their rich history.

Around Wiwiki and up Te Awa o nga Rangatira (Rivers of the Chiefs) assisted by the incoming tide, the hoe will have passed the half way stage! To one side are the Black Rocks, always cluttered with fat mussels, known for great fishing and diving. To the other, at the foot of Mataka, is Rangihoua or Marsden Cross, a constant reminder of a busy Trading station, Christianity and Samuel Marsden in the 1800s.

Then right, turning into Te Kerei Mangonui where history tells us Te Tiheru of the Mataatua (Bailer

of the Mataatua Waka) was lost overboard but still visible at low tide - hence our place name, Te Tii. Saluting the Oyster farms to the left right and scattered everywhere, signals not far away is the end.

Finally, Whitiora and Hiruharama Hou marae, where the Pearl of the North begins and ends.
